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# 1. Travel Between Canada, The United States and Other Countries 

Receipts from residents of the United States travelling in Canada in the January-September period are estimated at $\$ 982$ million, up $58 \%$ from the corresponding 1966 total of $\$ 622$ million. Substantial gains were recorded in the number of entries, particularly for bus and plane after the opening of Expo. The various centennial celebrations across Canada as well as the Pan American games in Winnipeg played a part in attracting numerous visitors to Canada from other countries. Receipts from residents of countries other than the United States are estimated at $\$ 125$ million, a substantial increase of $\$ 35$ million or $39 \%$ more than during the January-September period of 1966.

Payments by Canadians travelling in the United States during the nine-month period are estimated at $\$ 512 \mathrm{million}$, a decrease of $\$ 13 \mathrm{million}$ when compared with the previous year. It is possible that the special events which attracted visitors from other countries may have influenced Canadians to remain in Canada this year. This levelling off represents a distinct break in the pattern of the past few years which had been showing a substantial upward trend each year. Payments for travel to overseas countries are estimated at $\$ 213$ million, down $\$ 7$ million or $3 \%$ under the corresponding 1966 period.

Industry Selling Price Indexes In 31 manufacturing industries, ( $1956=100$ ) industry selling nrice indezes were higher in December than in November, 2 more than the 29 increasus recorded in the OctoberNovember period. The industry indexes which declined numbered 18 in Docember, 2 less than the 20 decreases recorded in the previous month. Of the 102 industries 53 were unchanged, the same number as recorded for November.

The average of the 102 industry indexes in December was 115.9 , up slightly from the November average of 115.6 . The median was 115.0 , unchanged from the previous month.
*4. General Wholesale Index The general wholesale index ( $1935=100$ ) rose $0.7 \%$ in December to 266.8 from the November index of 264.9 , and was $2.2 \%$ higher than the December 1966 index of 261.0 . Six of the eight major group indexes advanced while one declined. The remaining one, the non-metallic minerals products group index was unchanged at 200.7 . The non-ferrous metals products group index rose $3.6 \%$ in December to 255.6 from the November index of 246.7 on price increases for copper and its products and silver. A rise of $1.2 \%$ to 216.8 from 214.2 in the chemical products group index reflected higher prices for soaps and detergents, and organic chemicals. The animal products group index moved up $0.7 \%$ to 292.4 from 290.4 in response to price increases for livestock, fishery products, and eggs. An advance of $0.5 \%$ to 257.0 from 255.6 in the textile products group index was attributable to price increases for raw cotton, and worsted and wool cloth.

The wood products group index moved up $0.5 \%$ to 351.9 from 350.2 on higher prices for cedar, and fir. The vegetable products group index advanced $0.4 \%$ to 230.0 from 229.0 on price increases for unmanufactured tobacco, grains, and bakery products. The iron products group index declined slightly to 273.9 from 274.3 .

*6. Manufacturers' Shipments, Inventories and Orders

Manufacturers' shipments in November at an estimated value of $\$ 3,306,046,000$ were up $0.7 \%$ over the revised October estimate of $\$ 3,284,031,000$
and $1.3 \%$ higher than the November 1966 estimate of $\$ 3,264,735,000$, according to an advance release of data that will be contained in the November issue of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics report "Inventories, Shipments and Orders in Manufacturing Industries". Shipments for the first eleven months of 1967 at an estimated value of $\$ 34,327,601,000$ were $2.1 \%$ higher than the estimated value of $\$ 33,615,701,000$ for the same period in 1966. Seasonally adjusted shipments in November were $1.5 \%$ higher than in October.

Total inventory owned by manufacturers in November was estimated at $\$ 6,722,118,000$, up fractionally over the revised October estimate of $\$ 6,710,920,000$ and $3.0 \%$ higher than the November 1966 estimate of $\$ 6,524,105,000$. Total inventory held also increased fractionally in November 1967 as compared with the revised October estimate but was $4.3 \%$ higher than the same month in 1966 . The ratio of total inventory owned to shipments was 2.03 in November, 2.04 in October and 2.00 in November 1966. The finished products to shipments ratio in November at 0.74 was the same as October. In November 1966, it was 0.70. Seasonally adjusted total inventory held increased $0.7 \%$ from the revised previous month with a $1.4 \%$ increase in goods in process, a $1.1 \%$ increase in finished products and a fractional decrease of $0.2 \%$ in raw materials.

