ECONOMIC CONDITIONS IN SEPTEMBER

The main factors indicating the trend of economic conditions recorded an increase in September over the same month of last year. The index of the physical volume of business was 205·3, a downward trend having been shown since the early months of 1944. With the termination of hostilities in August, the September index of production reflected the cessation of production for war purposes. The deposit liabilities of the banks were at a considerably higher level than in the same month last year, notwithstanding the recession from the preceding month. Speculative factors, including common stock prices and trading on the stock exchanges, recorded a considerable advance. The increase in wholesale prices was of minor proportions. High-grade bond prices were also at a somewhat higher level. The net result was that the average of the six factors showed an advance.

Expenditures

An increase was recorded in the new business obtained by the construction industry and by building permits during the first eight months of 1945 as compared with the same period of the preceding year. Contracts awarded were \$266·8 million, an increase of 27·6 per cent, while building permits recorded a gain of 27 per cent at \$84·1 million. The index of employment in the construction industry averaged 102·3, an increase of eight per cent over the same period of 1944.

The production of steel ingots indicative of the trend in the production of producers durables and munitions was 2,050,000 short tons in the 8 months of the present year against 1,994,000, a gain of 2·8 per cent. Pig iron production, on the other hand, showed a decline of 2·7 per cent.



Exports—

Merchandise exports in the first eight months amounted to \$2,332 million compared with \$2,310 million, an advance of 1 per cent. The domestic export trade in August was \$295·0 million compared with \$257·0 million in the same month of 1944. Commodity imports in August were considerably lower amounting to \$128·1 million against \$157·3 million. The 8-month total stood at \$1,066 million compared with \$1,170 million. The United States was the leading source of supply, August imports from that country amounting to \$96·8 million compared with \$138·3 million, and in the eight months \$818 million compared with \$917 million. The active balance of trade in the first eight months showed an increase of more than 11 per cent over the same period of 1944. The net exports of non-monetary gold in addition was \$65·5 million in the first 8 months against \$76·6 million in the same period of last year.


Trade and Government Expenditures—

Retail sales in the first seven months showed an increase of 7·7 per cent, while wholesale distribution advanced 9·5 per cent over the same period of 1944. Total government expenditures for the six months of the present fiscal year from April 1 to September 30 were \$2,194 million compared with \$2,294 million for the corresponding period of the preceding year. Receipts for the same period were \$1,294 million against \$1,398 million. War expenditures for the six months were \$1,023 million, a reduction from \$1,609 million in the first half of the previous fiscal year.

Purchasing Power

The general index of employment averaged 177·0 in the first eight months of 1945 compared with 181·9 in the same period of last year, a decline of 2·7 per cent. Increases were shown in logging, construction and trade, while declines were recorded in manufacturing and mining. Industrial employment generally in the Dominion showed a contraction at the beginning of August, constituting the first decline indicated at midsummer in the seven years since 1938. The establishments participating in the survey reported a release of 5,891 workers reducing their staffs by 0·3 per cent to 1,787,952 at the beginning of August. The decline took place largely in manufacturing in which there were important losses of a contra-seasonal character, some 16,000 workers being laid off by the cooperating plants. The movement in the non-manufacturing branch as a whole was upward, notably in construction, but the expansion in these sections was not sufficient to offset the contraction in manufacturing.

