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ECONOMIC CONDITIONS IN APRIL




Economic activity, as measured by production indexes, showed a moderate increase in April for the second consecutive month. The general level of productive operations, however, was somewhat below that of the early months of 1944. The index of industrial employment was at a lower position during the first quarter than in the same period of last year. Wholesale prices were slightly stronger in April than in the preceding month but the fluctuations in the index have been remarkably small for the last eighteen months. The national income on a tentative footing, which had been \$2,965 million in the first four months of 1944, receded to \$2,906 million in the same period of the present year. The decline of 2.0 p.c. was mainly occasioned by lower levels in agriculture and manufactures.

Grain deliveries from farms in the Prairie Provinces dropped sharply after the first month of the year, the index in March having been 128.4 against 244.2 in the same month of 1944. Marketings of wheat during the present crop year to May 10 amounted to 294.6 million bushels compared with 226.6 million in the corresponding period of 1943-44. A slight increase was shown in deliveries of oats while other coarse grains were at a lower level. During the first eight months of the crop year, total exports of wheat and wheat flour amounted to 177 million bushels compared with 214 million bushels for the same period of the preceding crop year. The clearances overseas have been increased by about 25.5 million bushels but the decline in the exports to the United States has more than offset this gain. According to the returns received from farmers there will be very little change in the general acreage seeded to grain. It was indicated that the Prairie acreage of wheat would be 21,577,000. Canadian farmers indicated that they would seed 869,700 fewer acres to wheat this year than they did in 1944. The decrease in wheat acreage will be offset by an increase in the acreages to be seeded to oats, barley and flaxseed. The Grain Transportation Committee announced a program for handling a record volume of Canadian grain for export, including the movement of 250 million bushels of wheat in the next seven months. It was estimated that a movement of from 28 to 40 million bushels of grain a month through Canadian ports, and from 10 to 12 million bushels a month through United States ports will be required to feed the liberated countries of Europe, Great Britain and Ireland, Portugal, the Middle East and India.

During the first quarter of this year there was a wide increase in inspected slaughterings of cattle with a total of 413,000 head, being 44.7 p.c. greater than in the first three months of 1944. Hog slaughterings, on the other hand, contracted sharply with the 1,920,000 head being 31.6 p.c. less than in the same period one year ago. The index of livestock marketings on stockyards was 106.8 in April compared with 100.7 in the same month of last year. The increase in cattle marketed was from 62,500 to 73,126.

During the first four months of this year there was a satisfactory showing in the production of dairy products. Despite the lower level in milk production in some areas, especially the Prairie Provinces, there was an increase in volume in the three main categories. The output of butter was greater in all provinces except the Prairies. Chiefly due to sharp gains in Ontario and Alberta, the total increase in cheese production was 9.7 p.c.

Production of newsprint was 245,429 tons compared with 263,776 tons in the preceding month. The levels of last year, however, were exceeded by a considerable margin. The shipments of newsprint during April exceeded the production having been at the highest rate of capacity since October, 1942. It was announced that wood supplies will permit an overall increase of 5 or 6 p.c. in the production of newsprint by Canadian pulp and paper mills beginning with the third quarter of this year. The export of planks and boards was 134 million feet in April, about a third larger than in the same month of last year. The forestry industry is operating at a higher level than in the early months of 1944.

The shipment of fish to other countries showed an increase in March over the same month of the preceding year, operations being well maintained at the high level of last year. Higher prices for almost all types of furs raised the value of pelts taken by trappers or sold from fur farms during the year ended June 30, 1944 to a new high record of \$32,364,000, being an increase of 13.5 p.c. over the previous high point, recorded in the preceding season.

The index of mineral production showed increase in the latest month for which statistics are available. The levels of operations, due to shortage of labour, are considerably reduced from those of last year. Gold receipts at the Mint amounted to 208,217 fine ounces against 263,092 fine ounces in the same month of 1944. The Aluminium Company of Canada announced that it has received cancellation from the United States of more than half of a 250-million pound aluminum contract. The original contract has been reduced to 100 million pounds.

The index of the consumption of primary electric power was 154.2 in March against 150.1 in the preceding month. Production rose in the same comparison from 3,124 million kilowatt hours to 3,587 million. The increase in production over March, 1944 was limited to secondary power, the output of which increased from 246.0 million kilowatt hours to 640 million. Primary production, on the other hand, showed a decline of 10 p.c.