New orders in November were estimated at $\$ 3,278,242,000$, a decrease of $0.9 \%$ from the revised October estimate of $\$ 3,308,067,000$ but $0.9 \%$ higher than the estimated value of $\$ 3,250,116,000$ in October 1966. Unfilled orders estimated at $\$ 3,714,473,000$ showed a slight decrease of $0.7 \%$ from the revised October estimate of $\$ 3,742,277,000$ but were $4.0 \%$ higher than the October 1966 estimate of $\$ 3,572,794,000$. Seasonally adjusted new orders estimated at $\$ 3,147,100,000$ were $1.0 \%$ lower than the revised October estimate of $\$ 3,177,900,000$ while unfilled orders seasonally adjusted, at $\$ 3,790,700,000$ were $0.6 \%$ lower than the revised October estimate of $\$ 3,813,200,000$.

Provincial Shipments Manufacturers' shipments were $0.7 \%$ higher in November 1967 as compared to the revised October estimate with most of the increase centred in Ontario. Ontario shipments increased by $\$ 51,784,000$ while Newfoundland and New Brunswick had slight increases of $\$ 637,000$ and $\$ 372,000$ respectively. All the other listed provinces showed minor decreases ranging from $\$ 11,577,000$ in Quebec to $\$ 1,215,000$ in Manitoba.

All provinces listed except Newfoundland and Saskatchewan showed increases for the first eleven months of 1967 as compared with the same period in 1966 . Increases ranged from $0.8 \%$ in Quebec to $5.1 \%$ in Alberta.

Veneers and Plywoods November shipments of veneers were down $35 \%$ to $110,660,000$ square feet from $169,000,000$ in November 1966 and production dropped $20 \%$ to $133,156,000$ square feet from $167,032,000$. Plywood shipments were down $1 \%$ to $171,663,000$ square feet from $173,867,000$ while production increased $1 \%$ to $189,664,000$ square feet from $188,289,000$. Stocks of veneers were up $45 \%$ in November to $202,167,000$ square feet from $139,106,000$ in the 1966 month and stocks of plywoods dropped $1 \%$ to $188,065,000$ square feet from $190,003,000$.
9. Steel Warehousing November sales by firms considered to account for approximately $90 \%$ of the steel warehousing business were as follows: concrete reinforcing bars, 5,319 tons ( 6,393 in the 1966 month); other hot rolled bars, 12,566 (11,954); plates, 19,448 (19,649); sheet and strip, 24,934 (21,938); galvanized sheet and strip, ternplate, 9,916 (9,182); heavy structural beams, 9,663 (11,667); bar size structural shapes, 6,157 (4,935); other structural shapes, 8,246 (9,155).

Stocks on hand at November 30 totalled $452,598,000$ feet board measure.
11. Iron Castings and Cast Iron Pipes and Fittings Producers' shipments of iron castings, pipe and fittings increased $5.4 \%$ in November to 67,896 tons from 64,312 in the 1966 month and during the cumulative period declined to 661,860 tons in 1967 from 710,935 in the previous year.
12. Soaps and Synthetic Detergents Factory shipments of hard soaps and synthetic detergents during November valued at $\$ 8,857,778$, were down $15.5 \%$ from the November 1966 value of $\$ 9,298,267$. During the cumulative period 1967 shipments were valued at $\$ 107,754,230$ as compared to $\$ 104,400,102$ in 1966.
*13. Steel Ingots Steel ingot production during the week ended January 20 totalled 199, 173 tons, an $0.6 \%$ increase from the preceding week's total of 198,056 tons. Output during the comparable 1967 week was 143,438 tons. The index of production, based on the average weekly output during 1957-1959 of 96,108 equalling 100, was 207 in the current week, 206 a week earlier, 149 one year ago.
*14. Sawmills in British Columbia Production of lumber and ties of sawmills in British Columbia totalled 556,000 feet board measure in November 1967 compared with 604,200 in the 1966 month. During the cumulative period production decreased to $6,814,900$ in 1967 from $6,877,900$ during the previous year period.

