#### **OVERVIEW**

## ■ Shipments and Unfilled Orders Continue to Decline

Manufacturing shipments declined by 0.3% in February, following sharper decreases in the previous three months. Unfilled orders fell 1.4%, the seventh straight drop.

#### International Trade Reflects Recession

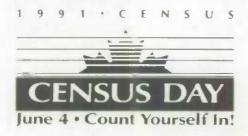
Substantial decreases for exports and imports in February were consistent with the recession in Canada and the United States.

#### Number of Foreign Visitors Maintains Modest Rising Trend

In February, the number of foreign travellers on trips of one or more nights to Canada rose 3.3%, after a 2.4% drop in January. This continues the modest upward trend started in the last months of 1990.

## Farm Product Price Index Edges Up

The Farm Product Price Index rose by 0.7% in February, after maintaining a downward trend since July 1990. Both the crops and the livestock and animal products indexes rose.



#### Shipments and Unfilled Orders Continue to Decline

In February, shipments declined by 0.3% to \$23.1 billion. This followed sharper decreases in the previous three months. Decreases in the transportation equipment and paper and allied product industries were partly offset by increases in wood and fabricated metal industries.

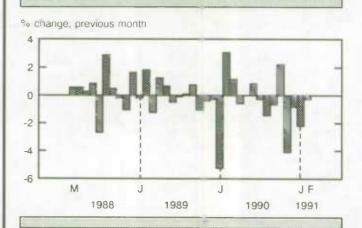
Inventories decreased by 0.5% to \$36.6 billion, largely due to a second straight major decline in refined petroleum and coal industries.

The inventories to shipments ratio remained at 1.59, much above the low of 1.49 in July.

Unfilled orders fell 1.4% to \$26.1 billion. This represented a cumulative drop of 6.1% from the level in May 1990. An increase in machinery industries was more than offset by decreases in transportation equipment, primary metals and electrical and electronic products industries.

A 1.2% drop for new orders contributed to a cumulative decline of 7.3% from October.

#### **International Trade Reflects Recession**

Total merchandise exports dropped by 5.2% to \$11.1 billion in February. The largest decline occurred in the automotive products sector. As a result of temporary plant shutdowns in February, car exports fell by 31.5% to \$759 million, their lowest level since September 1983. Crude petroleum exports also fell substantially (-37.7%) as a result of lower prices.

Imports dropped by 8.7% to \$10.5 billion. Car imports plunged by 46.3%, almost offsetting the increases registered in December and January. This confirms that January figures were

abnormally high as a result of the introduction of the GST and the elimination of the FST. Imports of parts decreased by 8.8%, primarily due to plant shutdowns in February.

With imports declining more than exports, the merchandise trade surplus for February was almost \$400 million higher than in January, reaching \$626 million.

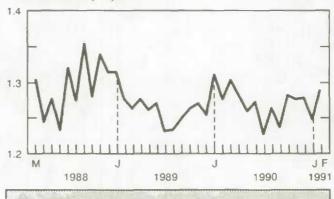
#### Number of Foreign Visitors Maintains Modest Rising Trend

In February, the number of foreign travellers on trips of one or more nights to Canada rose 3.3%, after a 2.4% drop in January. This continues the modest upward trend started in the last months of 1990. Trips by residents of the United States increased by 3.3%, after two monthly declines. The number of visitors from countries other than the United States rose by 3.4%, a second strong increase in three months.

Overnight international trips by Canadian residents were slightly below the previous month (-0.1%). The last three consecutive monthly declines have contributed to reverse the upward trend in the number of visitors started in the beginning of 1987. Trips to countries other than the United States registered a second straight sharp plunge (-10.4%), while the number of Canadians travelling to the United States rose 1.7%, after two monthly declines.

# Farm Product Price Index Edges Up

The Farm Product Price Index rose by 0.7% in February, after maintaining a downward trend since July 1990.

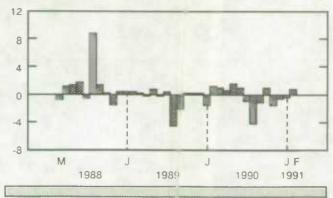
The crops index was up 0.8%. The cereal component increased by 1.1% due to higher prices for wheat, barley and corn in most provinces. Potato prices rose by 5.4%, the second increase following eight monthly decreases. The oilseeds component fell 0.3% to its lowest level since December 1987.

The livestock and animal products index increased by 0.7%. The hogs component rose 8.4% after following a downward trend since June 1990. The cattle component declined 1.4%.

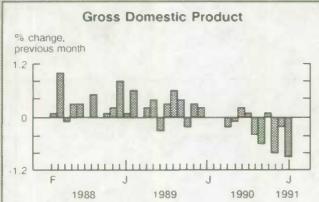

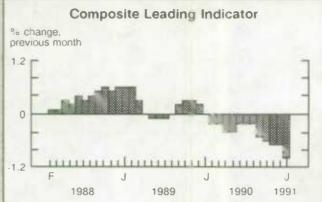

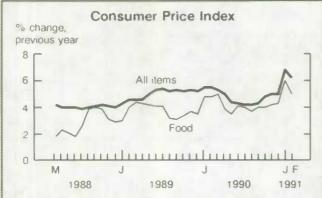
#### **CURRENT TRENDS**



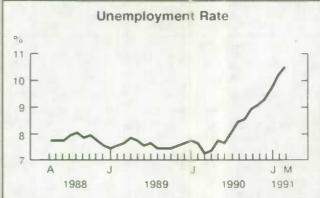
Real Gross Domestic Product at factor cost dropped by 0.9% in January. This was the sharpest monthly drop since the start of the recession.



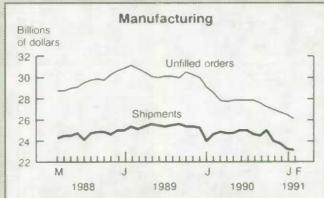
In January, the composite leading indicator fell by 1.0%, the steepest drop since the indicator started declining twelve months ago.



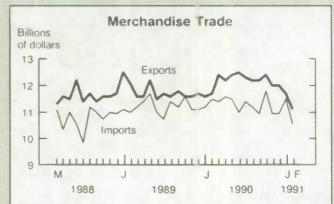
After a large increase in January following the introduction of the Goods and Service Tax, the allitems Consumer Price Index for Canada remained unchanged in February.



In March, the unemployment rate rose to 10.5%, as a result of increased participation in the labour force.