The index of manufacturing was maintained in April at the standing of 271.1 in March. The level for this year has been considerably below that of 1944. The index of employment in manufacturing also receded from 226.5 on March 1, 1944 to 214.3 on the same date of this year. The change in prices during the twelve months, both in finished products and raw materials, has been of very slight proportions. Wheat flour production by Canadian millers during March was slightly higher than in the preceding month and was at the second highest level so far in the current crop year. Production in the first quarter was considerably below that of the same period of last year. Cigarettes released in the first quarter were 3,338 million, an increase of 10.5 p.c. over the same period of last year. An increase of 6.2 p.c. was shown in cigars released. Production of leather footwear was 7.8 million pairs compared with 7.7 million in the first quarter of 1944.

Operations in Canadian cotton textile mills during April showed a contraction from March and were also a shade less than in the same month of 1944. Cotton openings amounted to 32,379 bales in April compared with 36,638 bales in March this year. Bale openings in the first four months of this year were at the lowest level since the outbreak of war.

The output of steel and iron showed an increase of 6.6 p.c. over the first quarter of 1944. It is estimated that the income originating in primary and secondary production was less in the first quarter of 1945 than in the same period of the preceding year.

The gross revenue of the Canadian Pacific Railway up to May 14 was \$111.6 million compared with \$112.5 million in the same period of last year. The revenues of Canadian railways during 1944 were larger than in any other year. Canadian lines of the Canadian National Railways during 1944 earned \$391.6 million compared with \$391.1 million in 1943. Operating revenues of

the Canadian Pacific Railways were \$320.3 million against \$299.0 million in the preceding year. Railway traffic recorded expansion in April, the tons loaded amounting to 8,408,000 against 8,335,000 in the same month of last year. Carloadings were 292,000 against 284,000 twelve months before. The record during the first quarter was lower than in the same period of last year.

Benefiting from one of the earliest seasons on record, steamers were able to carry a sharply increased volume of freight tonnage during April compared with the same period of 1944. Aggregate freight tonnage on all Canadian canals and through the United States locks at Sault Ste. Marie amounted to 11.2 million tons during the month, being an increase of 1.8 million tons or 18.8 p.c. compared with one year ago. The traffic in iron ore rose sharply while wheat showed a reduction. Other classes of transport were more active during the early months of the year resulting in a higher level of income originating in the transportation and communication division. Employment in trade outlets increased sharply over last year. The index for wholesale stores was 153 against 140.3 one year ago. The index of retail employment was 172.8, representing a gain of about 10 points over March of last year.

Current loans by the chartered banks at a total of \$1,067 million were off slightly compared with the beginning of March, but recorded a marked increase over the same date of 1944. Investment holdings rose from \$3,156 million to \$3,319 million. Sales of ordinary life insurance in Canada amounted to \$53,854,000 in March compared with \$54,366,000 in the same month of last year. The index of employment by financial corporations was 128.7 in March against 125.8 in the same month of last year. Service employment was at a higher level, the index rising from 196.8 to 199.0.

Dominion Government tax revenues from customs and excise, etc., for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1945, amounted to \$778.6 million, while income taxes amounted to \$1,555.8 million. Collections of taxes in April were \$152.0 million compared with \$165.6 million during the same period of 1944.

The end of the war in Europe will encourage expansion in the operations of the construction industry. Contracts awarded in the first four months of the year were \$78.6 million compared with \$83.7 million for the same period of 1944. The greatest handicap at the present time is a shortage of building materials and labour. While construction is under the Dominion system of control, an effort is being made to adjust the licences granted according to the availability of labour and materials. Number one priority is given to hospitals, with residential construction second and industrial building that will provide post-war employment in the third place.

The index of employment at the beginning of March was 89.2 against 85.3 in the same period of last year. The number of employees engaged in the production of durable goods which had been 663,880 on March 1, 1944, receded to 588,561 on the same date of this year. The classification includes metals, electrical apparatus, lumber and a few other industries many of which are engaged in the manufacture of munitions and other war supplies. Wheat stocks which had been 298.7 million bushels in May last year rose to 311.3 million bushels in the same month of the present year. The index of cold storage holdings, on the other hand, receded from 245 to 207. Despite the determined effort to move the largest possible amount of wheat to export positions, it does not now seem possible that the July carry-over will be less than 300 million bushels.

