The year-over-year advance in July ( $12.7 \%$ ) was slightly lower than the $13.2 \%$ increase in year-to date sales of wholesale merchants

## Decline in Non-residential Sector Pushes Dow datue of Building Permits

In July, the seasonally adjusted value of building permits issued by Canadian municipalities was $\$ 2.4$ billion, down $4.1 \%$ from June. This was the fourth consecutive drop in the value of building permits and it was entirely due to reduced intentions in the nonresidential sector.

The estimated value of residential building permits rose slightly in July. Despite three consecutive declines from April to June, the value of residential construction authorized has moved in a narrow range in the last four months (between $\$ 1,573$ and $\$ 1,599$ million). The level of residential construction based on the number of units remains high by historical standards and is close to the peak recorded in the late 1970s.

In July, residential permits issued totalled $\$ 1,586$ million. The single family dwelling sector rose $2.4 \%$

over June, while the multi-family dropped $2.2 \%$. Only Ontario and the Prairie provinces reported increases in the number of dwelling units approved during the month

The value of non-residential permits dropped $12.4^{6}$ from June, continuing the decline which began in May. The commercial component increased by $7.4 \%$, following a decline in June. Strong decreases were registered in the industrial and governmental sectors. Permits issued for industrial projects fell to $\$ 133$ million, a drop of $43.5 \%$. The governmental component fell $21.1 \%$ to $\$ 176$ million. Ontario was the only province reporting an increase in the value of non-residential permits in July.

## Financial Position of Property and Casualty Insurers Improves

The after-tax profits of property and casualty insurers continued to improve in the second quarter of 1987. Rising earned premiums and an underwriting gain were main features in the second quarter.

Property and casualty insurance firms reported an underwriting gain of $\$ 28$ million for the second quarter of 1987 , a significant improvement on the $\$ 74$ million loss reported for the same quarter of 1986 . This improvement resulted from an increase in earned premiums of $15 \%$ (to $\$ 2.8$ billion), while claims only rose $10 \%$ (to $\$ 1.9$ billion). Net investment income totalled $\$ 412$ million for the second quarter of 1987 , up $\$ 36$ million from the same period of 1986.

For the first six months of 1987, property and casualty insurers reported after-tax income of $\$ 765$ million, a sharp increase from the $\$ 502$ million reported for the same period of 1988

Canadian sales of investment funds continued to soar in the second quarter of 1987 . Following sales of $\$ 5.0$ billion in the first quarter, sales in the second quarter totalled $\$ 4.3$ billion. In the second quarter of 1986 , sales amounted to $\$ 2.9$ billion. Net sales, after redemptions, totalled $\$ 2.3$ billion in the quarter, up from $\$ 1.7$ billion in the second quarter of 1986 and $\$ 1.6$ billion in the first quarter of 1987.

Total assets of investment funds at market value were $\$ 30.8$ billion in the second quarter of 1987 , compared with $\$ 20.8$ billion in the second quarter of 1986 and $\$ 28$. I billion in the first quarter of 1987.

## Retail Sales Edge Down

Adjusted for seasonal fluctuations and the number 0! trading days, preliminary estimates indicate that retail sales totalled $\$ 12.8$ billion in July, down $0.9 \%$ from the previous month.

- This decline contrasts with the generally strong sales observed during the first six months of the year, especially in the second quarter.
- The overall decline in July was primarily attributable to decreases reported by the three largest sales groups: motor vehicle dealers ( $-2.8 \%$ ), combination stores $\{.3 .4 \%$ ) and department stores ( $-2.2 \%$ )
- The decrease registered by motor vehicle dealers followed an increase of $6.1 \%$ in June, while combination store sales declined following live consecutive monthly increases.

## Retail Trade



- Excluding new and used motor vehicle dealers, retail trade slipped $0.4 \%$ in July, following an increase of $1.6 \%$ in June.
- Actual sales for the first seven months of the year totalled $\$ 84.8$ billion, an increase of $9.1 \%$ over the corresponding period of 1986

## Department Store Sales Continue to Fluctuate

Adjusted for seasonal fluctuations and the number of trading days, department store sales totalled $\$ 1,063$ million in July, a decrease of $2.2 \%$ from the previous month. Department store sales have fluctuated significantly during the first seven months of 1987 and overall growth has been weak

Cumulative sales for the year (madjusted) totalled $\$ 6.4$ billion, up by only $1.2 \%$ over the same period of 1986. Sales by major department stores were down slightly on the year, while junior department stores, commonly described as discount operations, reported an increase of $4.5 \%$ in their year-to-date sales.

Seasonally adjusted department store stocks stood at $\$ 4.5$ billion in July, up $0.9 \%$ from June. This moderate increase followed a $0.2 \%$ decrease in June and 4 $2.4 \%$ increase in May. The ratio of inventories to sales

## CPI Registers Marginal Increase

The all-items consumer price index (1981=100) advanced by $0.1 \%$ between July and August, attaining a level of 139.3. This was the smallest monthly increase since December 1986. Measures of the annual rate of price change also support an overall decelerating trend. The year-over-year change between Augusi 1986 and 1987 was $4.5 \%$, down sonewhat firom the rate of $4.7 \%$ posted for the 12 -month period ending in July. Even more notable was the slowing of the compound annual rate of change to $4.7 \%$ for the May to August period from $6.6 \%$ in the April to July period. This rate is based on seasonally adjusted levels over the latest three-month period.

Five of the seven major component indexes advanced in August, with the largest impact coming from the clothing index. A decrease in the food index moderated the affect of rising clothing prices on the overall index.

The elothing index posted a gain of $1.5 \%$ with the arrival of new fall lines and the discontinuation of July promotions. Increases included women's dresses, slacks, skirts, blouses and footwear, and men's suits, shirts, socks and briefs.

The food index continued to moderate in August, dropping $1.0 \%$. This index had posted an increase of $0.2 \%$ in July, following much larger advances in the preceding two months. Fresh vegetable prices recorded a drop of $27.8 \%$ and fresh fruit a smaller decline of $3.5 \%$. August is normally the peak domestic supply period for fresh vegetables, but the very large price decrease was the result of a particularly good harvest. Together the decline in prices for vegetables and fruit more than offset increases in prices of fresh meats, fish, dairy products, pasta and non-alcoholic beverages.

## Wholesale Trade Rises 12.7\%

In .July, wholesale merchants' sales were up $12.7 \%$ over the same month a year earlier. The advance in the current month was slightly lower than the change in year-to-date sales. Cumulative sales for the first seven months of 1987 were $13.2 \%$ higher than in 1986.

The trade groups having the most significant impact on the overall advance in sales included wholesalers of electrical and non-electrical machinery, equipment and supplies who recorded a sales increase of $27.6 \%$ from July 1986. Food wholesalers ( $13.6 \%$ ) and Iumber and building materials merchants ( $8.9 \%$ ) also registered significant year-over-year advances. However, the advance reported for lumber and building materials was the smallest increase in 1987. The increase recorded by motor vehicle and accessories wholesalers (2.9\%) was also the lowest to date in 1987.

Increases in wholesale trade were posted in all regions in July, ranging from $20.7 \%$ in the Prairies to $8.8 \%$ in Quebec. The advance in the Prairies was the largest year-over-year advance recorded since prior to the recession. This advance was widespread, with many of the major trade groups reporting increases.

## A Weekly Review

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