Salaries and Wages

The amounts expended in salaries and wages by the plants furnishing statistics in the eight leading industries on August 1, amounted to \$57·5 million giving an average of \$32.15 per employee. At July 1 the sum of nearly \$58 million had been disposed of by employers, the per capita figure being \$32.32. The average at August 1, 1944, had been \$31.63, while those on August 1, 1943 and 1942 had been \$31.06 and \$28.62, respectively. The moderate decline in the average earnings at the date under review was due in part to holidays, to curtailment in the amount of overtime worked, and to the fact that the largest reductions in employment took place in the heavy manufacturing industries where the earnings tend to be above average, while among the industries showing expansion, the additions were generally of lower-paid workers. In the last 12 months, there have been declines of 3·5 per cent in the index of payrolls, and of five per cent in the index of employment, but the average weekly earnings of the persons in recorded employment have risen by 1·6 per cent. The war has brought about particularly marked expansion in employment and payrolls, in factories in which the rate of acceleration in the period of observation has been decidedly greater than in the non-manufacturing industries. The manufacturers furnishing data at the beginning of August reported the distribution of \$35·2 million in salaries and wages, which was 1·8 per cent less than that of \$35·8 million expended by the same firms at July 1. The fact that the contraction in employment on August 1 took place to a considerable extent in the more highly paid heavy manufacturing industries also contributed to the larger loss in the total of salaries and wages than in that of employees.

Dividends and Interest—

The payment of dividends according to unofficial sources was at higher level, in the first ten months the increase having been 2·1 per cent. Interest payments by the Dominion Government amounted to \$172·9 million in the first six months of the present fiscal year against \$134·5 million in the same period of 1944.

Production

Agriculture—

Marketings of wheat from August 1 to October 11 were 78·7 million bushels compared with 91·5 million in the same period one year ago. Stocks of wheat at October 11 were placed at 206·8 million bushels showing a considerable decline from the 317·1 million bushels recorded on the same date last year. If the Canadian wheat supply is considered in addition to that of the United States, it is found that the total North American supply amounts to about 2,013 million bushels or about 165 million bushels less than the supply one year ago. As any further increase in wheat prices would aggravate the problems of

economic and political readjustment of the liberated areas to Canada's detriment in future trade with these areas, announcement was made of Canada's new wheat policy with respect to the maximum price for export and the establishment of long-term floor prices. The policy will be to offer wheat for sale for export overseas at prices not higher than the current export price of \$1.55 per bushel basis No. 1 Northern in store at Port Arthur, Fort William and Vancouver. During the five-year period ending July 31, 1950, the Canadian producers will receive not less than \$1.00 per bushel, basis No. 1 Northern on the authorized deliveries for each crop year. For the balance of 1945-46 crop year at least, the Canadian Wheat Board initial advance will continue at \$1.25 per bushel on the above mentioned basis. The wheat crop for all Canada in 1945 was placed at 321.4 million bushels in the first estimate of grain production issued by the Bureau. This crop is 114 million bushels less than that of 1944 and the average yield of 13.7 bushels per seeded acre is the lowest since 1937.

Forestry—

The output of the forestry industry was at a lower level in September than in the preceding month. The recession in the output of newsprint was of slight proportions after seasonal adjustment, a total of 269,963 tons against 287,028. The outward shipment of wood pulp and lumber retreated to a lower level, the export of planks and boards having been 157.9 million feet against 194.2 million. The British Columbia timber sealed in the latest available month was 261 million feet against 232 million in the preceding month. Tonnage of production and shipment of newsprint by Canadian mills during September continued above the level for that particular month since 1941. On the revised basis of capacity ratings, the production ratio for September was 80.8 per cent of capacity, this being the highest level for any one month since February, 1942, while shipments were at the rate of 82.9 p.c. or at the highest level for any month since March, 1942. Shipments by Canadian mills last month totalled 277,000 tons, being 24,000 more than the year ago comparison and the third consecutive increase in this comparison. It was announced that 300,000 tons of Swedish wood pulp have been shipped to the United States since June of the present year. It was forecast that more than 500,000 tons probably would be exported to the United States by the end of the year. Most of this pulp was prepared by the chemical process suitable for use in making kraft paper. Groundwood pulp, which together with sulphite chemical pulp is used in the manufacture of newsprint, is not being exported to the United States from Sweden in any appreciable quantity.

Shipping—

The number of vessels entering Canadian ports during the calendar year 1944 totalled 88,785 compared with 87,967 in 1943, and the increase was recorded in ships arriving from foreign ports. Cargoes of vessels loaded at Canadian ports for shipment to other countries in 1944 included 18.2 million tons of 2,000 pounds each and 805,000 tons of 40 cubic feet measurement. The tonnage of cargoes unloaded at Canadian ports during 1944 included 27.6 million tons weight and 102,554 tons measurement, a large percentage of which arrived from the United States.