Exports of merchandise produced in Canada during April were valued at \$312 million compared with \$283 million in the same month last year. War supplies constituted a larger amount in April than one year ago. During the first four months, exports were valued at \$1,080 million compared with \$1,035 million in the same period of 1944. Imports in March were \$132.5 million against \$150.8 million in the same month of last year. Taking account of the net exports of non-monetary gold, the active balance of trade was \$184.7 million against \$139.2 million a year ago.

SITUATION ÉCONOMIQUE EN AVRIL

L'activité économique, mesurée d'après les indices de la production, s'accélére modérément en avril pour le deuxième mois consécutif. Toutefois, le niveau général des opérations productives est un peu inférieur à ce qu'il a été les premiers mois de 1944. L'indice de l'emploi industriel au cours du premier trimestre est plus bas que pendant la même période de l'an dernier. Les prix de gros se raffermissent légèrement en avril au regard du mois précédent, mais les fluctuations de l'indice ont été remarquablement peu importantes pendant les dix huit derniers mois. Le revenu national, provisoirement estimé à \$2,234,000,000 le premier trimestre de 1944, diminue à \$2,180,000,000 la même période de cette année; ce déclin de 2.4 p.c. est principalement attribuable au revenu moins considérable de l'agriculture et des manufactures.

Les livraisons de grain par les cultivateurs des Provinces des Prairies diminuent brusquement après le premier mois de l'année, l'indice en mars s'établissant à 128.4 contre 244.2 le même mois de 1944. Les arrivages de blé s'élèvent à 294,600,000 boisseaux du début de la campagne au 10 mai, comparativement à 226,600,000 la période correspondante de 1943-1944. Les arrivages d'avoine augmentent un peu, tandis que ceux d'autres grains secondaires diminuent. Durant les huit premiers mois de la campagne les exportations de blé et de farine de blé s'établissent à 177,000,000 de boisseaux, à rapprocher de 214,000,000 la même période de la campagne précédente. Les expéditions outre-mer augmentent d'environ 25,500,000 boisseaux, mais la diminution des exportations aux Etats-Unis absorbe plus que cette augmentation. D'après les rapports fournis par les cultivateurs, la superficie générale semée de grain accusera très peu de changement. Les emblavures de blé dans les Provinces des Prairies couvriront 21,577,000 acres. Les cultivateurs canadiens ont fait savoir qu'ils sèmeraient 869,700 acres de blé de moins cette année qu'en 1944. La diminution des emblavures de blé sera compensée par une augmentation de la superficie en avoine, orge et graine de lin. Le Comité du transport des grains a annoncé un programme visant à manutentionner une quantité sans précédent de grain canadien pour exportation, y compris le déplacement de 250,000,000 de boisseaux de blé les sept prochains mois. Il a été estimé qu'il faudra expédier de 28,000,000 à 40,000,000 de boisseaux de grain par mois par les ports canadiens et de 10,000,000 à 12,000,000 de boisseaux par les ports des Etats-Unis afin de nourrir les pays libérés d'Europe, la Grande-Bretagne et l'Irlande, le Portugal, le Moyen-Orient et l'Inde.

Les abatages inspectés de bêtes à cornes augmentent à 413,000 têtes le premier trimestre de cette année, soit de 44.7 p.c. au regard du premier trimestre de l'an dernier. Par ailleurs, les abatages de porcs diminuent brusquement à 1,920,000 têtes ou de 31.6 p.c. comparativement à la même période de l'an dernier. L'indice des arrivages de bestiaux aux enclos s'établit à 106.8 en avril contre 100.7 le même mois de l'an dernier; les arrivages de bovins augmentent à 73,126 comparativement à 62,500.

La fabrication de laitages est satisfaisante durant les quatre premiers mois de cette année. Bien que la production de lait soit plus faible en certaines régions, particulièrement dans les Provinces des Prairies, la fabrication des trois principaux produits laitiers augmente en volume. La production de beurre est plus grande dans toutes les provinces sauf dans celles des Prairies. La production globale de fromage augmente de 9.7 p.c., en raison surtout des gains importants en Ontario et en Alberta.

