## Department Store Sales

Department store sales were $\$ 835.9$ milion in June 1981 up $208 \%$ over June 1980. Sales rose in all depariments except piece goods ( $-11.8 \%$ ) and women's and misses' coats and sults $(-4.6 \%)$. The largest gains were posted for major appliances ( $64.3 \%$ ) and furniture ( $51.6 \%$ ). Sales increased in all provinces ranging from $25.4 \%$ for Ontario to $11.7 \%$ for Quebec. Sales and percentage increases for metropolitan areas were: Montreal, $\$ 88.3$ million, $10.5 \%$, Toronto. $\$ 126.7$ million, $26.4 \%$. Winnipeg. $\$ 35.8$ million, 14.9\%; and Vancouver, \$86.1 milfion, $17.5 \%$
The selling value of stocks held in June 1981 at $\$ 2.694 .5$ million showed an increase of $12.5 \%$ over June 1980

## Capacity Utilization

Capacity ulilization in Canadian manufacturing industries increased to $80.9 \%$ in the second quarter of 1981 from $79.5 \%$ in the first quarter, recording the third consecutive quarterly increase.

Durable manufacturing increased to $75.8 \%$ of capacily from $73.7 \%$, while nondurable manufacturing industries showed an increase to $86.1 \%$ from $85.5 \%$ in the preceding quarter.

Capacity utilization rates for the second quarter of 1981 by industry were as follows, with first quarter 1981 rates in brackets:

## Cigarettes / Cigars

Canadian production of cigarettes for the month of July 1981 was 3.2 billion, up from 2.5 billion a year earlier. Production of cigars declined to 11.5 million in the latest month from 165 million in July 1980.

## Retail Trade

It should be noted that the following estimates are based upon a low response because of recent postal disruptions and are being released as provisional estimates. Regular June 1981 preliminary estimales will be released al a later date.

Seasonally adjusted retail sales for June 1981 were $\$ 7,747.1$ million, a decrease of $0.2 \%$ from the $\$ 7.760 .7$ million posted in May. Six provinces recorded decreased sales from May ranging from - $0.1 \%$ for Newfoundland $10-5.1 \%$ for Nova Scotia. The largest sales increase was in Prince Edward Island (5.1\%).

Total relail trade without seasonal adjustment was $\$ 8,140.6$ million, an increase of $17.1 \%$ over June 1980. Sales increased in all provinces, gains ranging from $21.2 \%$ for Ontario to $7.5 \%$ for Nova Scotia.

## Manufacturing Industries

The preliminary estimate of the value of new orders received by Canadian manufacturers in June 1981, seasonally as 1 Ls ted. was $\$ 16.172 .8$ million, $0.7 \%$ higher than the revised May value of $\$ 16,059.6$ millior New orders for durable goods dripped $1.1 \%$ to $\$ 7,226.8$ million from $\$ 7,308,5$ million, while those for non-durable goods rose $2.2 \%$ to $\$ 8,946.0$ million from $\$ 8.751 .1$ million a month earlier.

Canadian manutacturers' shipments in June 1981. seasonally adjusted, reached $\$ 16,098.0$ million, up $1.9 \%$ from $\$ 15.792 .4$ million (revised) in May. Durable goods shipments were up $1.9 \%$ to $\$ 7.186 .8$ million from $\$ 7,054.5$ million in May while nondurable goods shipments rose 2.0\% to $\$ 8,911.2$ million from $\$ 8,737.9$ miltion.

The total backlog of unfilled orders for all manufacluring. seasonally adjusted, was estimated at $\$ 19,8399$ million in June. 0.4\% higher than the revised May value of $\$ 19,756.1$ million.

Total inventory owned by manufaclurers increased $2.1 \%$ to a seasonally adjusted $\$ 32.088 .9$ million in June from $\$ 31.427 .6$ million as revised for May. Total inventory held rose $1.9 \%$ to $\$ 33,528.2$ milfion from $\$ 32.895 .1$ million (revised), with increases in raw materials of $1.4 \%$, in goods in process of $2.8 \%$ and in finished products of $1.9 \%$.