*15. Statistics of Private Trade Schools Some 316 private trade schools reported over 15,000 enrolments in full-time day" classes during the school year 1965-66. For the same period over 16,000 students received part-time instruction in these institutions during the evening hours. An additional 19,000 Canadians received vocational training through correspondence courses conducted by these schools and by eight American schools registered in Canada. This information is contained in a DBS four-page report, Statistics of Private Trade Schools, 1965-66, Catalogue No. 81-214, showing individual enrolments by sex and course specialization for each of the provinces.
*16. Staff in Teacher Training Institutions A preliminary count of regular and visiting staff in all Canadian teacher-
training institutions (normal schools, teachers' colleges, and university faculties of education) for the current academic year, 1967-68, yields a total of 3,409. The following breakdown shows the figures for 40 Engilsh-language and 46 French-language institutions, by regular and visiting, full-time and part-time staff.

18. Forest Products from Census-farm Woodlots

The 1966 Census of Agriculture special bulletin "Forest Products from Census-farm Woodlots" shows a sharp reduction in the production of forest products from census-farm woodlots between 1960 and 1965. Fuelwood cut dropped from 1,721,313 cords in 1960 to 869,897 cords in 1965 a decrease of $49.5 \%$. During the same interval, pulpwood cut from census-farm woodlots dropped from 843,675 cords to 710,058 cords, a decrease of $15.8 \%$ and logs cut dropped $29.2 \%$ from 291,329 thousand board feet in 1960 to 206,211 thousand board feet in 1965.

There were 430,522 census-farms enumerated in the 1966 Census. Of those, 82,983 or $19.3 \%$ reported forest products cut or sold, but only 28,786 or $6.7 \%$ of the total number reported sales of forest products. The special bulletin includes data on forest products cut and sold for provinces and counties as obtained from the 1966 Census.

## BUSINESS

19. Credit Statistics Higher balances outstanding were reported at the end of September compared to the corresponding 1966 date for small loan companies cash loans, small loan companies instalment credit, department stores, furniture, appliance and radio stores, chartered banks personal home improvement loans and other bank personal loans. Sales finance companies for consumer and comercial goods and chartered banks fully secured personal loans were down.

End-of-September balances outstanding were: sales finance companies consumer goods, $\$ 1,183,000,000(\$ 1,225,000,000$ at end-of-September 1966); sales finance companies commercial goods, $\$ 658,000,000(\$ 678,000,000)$; small loan companies cash loans, $\$ 1,173,000,000(\$ 1,063,000,000)$; small loan companies instalment credit, $\$ 73,000,000$ ( $\$ 72,000,000$ ); department stores, $\$ 527,000,000(\$ 523,000,000)$; furniture, appliance and radio stores, $\$ 209,000,000(\$ 204,000,000)$; chartered banks fully secured personal loans, $\$ 514,000,000$ ( $\$ 521,000,000$ ); chartered banks home improvement loans, $\$ 77,000,000(\$ 75,000,000)$; chartered banks other loans, $\$ 2,808,000,000(\$ 2,370,000,000)$.

## HOSPITALS

## 20. Hospitals and Related Institutions and Facilities A complete listing of all

 hospitals, related institutions and facilities in operation in Canada as at January 1,1968 , is contained in the publication, "List of Canadian Hospitals and Related Institutions and Facilities". Hospitals are listed alphabetically according to location and are identified as to category (public, private, federal), type of service (general, chronic, convalescent, rehabilitation, mental, tuberculosis), type of ownership and rated bed capacity. Related institutions are iisted in the same way and include infimaries, rest homes, homes for the aged, blind or senile. Facilities providing non-hospital insured services according to the provincial hospital insurance plans are presented in a separate list and include Red Cross blood depots, provincial laboratories and cancer clinics. Summary tables included in the report show that there were 1,421 hospitals with 209,694 beds, and 1,134 related institutions with 61,513 beds in operation at January 1, 1968.*21. Shipping Statistics Cargo handled in international seaborne shipping at Canadian ports during October 1967 declined slightly to $15,201,634$ tons from $15,258,623$ tons handled in the corresponding month of 1966 , according to an advance release of data that will be contained in the October issue of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics report "Shipping Statistics". Loadings during the month decreased by $6,0 \%$ to $8,887,937$ tons from $9,451,334$ tons in October 1966 while unloadings increased by $8.7 \%$ to $6,313,697$ tons from $5,807,289$ tons.