Banking—

Notice deposits were \$2,833 million at the end of August compared with \$2,370 million on the same date of 1944. An increase was also recorded in demand deposits. The Dominion balances were at a lower level, the recession having been from \$293 million to \$255 million. Provincial balances were at a slightly higher level. The sum of the four classes rose from \$4,667 million to \$5,229 million. The money supply, consisting of deposits, notes and coin in the hands of the public, rose from \$5,680 million to \$6,361 million. Cash and cheque payments which had been \$6,454 million in August last year rose to \$6,761 million.

SITUATION ÉCONOMIQUE EN SEPTEMBRE

Les principaux facteurs traçant l'orientation de la situation économique accusent des avances en septembre comparativement au même mois de l'an dernier. L'indice du volume des affaires se place à 205·3 et tend à décliner depuis les premiers mois de 1944. Avec la fin des hostilités en août, l'indice de la production en septembre reflète la cessation de la production pour fins de guerre. Les dépôts aux banques touchent un niveau beaucoup plus élevé que celui du même mois de l'an dernier, malgré une diminution par rapport au mois précédent. Les facteurs spéculatifs, comprenant le cours des actions ordinaires et les transactions boursières, laissent voir des gains considérables. La hausse des prix de gros est peu importante. Les obligations de tout repos sont également un peu plus élevées. Le résultat net est que la moyenne des six facteurs accuse une avance.

Dépenses

Les nouvelles entreprises dans l'industrie de la construction et les permis de bâtir augmentent les huit premiers mois de 1945 comparativement à la même période de l'an dernier. Les contrats adjugés se chiffrent par \$266,800,000, augmentation de 27·6 p.c., tandis que les permis de bâtir s'élèvent à \$84,100,000 et augmentent de 27 p.c. L'indice de l'emploi dans l'industrie de la construction est en moyenne de 102·3, gain de 8 p.c. par rapport à la même période de 1944.

La production d'acier en lingots, indiquant la tendance de la production d'articles durables et de munitions, s'établit à 2,050,000 tonnes courtes les huit premiers mois de cette année, au regard de 1,994,000, augmentation de 2·8 p.c. Par ailleurs, la production de fonte en gueuse diminue de 2·7 p.c.

Exportations

Les exportations de marchandises atteignent un total de \$2,332,000,000 les huit premiers mois, comparativement à \$2,310,000,000, augmentation de 1 p.c. Le commerce d'exportation du Canada se place à \$295,000,000 en août contre \$257,000,000 le même mois de 1944. Les importations de denrées en août sont beaucoup plus faibles, s'établissant à \$128,100,000 contre \$157,300,000; le total des huit mois est de \$1,066,000,000 comparativement à \$1,170,000,000. Les Etats-Unis sont la principale source d'approvisionnement; les importations en provenance de ce pays se placent à \$96,800,000 en août cette année contre \$138,300,000 en août l'an dernier, et à \$818,000,000 les huit premiers mois comparativement à \$917,000,000 la même période de l'an dernier. La balance active du commerce au cours des huit premiers mois laisse voir une augmentation de plus de 11 p.c. par rapport à la même période de 1944. En outre, les exportations nettes d'or non monétaire s'élèvent à \$65,500,000 les huit premiers mois, à rapprocher de \$76,600,000 la même période de l'an dernier.

Dépenses commerciales et gouvernementales

Durant les sept premiers mois les ventes de détail augmentent de 7·7 p.c. et les ventes de gros de 9·5 p.c. comparativement à la même période de 1944. Les dépenses globales du gouvernement au cours du premier semestre de l'année financière courante, du 1er avril au 30 septembre, s'établissent à \$2,194,000,000 contre \$2,294,000,000 la période correspondante de l'année précédente. Les recettes durant la même période sont de \$1,294,900,000 au regard de \$1,398,-

000,000. Les dépenses de guerre pendant le semestre se placent à \$1,023,000,000 et diminuent par rapport à celles de \$1,609,000,000 le premier semestre de l'année financière précédente.

