


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More details on which data is available can be found in the following:

CANSIM Summary Reference Index (Annual with periodic amendments) – Free on request.

This index is a summary of the data in CANSIM. It provides a key to the Series Directory and is the first step in locating and ordering series from the CANSIM Main Base.

CANSIM Main Base Series Directory (Annual with periodic amendments) – \$30.

This Directory is a detailed guide to the data on the CANSIM Main Base. It gives the title, start date, source of the data, and other descriptive material. The Directory is published in three volumes.

CANSIM Mini Base Series Directory (Annual with periodic amendments) – \$10.

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While seasonal adjustment allows a much better look at the underlying trend of a series, the adjusted series will contain irregular fluctuations. Small changes between months in the adjusted series may simply be erratic movements and, to obtain a clearer idea of the underlying trend, users should examine the adjusted series over a number of months. The MCD, or Months for Cyclical Dominance, in a table containing seasonally adjusted series, indicates the smallest span of months for which the average percent change without regard to sign in the trend cycle is greater than that in the irregular factor. For the smoothest series in MCD it is 1, for the most erratic series it is 6. Applying a moving average of the period equal to the MCD tends to smooth irregular movements which may obscure the underlying trend.

Public General and Allied Special Hospitals In Canada: Historical summary of inputs and utilization of facilities, 1953 to 1973

Like other sectors of the Canadian economy, hospitals have grown considerably in the last two decades. The increased interest of both public and private bodies in health care has given rise to more and better health services. To some extent, the federal government's participation in financing health programs in Canada and the rapid rise in operating expenses are indications of the development that has taken place in the past fifteen years.

This study is a structured historical summary of the hospital sector over the last two decades. Numerical time series have been used to present trends in order to illustrate the development of some of the main components of the hospital sector over the last twenty years.

The universe of the study was defined as all operating public general and allied special hospitals in Canada¹. Public mental hospitals and tuberculosis sanatoria were included in some cases to give a complete picture of the public hospital sector in Canada. In 1973, the total public hospital sector, including mental and tuberculosis institutions, accounted for 94% of the rated bed capacity in Canada, while public general and allied special hospitals accounted for only 69% of the rated bed capacity. No reference will be made to proprietary and federal hospitals since a complete set of statistical information is not collected from them.

The first part of the study looks at the hospital sector with respect to some general economic indicators. Within this framework, the hospital sector is com-

pared in terms of its size relative to the health sector as a whole; its contribution to the Canadian economy is then determined in terms of the labour force and the GNP.

The second part of the study attempts to describe and quantify the "inputs" used by the hospital sector in its normal activities. The data will be classified under the following three main headings: physical resources; human resources; operating expense. The third part studies hospitals' utilization of the inputs presented in the second part.

Importance of the Hospital Sector in the Canadian Economy

The expenditures in the health field can be broken down into the following five sectors:

- personal health care
- institutional care
- professional services
- drugs and appliances
- other health expenditures

The institutional care sector is the largest in terms of the funds allocated to it, and has grown the most in relative and absolute terms since 1960. As shown in Table I, the institutional care sector accounted for 52% of the health expenditures in 1973, which have more than quadrupled since 1960.

Hospital care constitutes 89% of institutional care; in 1973, it represented 46% of the total health expenditures, and had an average annual growth rate of 10.5% between 1970 and 1973.

¹ For statistical purposes, Canadian hospitals are categorised according to the type of ownership: public, proprietary or federal; and type of service: general, allied special (extended care, reha-

bilitation, maternity, communicable diseases, children's, orthopedic, neurological, cancer, nursing stations, outpost hospitals, etc.) mental and tuberculosis. General hospitals are divided into teaching (full and partial teaching) and non-teaching (with and without long-term units) types, which are further subdivided into varying bed-size groups based on rated bed capacity. In a working paper published in 1974², the Minister of Health and Welfare Canada stated that health expenditures in Canada in 1971, including personal health care³, represented 7.1% of the GNP.

Public general and allied special hospitals, including psychiatric hospitals and tuberculosis sanatoria accounted for 45% of this figure, or 3.18% of the GNP.

The operating expense of public general and allied special hospitals for the same year represented 38% of the total or 2.69% of the GNP. The operating expense of such hospitals has increased at an accelerated rate over the past twenty years with an average annual growth rate of 13.6%⁴. In addition,

the operating expense of public general and allied special hospitals represent an increasingly large percentage of all public hospitals (85.4% in 1973). The growth rate is even more revealing when we compare it to the average annual growth rates of the GNP and the population, which are 6.7% and 1.9% respectively. In other words, the operating expense of public general and allied special hospitals increased at an average annual rate seven times that of the population and twice that of the GNP. This is illustrated in Chart 1, which shows the annual rate of change in the operating expense of hospitals, the GNP and the population from 1954 to 1973.