The seasonally adjusted ratio of totai inventory owned to shipments at the end of June was 1.99:1; the same as the revised ratio for May. The finished produc is shipments ratio was unchanged at (i.38)

Not adjusted for seasonal variation, manufacturers' shipments in June 1981 were estimated at $\$ 17,252.9$ million. up $25.0 \%$ from a year earlier. Shipments for the first six months of 1981 10talled a preliminary $\$ 93,222.8$ million, an increase of $15.2 \%$ from $\$ 80.930 .6$ million in January-June 1980.

## Railway Carloadings

Revenue freight loaded by railways in Canada totalled 24.0 million short tons (21.8 million t) in June 1981, an increase of 1.5\% from a year earlier. The carriers received an additional 1.7 million short tons ( 1.5 million t) from the United States, up 6.5\% from June 1980.

Commodities registering notable changes in volumes loaded in the latest month were: potash (up 30.8\%); coal (up $11.7 \%$ ); wheat (down $26.6 \%$ ); and iron M6 and concentrates (down 9.5\%).

Total loadings in Canada during then ilir six months of 1981 showed a decreisse 2.0\% from the 1980 period while rebelp from U.S. connections declined by 31\%.

## International Travel

Preliminary estimates for the secund cuubter of 1981 show that Canada earned $\$ 994$ million from international Iravel, an icrease of $13.3 \%$ from the year-earlier Hriod while Canadians travelling abroad freased their spending by $11.2 \%$ 10 $\$ 1,215$ milhon. A deficit of $\$ 221$ million on international travel was recorded compared to $\$ 216$ million in April-June 1980 ,

In the first six months of 1981, estimated receipts from United Slates visitors rose to $\$ 888$ million from $\$ 754$ million in the 1980 period. while receipts from visitors from all ather countries increased to $\$ 492$ million from $\$ 461$ million. Payments by Canadians travelling to the U.S. increased to $\$ 1.755$ million from $\$ 1.585$ million, while payments to all other countries were up $10 \$ 854$ million from $\$ 801$ million. The travel account deficit was an estimated $\$ 1,229$ million in the first half of 1981 compared to $\$ 1,171$ million last year.

## Industrial Production

The seasonally adjusted index of industrial production $\{1971=100)$ slood at 138.5 in June 1981. unchanged from the May level A decline of $2.3 \%$ in mining production was offsel by increases in manufacturing $(+0.3 \%)$ and electric power, gas and water utilities $(+0.5 \%)$.

During the second quarter of 1981. the seasonally adjusted index of industrial production increased $2.2 \%$ trom the preceding quarter to a level of 138.3 . Output rose $2.8 \%$ in manufacturing and $1.7 \%$ in utilities. while showing a $0.9 \%$ decline in mining

## Family Expenditure

The 1978 survey of family expenditures covered urban and rural areas in the 10 provinces for the first time since 1969. The intervening surveys have been confined to major regional cities, so that a comparison between Canada and previously published city data will be of particular interest. The Canada data show that average total expenditure by all families and unatlached individuals was about $6 \%$ lower on a per family basis and $12 \%$ lower per person than the 16 -city data There are, however, only a few notable differences in the percentage share of total expenditure between the Canada and 16 city data. The percentage share for shelter was $16.1 \%$ (down from $169 \%$ for the 16 cities), personal taxes $169 \%$ (18.3\%). transportation $12.7 \%$ (up from $11.5 \%$ for the 16 cities) and total current consumption $76.5 \%$ ( $74.9 \%$ )

Family Expenditure in Canada, 1978 Volume 3 All Canada: Urban and Rural (62-551), to be published in October 1981. shows a similar set of tables for Canada as was previously published for the 16 cilies (62-550) it will also include, on a more limited basis, expenditure information for each of the five regions and for the 10 provinces. A linuted number of tables can be made avallatle prior to publication

For the first tirne. a public use micro-dala tape based on the 1978 survey is being prepared for distribution. It will include summary expenditure categories (with some supplementary calegories), together with characterislic categories associated with the spending unit, the dwelling unit, and the head and spouse. Copies of the lape and associated documentation will be priced at $\$ 300$ and will be available for purchase at the end of September 1981.