During October the commodities loaded in greatest volume were: iron ore, $4,953,862$ tons ( $4,422,119$ tons in October 1966); wheat, 602,769 tons ( $1,660,402$ ); gypsum, 348,351 tons ( 671,030 ); lumber and timber, 333,846 tons ( 246,741 ); and newsprint paper, 315,364 tons $(339,821)$. The commodities unloaded in greatest volume were: bituminous coal, $2,199,701$ tons ( $1,771,881$ tons in October 1966); fuel oil, 976,740 tons ( 829,017 ); crude petroleum, 789,301 tons ( 521,231 ); iron ore, 457,603 tons ( 636,729 ); and alumina and bauxite ore, 337,680 tons ( 406,734 ).

Canadian ports handing the largest volume of freight during October were: Sept-Iles, 3,115,941 tons (2,603,949 tons in October 1966); Montreal, 1,163,058 tons, (1,404,298); Vancouver, $1,149,330$ tons ( 861,812 ); Port Cartier, $1,123,685$ tons ( $1,045,908$ ); and Hamilton, 1,047,093 tons ( $1,049,591$ ).
22. Carloadings Carloadings during the tirst week of 1968 declined $16.6 \%$ from the previous year period. Wheat, pulpwood, and miscellaneous carload comodities were significant among commodity classes requiring fewer railway cars in Canada during the period under review, while iron ore and automobiles, auto trucks and parts registered increases. Piggyback carloadings during the first seven days of 1968 totalled 2,253 cars, down $13.4 \%$ from the same period of 1967.

H OTELS
*23. Hotels with 76 rooms or more
Receipts of hotels with 76 rooms or more for 1966 were $\$ 311,120,500$ compared with $\$ 276,494,100$
for 1965 , an increase of $12.5 \%$. Recelpts of these hotels in the various regions were as follows: Atlantic Provinces $\$ 13,667,300$ (for $1965 \$ 11,837,800$ ), Quebec, $\$ 85,631,600(\$ 75,631,400)$, Ontario $\$ 110,778,400(\$ 100,110,900)$, Prairie Provinces $\$ 49,852,100(\$ 45,373,400)$ and British Columbia $\$ 51,191,200(\$ 43,540,600)$. This is an advance release of figures to be included in the Dominion Bureau of Statistics annual report entitled Hotels.

## RESTAURANT

24. Restaurant Statistics Estimated restaurant receipts totalled $\$ 88,664,000$ in November 1967, an increase of $1.4 \%$ over the 1966 month. Of the total sales, chain businesses received $\$ 6,406,000$ and independent businesses $\$ 82,257,000$. In the January-to-November period, total receipts amounted to $\$ 1,018,219,000$, an increase of $4.6 \%$ over the sales of the same period in 1966. Chain business recelpts amounted to $\$ 73,116,000$ and independent business receipts to $\$ 945,012,000$.

## AGRICULTURE \& FOOD

*25. Process Cheese Production of process cheese decreased during December 1967 by $13.6 \%$ to $6,849,442$ pounds from $7,930,969$ in December 1966. Production for the twelve months ended December 31, however, was up $1.3 \%$ to $85,430,047$ from $84,361,338$ pounds. Stocks on hand at December 31 totalled 6,840,305 pounds, up $28.8 \%$ from the 1966 figure of $5,309,626$.

Grain Milling Statistics Output of wheat flour in Canada for November 1967 amounted to $3,188,000$ hundredweight, down $1 \%$ from the October 1967 output of $3,229,000$ hundredweight, $18 \%$ lower than November $1966^{\prime}$ s total of $3,895,000$ hundredweight and $16 \%$ below the ten-year (1957-66) average production for November of $3,775,000$ hundredweight. Preliminary customs returns for October show wheat flour exports amounted to 796,000 hundredweight, $21 \%$ lower than the 1,011,000 exported in September and $48 \%$ below the adjusted October 1966 total of 1,544,000.
*28. Leather Footwear November production of leather footwear amounted to $4,334,517$ pairs, up $0.7 \%$ from the 1966 month total of 4,304,874. Production of men's,boy's and youths' was down $5.5 \%$ to $1,301,081$ in the 1967 month from $1,377,300$ in November 1966 ; women's, growing girls' and misses', up $4.7 \%$ to $2,535,464$ pairs from $2,422,550$ and children's, little gent's, babies' and infants, down $1.4 \%$ to 497,972 pairs from 505,024.