Observations

User Advisory Services

Statistics Canada, as Canada's central statistical agency, has a national responsibility for collecting and publishing the statistical information needed by governments, industry and the general public to understand the social and economic conditions of the country.

User Advisory Services is a division of Statistics Canada. Its primary task is to help people identify, obtain and effectively use statistical information.

User Advisory Services has offices in nine major cities across the country supported by a head office staff in Ottawa. Toll free telephone lines to the regional offices are available in several other cities.

Inquiries

The Regional Offices have libraries of Statistics Canada material and related information. They are staffed by knowledgeable inquiries officers who each year answer over 100,000 requests for statistics or advise on the meaning and use of data. Most inquiries are received by telephone, but many are by letter or from visitors to the libraries, which are open during normal working hours. Study areas are provided and limited photocopying is permitted. Arrangements to purchase publications can be made through the Regional Offices or directly from Statistics Canada in Ottawa.

The Regional Offices also have computer terminals which can access information directly from CANSIM, Statistics Canada's data base.

Regional Advisors

Each Regional Office of User Advisory Services has one or more Regional Advisors who are responsible for maintaining local liaison between Statistics Canada and users of statistics in federal, provincial and local governments, business, institutions and educational establishments. They promote the use of statistics through visits, talks and meetings; assist both experienced and inexperienced users with data problems and, if necessary, help people get in touch with the appropriate specialists in Ottawa.

Regional Advisors are also responsible for feeding back to Ottawa users' view, comments, criticisms, etc., to help Statistics Canada improve its products and services.

User Advisory Services in Ottawa consists of three sections:

Data Access and Use – provides the necessary co-ordination and support for the regional operations and produces literature to assist users, including the Statistics Canada Catalogue which is available free of charge on request.

Consultative Services – has a general responsibility for federal-provincial relations concerning statistics. It is the Secretariat for the Federal-Provincial Consultative Council on Statistical Policy and its Committees and other liaison activities with the public and private sectors. The section has a number of programmes designed to assist users, for example, compilation of an inventory of Statistics Canada's surveys and programmes, and production of material for data user training sessions.

Analysis and Development – undertakes market research to help Statistics Canada better understand and meet the needs of users and is responsible for channelling information on users' needs, views, etc., from the Regional Offices to the subject matter divisions in Ottawa. It also provides assistance to a Federal Government project to develop a clearing house of statistical information.

Re-design of the Employment Survey

The Labour Division is presently working on a four-year program to re-design the surveys, from which employment, hours and earnings data are produced.

An inter-departmental committee of senior labour economists is preparing recommendations regarding the content and frequency of such a revised survey.

Their recommendations will be reviewed this spring with provincial officials and the approved program will be presented to the Federal-Provincial Committee on Labour Statistics in May.

The design of the methodology and procedures to be used in the survey will start this summer; feasibility testing and evaluation will take place during 1978 and early 1979. The parallel run will take place in late 1979; the revised survey should become fully operational in 1981.

Vital Statistics: Quarterly Estimates

Since the early sixties, the Vital Statistics and Disease Registries Section has been publishing monthly or, quarterly figures of birth, death and marriage registrations received at the provincial Vital Statistical Offices. At the time the *Vital Statistics* publication was initiated, the registrations received each month or quarter reasonably approximated the number of events that actually took place in the corresponding period. Recently however, due to multiplicity of causes, this no longer seems to be the case.








Real Domestic Product by Industry, Volume Indexes, Quarterly, 1971=100






The GNP and hospital expenses show annual variations, while the population is in the form of a regular, decreasing curve. Chart 1 also shows that in 1971, for the first time in sixteen years, the average annual growth rate was higher for the GNP than for hospital expenses.

As shown in Chart 2, the operating expense of public general and allied special hospitals represented 3.3% of the average personal income of Canadians in 1973; this is an increase of 175% over the 1953 figure of 1.2%. Canadians paid an average of close to \$142.00 in current dollars from their income in 1973 for public general and allied special hospitals, whereas in 1953 they paid only \$16.00. CHART 2 We would perhaps obtain a more accurate indication of the financial burden placed on the average Canadian by using the labour force as the base unit. We find then that the average deduction per member of the labour force was \$338.00 in 1973 for public general and allied special hospitals, while in 1953 it was \$44.00 (Table III).