La production de papier à journal s'établit à 245,429 tonnes contre 263,776 le mois précédent, mais elle excède par une forte marge le niveau de l'an dernier. Les expéditions de papier à journal en avril surpassent la production et sont à leur plus haut niveau par rapport à la capacité de production depuis octobre 1942. Il a été annoncé que les approvisionnements de bois permettront aux pulperies et papeteries canadiennes d'augmenter de 5 à 6 p.c. en tout leur production de papier à journal à compter du troisième trimestre de cette année. Les exportations de madriers et planches s'établissent à 134,000,000 de pieds en avril, environ un tiers de plus que pendant le même mois de l'an dernier. L'industrie forestière fonctionne sur une plus haute échelle qu'au cours des premiers mois de 1944.

Les expéditions de poisson aux autres pays augmentent en mars comparativement au même mois de l'année précédente, les opérations se maintenant bien au niveau élevé de l'an dernier. La hausse des prix de la plupart des fourrures porte à \$32,364,000 la valeur des peaux d'animaux capturés par les trappeurs ou vendues par les fermes à fourrure pendant l'année terminée le 30 juin 1944; c'est une augmentation de 13.5 p.c. par rapport au sommet atteint la saison précédente.

La production minérale diminue le dernier mois dont les statistiques sont connues. Le niveau des opérations, en raison de la pénurie de main-d'œuvre, baisse considérablement comparativement à l'an dernier. Les arrivages d'or à la Monnaie se placent à 208,217 onces fines contre 263,092 le même mois de 1944. L'Aluminum Company of Canada a annoncé que les États-Unis avaient réduit de plus de la moitié, soit à 100,000,000 de livres, leur contrat original de 250,000,000 de livres d'aluminium.

L'indice de la consommation d'énergie électrique primaire s'établit à 154.2 en mars comparativement à 150.1 le mois précédent. Dans le même ordre de comparaison, la production augmente à 3,587,000,000 de kilowatt-heures contre 3,124,000,000. L'augmentation de la production par rapport à mars 1944 se limite à l'énergie secondaire, dont la production passe à 640,000,000 de kilowatt-heures contre 246,000,000. D'autre part, la production d'énergie primaire diminue de 10 p.c.

L'indice de la production manufacturière en avril excède celui de 271.1 en mars, mais il est bien inférieur à celui de 1944. L'indice de l'emploiement dans les manufactures recule également, de 226.5 le 1er mars 1944 à 214.3 la même date cette année. Les fluctuations des prix des produits ouvrés et des matières premières ont été très légères pendant les douze mois. En mars cette année la production de farine au Canada est un peu plus forte que le mois précédent et touche le deuxième plus haut niveau jusqu'ici durant la campagne courante; la production du premier trimestre est beaucoup moins considérable que celle de la même période de l'an dernier. Les dédouanements de cigarettes s'établissent à 3,338,000,000 le premier trimestre, augmentation de 10.5 p.c. sur la même période de l'an dernier. Les dédouanements de cigares augmentent de 6.2 p.c. La production de chaussures en cuir s'élève à 7,800,000 paires le premier trimestre de 1945 contre 7,700,000 la même période de 1944. En avril les opérations des filatures canadiennes de coton ralentissent comparativement à mars et sont un peu moins considérables que pendant le même mois de 1944. Il s'ouvre 32,379 balles de coton en avril contre 36,638 en mars cette année. Le nombre de balles ouvertes pendant les quatre premiers mois de cette année est à son plus bas niveau depuis le déclenchement de la guerre.

La production d'acier et de fonte augmente de 6.6 p.c. au regard du premier trimestre de 1944. Il est estimé que le revenu provenant de la production primaire et de la production secondaire durant le premier trimestre de 1945 est inférieur à ce qu'il a été au cours de la même période de l'année précédente.