30. Fluid Milk Sales Sales of standard, special and two per cent milk, excluding skim milk, buttermilk and chocolate drink, totalled 131,201,000 quarts in November, $2 \%$ higher than the corresponding 1966 total and during the January-November period amounted to $1,431,072,000$ quarts, $2 \%$ over the 1966 eleven-month total.
*31. Dry Skim Milk Powder Production of dry skim milk powder in containers up to and including 24 pounds totalled $2,675,413$ pounds in December, down $10.0 \%$ from the 1966 month total of $2,974,192$. During the year 1967 production rose $4.7 \%$ to $38,349,780$ pounds from $36,637,510$. Stocks on hand at December 31 totalled $4,766,145$ pounds, up $37.8 \%$ from $1966^{\prime}$ s December 31 total of 3,458,074.

C O N S TRUCTION
32. Building Permits Building permits for 14,509 dwelling units were issued in October compared with 12,620 in the 1966 month. During the cumulative period 141,421 were issued in 1967 against 114,836 in 1966. Value of residential and non-residential construction during the month totalled $\$ 386,888,000$ in 1967 and $\$ 333,773,000$ in 1966 and during the January-October period amounted to $\$ 3,391,387,000$ in 1967 against $\$ 3,174,176,000$ in the previous year.
33. New Residential Construction Construction starts in centres of 10,000 popucompared to 12,316 in the 1966 month. In the January-November period starts rose to 123,097 in 1967 from 99,330 in 1966. November completions totalled 12,616. In the eleven-month period completions totalled 110,399 as compared to 124,031 in 1966. Units under construction at November 301967 numbered 83,707 against 73,093 at the 1966 date.

Retail Trade Retail sales in 1965, revised for births and deaths in the retailing sector, amounted to $\$ 20,954,017,000-$ according to an advance release of data which will be published shortly in the Dominion Bureau of Statistics report, "Retail Trade, 1965" (Catalogue No. 63-209). Of this total, independent stores accounted for $\$ 14,217,420,000(67.9 \%$ ) and chain stores $\$ 6,736,597,000$ (32.1\%) . Grocery and combination stores continued to dominate the retail field, with sales of $\$ 4,655,413,000$ during 1965. Automobile dealers reported sales of $\$ 3,847,000,000$ and department stores (which are now included in the chain store universe) contributed an additional $\$ 2,053,435,000$. Among the provinces, Ontario recorded total sales of $\$ 7,950,680,000$ in 1965 , while Quebec retailers accounted for $\$ 5,515,272,000$. Altogether, some $64 \%$ of Canadian retail sales were registered in the two central provinces.
36. Farm Implement and Equipment Sales

Estimated farm implement and equipment sales in the January-November period,' (valued at wholesale price and including repair parts) increased $0.4 \%$ to $\$ 459,189,000$ from $\$ 457,453,000$. Value of repair parts sales at $\$ 59,359,000$, was $1.4 \%$ higher than the 1966 eleven-month total of $\$ 58,553,000$.
37. Wholesale Trade Canadian wholesale trade during November, estimated at $\$ 1,128,679,000$, was up $4.7 \%$ over the November 1966 total of $\$ 1,077,537,000$. Sales were greater in 12 of 18 specified trades with increases ranging from $0.2 \%$ in other textile and cloth:ng accessories to $10.0 \%$ in commercial, institutional and service equipment and supplies. Decreases in the remain:ng six trades ranged from $0.5 \%$ in farm machincry to $5.8 \%$ in meat and dairy products.

During the January-November period sales rose $4.1 \%$ to $\$ 12,352,677,000$ from $\$ 11,864,033,000$ in 1966 period. Sixteen of the 18 specified trades showed increases. These ranged from $1.0 \%$ in industrial and transportation equjpment and supplies to $14.5 \%$ in commercial, institutional and service equipment and supplies. Sales in the remaining two trades, meat and dairy products and coal and coke, declined $3.2 \%$ and $3.5 \%$ respectively.