Pouvoir d'achat

L'indice général de l'emploiement est en moyenne de 177·0 les huit premiers mois de 1945 contre 181·9 la même période de l'an dernier, déclin de 2·7 p.c. Le nombre d'employés augmente dans l'abatage du bois, la construction et le commerce, tandis qu'il diminue dans les manufactures et les mines. L'emploiement industriel dans le Dominion accuse généralement une contraction au début d'août et décline pour la première fois à la mi-été depuis 1938. Les établissements collaborant au relevé déclarent avoir congédié 5,891 ouvriers et réduit leurs effectifs à 1,787,952 personnes ou de 0·3 p.c. au commencement d'août. Des déclins importants et hors de saison se produisent surtout dans les manufactures, qui mettent à pied quelque 16,000 ouvriers. Le nombre d'employés tend à augmenter dans l'ensemble des industries non manufacturières, notamment dans la construction, mais l'augmentation ne suffit pas à neutraliser la diminution dans les manufactures.

Salaires et gages

Les déboursés en salaires et gages des établissements fournissant des statistiques dans les huit principales industries le 1er août se chiffrent par \$57,500,000, ce qui donne une moyenne de \$32.15 par employé. Le 1er juillet, les employeurs avaient déboursé près de \$58,000,000 ou \$32.32 par employé. La moyenne était de \$31.63 le 1er août 1944, de \$31.06 le 1er août 1943 et de \$28.62 le 1er août 1942. Le déclin modéré des gains moyens le 1er août cette année est partiellement attribuable aux congés, à la diminution du surtemps et à ce que les plus fortes diminutions du nombre d'employés se produisent dans les industries manufacturières lourdes où les gains ont une tendance à être au-dessus de la moyenne, tandis que les industries où le nombre d'employés augmente embauchent généralement des ouvriers faiblement rémunérés. Au cours des douze derniers mois, l'indice des bordereaux de paye décline de 3·5 p.c. et l'indice de l'emploiement de 5 p.c., mais la moyenne des gains hebdomadaires des personnes comprises dans le relevé augmente de 1·6 p.c. La guerre a déterminé une augmentation particulièrement marquée de l'emploiement et des bordereaux de paye dans les fabriques, où le taux d'accélération durant la période observée a été nettement plus considérable que dans les industries non manufacturières. Les manufacturiers fournissant des données au début d'août déclarent avoir distribué \$35,200,000 en salaires et gages, soit 1·8 p.c. de moins que la somme de \$35,800,000 versée par les mêmes personnes le 1er juillet. La contraction considérable de l'emploiement le 1er août dans les industries manufacturières lourdes où les salaires sont le plus élevés contribue également à rendre la diminution des salaires et gages plus importante que celle du nombre d'employés.

Dividendes et intérêts

D'après des sources officieuses, les paiements de dividendes augmentent de 2·1 p.c. pendant les dix premiers mois. Les paiements d'intérêts par le gouvernement fédéral se chiffrent par \$172,900,000 le premier semestre de l'année financière courante, à rapprocher de \$134,,500,000 la même période de 1944.

Agriculture

Les arrivages de blé s'établissent à 78,700,000 boisseaux du 1er août au 11 octobre, à rapprocher de 91,500,000 la même période il y a un an. Les stocks de blé le 11 octobre se placent à 206,800,000 boisseaux, déclin considérable par rapport aux stocks de 317,100,000 la même date de l'an dernier. Si les approvisionnements de blé du Canada sont ajoutés à ceux des Etats-Unis, les approvisionnements globaux de l'Amérique du Nord s'élèvent à environ 2,013,000,000 de boisseaux ou 165,000,000 de moins qu'il y a un an. Comme une nouvelle augmentation des prix du blé aggraverait les problèmes du rajustement économique et politique des régions libérées au détriment du commerce futur du Canada avec ces régions, la nouvelle politique du blé du Canada a été annoncée

