## International Travel Account

In the third quarter of 1986, preliminary estimates show that Canada amassed a travel account surplus of $\$ 1.1$ billion. Up $\$ 671$ million from the third quarter of 1985 this surplus reflects the drawing power of Expo 86. in the second quarter, the travel account deficit was half its size in the three preceding years. The total deficit for the first nine months of 1986 was down $\$ 907$ million from the same period of 1985 and reached the lowest level since 1975.

The overall improvement was mainly due to a substantial change in the travel account with the United States. Traditionally it shows a surplus in the third quarter, but at $\$ 1.2$ billion this was the largest third quarter surplus on record. Fieceipts from U.S. residents have been growing at a faster rate than payments by Canadians travelling to the United States for some time. However, the most notable advances occurred in the second and third quarters of 1986 .
... International Travel Account

Payments by Canadians travelling abroad declined by $1.9 \%$ over the third quarter of 1985 . the first quarterly decrease since 1982. The growth rate of payments has decelerated over the past year. dropping from an increase of $12.3 \%$ in the third quarter of 1985. to the decrease in the current quarter. This decrease was entirely due to a reduction in payments to countries other than the United States. which have dropped on a year-over-year basis for iwo consecutive quarters. The travel account deficit with these other countries registered its lowest level since 1982.

## Characteristics of Travelling Canadians

A discussion in Tourism and Recreation - A Statistical Digest demonstrates some significant differences in travel destination preferences between Canadian travellers with different socio-demographic characteristics. Identifiable variations in the traveiler's makeup provide a useful tool for people involved in the tourism industry.

As indicated by the travel intensity index. domestic travellers (Canadians travelling within the country) tended to be young (25-34) or middle-age (35-44), with at least some postsecondary schooling. earned an income of at least $\$ 20.000$ and occupied professional, clerical or sales positions. Of those people that took a domestic trip, there was a higher tendency for them to reside in the Prarre Provinces and Nova Scotia.

Travellers to United States destinations tended to be slightly older (35-54). married. better educated. have an income in excess of $\$ 30.000$, and be in the same occupations as domestic travellers. Greater tendencies for United States bound travel were found for persons residing in Ontario, British Columbia and Manitoba.

As with travellers to the Unites States, peoplee taking a trip overseas had more education and slightly higher incomes. In contrast to both domestic and U.S. destinations. overseas travel was much more prominent among older Canadians. Travellers who made an overseas trip were more likely to originate from Ontario, British Columbia and Alberta.

## Department Store Sales

- Department store sales have flucfuated significantly in the first nine months of 1986. but have shown no overall growth.
- in September. seasonally adjusted sales iotalled $\$ 1.0$ billion. declining $(-0.8 \%)$ for the second consecutive month.
- Lower sales were recorded in 26 of the 40 departments.
- Department store stocks rose $8.5 \%$ in September. to $\$ 4.4$ billion, following decreases in Juiy and August.
- The inventories to sales ratio climbed to 4.21:1. the highest value recorded in 1986.

## Farm Cash Receipts

For the first nine months of 1986, farm cash receipts were estimated at $\$ 14.9$ billion, a $3.5 \%$ increase from 1985. Cumulative receipts have improved in recent months. They were down $6.7 \%$ in the first three months of 1986. Since April, receipts have been slightly higher than they were for the same period of time in 1985.

Direct payments to producers made under various government programs combined with higher livestock receipts were responsible for the increase in the current period. Livestock and animal product receipts rose $3.1 \%$ for the period, as a result of higher hog and poultry prices.

- The increase in hog receipts was led by an $18.2 \%$ advance in the year-to-date average price. Although hog prices fell slightly in September. they still remain $50 \%$ higher than those recerved in September 1985.
- Poultry receipts increased $3 \%$, largely due to larger marketings of both chickens and turkeys.

Total crop receipts were down slightly, as they have been for most of the year. Large increases in barley, wheat and tobacco receipts were partially offset by decreases in oilseeds, corn and potatoes.

- Receipts for barley and wheat were up sharply, as higher marketings offset lower prices.
- Tobacco receipts were up $142 \%$ over last year's level. The large increase was attributable to the fact that virtually all of the 1985 crop was sold in 1986 (due to a delay in the Ontario tobacco auction).
- The combined receipts from ollseeds were down 18\% despite higher farm deliveries. Average prices for oilseeds have fallen about $24 \%$ from the same period last year.

## Unemployment Insurance

In September, the number of unemployment msurance beneficiaries was down on a year-overyear basis for the eighteenth consecutive month. However, the rate of decline has slowed in recent months. The decrease in the number of beneficiaries has dropped from $-8.5 \%$ in January to $-2.2 \%$ in September.

In September, total unemployment insurance payments were $\$ 765$ million. increasing $5.4 \%$ from August and up $11.6 \%$ from September 1985. These advances were the result of a greater number of days available to process benefit payments in September. Payments for the first three quarters of 1986 amounted to $\$ 8.0$ billion, slightly higher than in the same perrod of last year.

The number of claims received during September 1986 rose $34.1 \%$ over the previous month and $6.1 \%$ from September 1985. Increases in the number of claims are commonly observed between August and September. Since the start of the year 2.3 million claims have been received. essentially machanged from the same period of 1985.

## Bilingualism

Between 1971 and 1981. bilinqualism rose in every province. Over half the gain has been among people whose mother tongue is English. The number of bilingual people among them increased by more than 407,000 or $58 \%$. At the same time, the total number whose mother tongue was English rose just $15^{\circ} \%$.

In most provinces, among persons whose mother tongue is French, the 30 or over age group has a margınally higher rate of bilingualism than the 15-29 year olds. Outside Quebec and New Brunswick. about 9 out of 10 who were 30 years or older reported they were bilingual. In Quebec, the proportion wis 4 in 10. and in New Brunswick, 7 in 10

## Wholesale Trade

in September, wholesale merchants' sales were $15.2^{\circ} \%$ above the levels recorded a year earlier. Following an morease of $8.5 \%$ in August. the gain in the current month was somewhat higher than the advance in cumulative sales for 1986 ( $12 \%$ ).


All major trade groups registered increased sales from a year earlier. The year-over-year change in each of these groups was up sharply from those recorded in August. The trade groups which had the most significant impact on the overall sales increase were machinery, equipment and supplies (17.8\%), and lumber and building materials $(28.3 \%)$.

Dealers in lumber and building materials have reported year-over-year increases in sales for 16 consecutive months. The average advance in 1985 was a moderate $4.5^{\circ}$, as sales declined on a year-over-year basis for the first five months of the year. Cumulative sales for January to September 1986 were up $24.8 \%$ from the same period of 1985. Inventories were $6.3 \%$ higher than they were a year earlier, but the high level of sales reduced the stock to sales ratio to 1.11:1 in September. This was its lowest level since in more than five years.

The sales improvement over September 1985 was evident in all regions. Advances ranged from $20.3 \%$ in Ontario, to $9.5 \%$ in the Atlantic provinces.