Les recettes brutes du Pacifique Canadien s'établissent à \$111,600,000 du début de l'année au 14 mai, à rapprocher de \$112,500,000 la même période de l'an dernier. Les recettes des chemins de fer canadiens en 1944 sont plus con-

sidérables qu'en toute autre année. Les recettes des lignes canadiennes des Chemins de fer Nationaux du Canada s'élèvent à \$391,600,000 en 1944 contre \$391,100,000 en 1943. Les recettes d'exploitation du Pacifique Canadien s'établissent à \$320,300,000 comparativement à \$299,000,000 l'année précédente. Le trafic ferroviaire augmente en avril, les tonnes de marchandises chargées se plaçant à 8,408,000 au regard de 8,335,000 le même mois de l'an dernier. Les chargements s'élèvent à 292,000 wagons contre 284,000 il y a un an. Le total du premier trimestre est plus faible que celui de la même période de l'an dernier.

Comme la saison a été l'une des plus précoces de l'histoire, les vapeurs ont pu transporter en avril une quantité beaucoup plus considérable de marchandises que pendant la même période de 1944. Les marchandises passant par tous les canaux canadiens et par les écluses américaines à Sault-Sainte-Marie s'élèvent à 11,200,000 tonnes au cours du mois, augmentation de 1,800,000 tonnes ou de 18.8 p.c. comparativement à l'an dernier. Le transport du minerai de fer augmente vivement, tandis que celui du blé accuse une diminution. Le transport des autres produits est plus actif pendant les premiers mois de l'année; il en résulte que le revenu provenant du transport et des communications est à un niveau plus élevé. L'emploiement dans le commerce augmente brusquement au regard de l'an dernier. Dans les magasins de gros l'indice se place à 153 contre 140.3 il y a un an. L'indice de l'emploiement dans les magasins de détail s'établit à 172.8, gain d'environ 10 points par rapport à mars l'an dernier.

Les prêts courants, à \$1,067,000,000, diminuent légèrement comparativement au début de mars, mais ils laissent voir une augmentation marquée au regard de la même date de 1944. Les valeurs en portefeuille passe à \$3,319,000,000 contre \$3,156,000,000. Les ventes d'assurance-vie ordinaire au Canada s'établissent à \$53,854,000 en mars comparativement à \$54,366,000 le même mois de l'an dernier. L'indice de l'emploiement dans les corporations financières se place à 128.7 en mars au regard de 125.8 le même mois de l'an dernier. L'emploiement dans les services passe à 199.0 contre 196.8.

La douane et l'accise rapportent \$778,600,000 au gouvernement fédéral durant l'année fiscale terminée le 31 mars 1945 et l'impôt sur le revenu, \$1,555,800,000. La perception des taxes donne \$152,000,000 en avril contre \$165,600,000 le même mois de 1944.

La fin de la guerre en Europe favorisera une expansion des opérations de l'industrie de la construction. Les contrats adjugés durant les quatre premiers mois de l'année s'élèvent à \$78,600,000, à rapprocher de \$83,700,000 la même période de 1944. La plus grande entrave à l'heure actuelle est la pénurie de matériaux de construction et de main-d'œuvre. Bien que la construction soit assujettie à un système de contrôle fédéral, on s'efforce d'ajuster l'octroi des permis à la disponibilité de la main-d'œuvre et des matériaux. Priorité est accordée aux hôpitaux; la construction d'habitations vient en deuxième lieu; la construction d'industries qui fourniront de l'emploi après la guerre occupe le troisième rang.

Les exportations de marchandises canadiennes ont une valeur de \$312,000,000 en avril comparativement à \$283,000,000 le même mois de l'an dernier. Les fournitures de guerre exportées en avril cette année ont une plus grande valeur qu'en avril l'an dernier. Les exportations s'élèvent à \$1,080,000,000 les quatre premiers mois, à rapprocher de \$1,035,000,000 la même période de 1944. Les importations s'établissent à \$132,500,000 en mars contre \$150,800,000 le même mois de l'an dernier. Tenant compte des exportations nettes d'or non monétaire, la balance active du commerce est de \$184,700,000 au regard de \$139,200,000 il y a un an.

Les dépenses totales du gouvernement fédéral diminuent à \$584,000,000 les deux premiers mois de l'année civile courante, comparativement à \$696,000,000 la même période de l'an dernier. Les dépenses de guerre s'établissent à \$473,000,000 contre \$501,000,000 l'an dernier. Les dépenses occasionnées par l'aide mutuelle sont à un niveau beaucoup plus bas.