au sujet du prix maximum à l'exportation et de l'établissement de prix minimums à longue échéance. Cette politique consistera à offrir en vente du blé pour exportation outre-mer à des prix pas plus élevés que le prix courant à l'exportation de \$1.55 le boisseau, base n° 1 Nord en magasin à Port Arthur, Fort William et Vancouver. Au cours de la période de cinq ans se terminant le 31 juillet 1950, les producteurs canadiens recevront non moins de \$1.00 le boisseau, base n° 1 Nord, sur les livraisons autorisées pour chaque campagne.

Pour le reste de la campagne de 1945-46 au moins, l'avance initiale de la Commission canadienne du blé se continuera à \$1.25 le boisseau sur la base susmentionnée. La récolte de blé dans tout le Canada en 1945 est placée à 321,400,000 boisseaux, d'après la première estimation de la production de céréales publiée par le Bureau. Cette récolte est inférieure de 114,000,000 de boisseaux à celle de 1944 et le rendement moyen de 13.7 boisseaux par acreensemencé est le plus faible depuis 1937.

Industrie forestière

La production de l'industrie forestière en septembre est plus faible que le mois précédent. La diminution de la production de papier à journal est peu importante après ajustement pour la saison; elle est de 269,963 tonnes contre 287,028. Les expéditions de pulpe de bois et de bois d'œuvre rétrogradent, tandis que les exportations de madriers et planches se placent à 157,900,000 pieds comparativement à 194,200,000. En Colombie Britannique il se mesure 261,000,000 de pieds de bois le dernier mois connu, à rapprocher de 232,000,000 le mois précédent. La production et les expéditions de papier à journal par les moulins canadiens en septembre continuent d'être supérieures au niveau qu'elles ont atteint en ce mois particulier depuis 1941. La proportion de la production en septembre par rapport à la capacité établie est de 80.8 p.c., la plus élevée en tout mois depuis février 1942, tandis que les expéditions se font au taux de 82.9 p.c. et sont les plus considérables en tout mois depuis mars 1942. Les expéditions des moulins canadiens le mois dernier s'élèvent à 277,000 tonnes, soit 24,000 de plus que l'an dernier, et accusent une augmentation pour le troisième mois consécutif. Il a été annoncé que 300,000 tonnes de pulpe de bois de la Suède ont été expédiées aux Etats-Unis depuis juin de cette année. On prévoit que plus de 500,000 tonnes auront probablement été exportées aux Etats-Unis vers la fin de l'année. La majeure partie de cette pulpe est de la pulpe chimique qui convient à la fabrication du papier d'emballage fort. La pulpe mécanique, qui est employée à la fabrication du papier à journal, tout comme la pulpe sulfite, n'est pas exportée de la Suède aux Etats-Unis en quantité appréciable.

Industrie minière

La plupart des facteurs traçant l'orientation de la production minérale rétrogradent le dernier mois dont les statistiques sont connues. Les arrivages d'or à la Monnaie s'établissent à 192,735 onces fines en septembre contre 209,014 le mois précédent. Les expéditions d'argent des mines canadiennes, les exportations et les arrivages à la Monnaie laissent voir des déclins. La production canadienne d'or est de 2,923,000 onces fines en 1944, à rapprocher de 3,651,000 l'année précédente. La valeur passe de \$140,600,000 à \$112,500,000. La quantité d'or récupérée des minerais canadiens de toutes sortes l'an dernier est la plus faible depuis 1931 et reflète l'effort soutenu par une nation qui a connu plus de cinq ans de guerre totale. Plusieurs employés des mines d'or et de métaux communs sont entrés dans les divers services de l'armée, et la fabrication de certains outillages et matériaux nécessaires à la mise en valeur des nouvelles mines d'or ou à l'expansion des anciennes a été considérablement restreinte ou consacrée à des usages plus urgents.