Regardless of the unit used, we find that until 1970 and 1971 the annual rate of variation in the operating expense of public general and allied special hospitals, per person, was higher than the annual rate of variation of average personal income (Chart 3). In other words, Canadians directed an increasing per-

centage of their income to the hospital sector. This may reflect their firm desire to increase the quantity and improve the quality of health care services.

In the area of human resources, operating public general and allied special hospitals employed 3.47% of the labour force in 1973. However, although the number of employees increased in absolute terms, it decreased as a percentage of the total labour force.

Table IV shows that in 1969 hospital personnel represented 3.63% of the labour force, and that this percentage gradually decreased to the 1973 level. This is partly due to the increasing percentage of the Canadian population in the labour force (38.86% in 1969 compared to 42.0% in 1973); in fact the labour force is growing more quickly than the population. Although hospital personnel also increased more quickly than the population (from 14.15 per 1,000 population in 1969 to 14.58 in 1973), it could not keep up with the growth rate of the labour force.

Inputs

This section describes the quantity, and in some cases the quality, of the physical and human resources, and the capital used by hospitals in the last two decades. A descriptive rather than an analytical approach is used. However, it is possible to establish some correlations between the various elements in each category.

A. Physical resources

This section examines mainly the general and allied special hospitals in Canada and their total rated bed capacity.

In the public hospital sector as a whole, the number of institutions increased by 18% between 1953 and 1973; the total rated bed capacity of these institutions increased by 33%. The percentage increase in the case of general and allied special hospitals was 22% and 86% respectively. This increase in the

number of beds is true not only in absolute terms, but also, and more importantly, with respect to the population. The rated bed capacity per 1,000 population went from 5.13 in 1953 to 6.43 in 1973. These figures vary between the provinces: from 5.80 beds per 1,000 population in Newfoundland to 8.50 in Alberta (see Table 5, p. 156).

In general, this disproportionate increase in the number of beds relative to the number of institutions can be explained by the change in the average size of such institutions in Canada.

As shown in Table V, the average number of beds per hospital went from 89 to 135 between 1953 and 1973. Table VI may explain the change that occurred in this period more clearly.

The first thing we notice in Table VI is that the greatest growth rates were in the groups of hospitals having '300 to 499' beds and '500 or more' beds respectively, while the smallest rates were in the groups of '1 to 24 beds' and '25 to 99' beds. Moreover, in 1953, 74% of hospitals had fewer than 100 beds and only 6.6% had 300 or more beds. In 1973, 64% of hospitals had fewer than 100 beds, and the proportion of hospitals with 300 or more beds more than doubled (14.1%), compared to 6.6% in 1953.

B. Human resources

The total hospital personnel in public general and allied special hospitals increased by 238% between 1953 and 1973 which is an average annual increase of 5.52%. As shown in Table VII there was also an increase in personnel per rated bed.

The personnel per rated bed went from 1.25 in 1953 to 2.27 in 1973; this reflects an increase in patient care. There was a corresponding increase in the paid hours per patient-day between 1963 and 1973.

However, there was also, and more importantly, a higher quality of hospital personnel. In other words, the quality of hospital personnel has improved considerably in the past twenty years. Table VIII shows that the number of graduate nurses per rated bed has more than doubled during the period; this figure was .25 in 1953 and .58 in 1973. Graduate nurses

represented 67.4% of the total nursing personnel in 1973, compared to 47.4% in 1953.

This trend can also be seen in specialized groups such as physiotherapists, psychologists, medical staff and occupational therapists. All of these groups have increased by more than five times in the last twenty years, and some have even increased as a percentage of the total hospital staff. These data appear in Tables 7 and 8, p. 158-161.

C. Operating expense

Some reference has already been made in Part I to the operating expense of hospitals. This section will focus on one of the main indicators of hospital expense: operating expense per patient-day.

For public hospitals as a whole, this expense went from \$7.72 in 1954 to \$63.39 in 1973, which is an increase of 720%. The increase in the case of general and allied special hospitals was smaller (500%), but the expense per patient-day was higher, namely \$77.09 in 1973. Table IX shows that general and allied special hospitals are the most costly to operate in terms of expense per patient-day.

The same analysis at the provincial level for all general and allied special hospitals reveals substantial variations in the expense per patient-day. Nevertheless, it is extremely difficult to use these figures as a basis for determining efficiency, since it is virtually impossible to establish the range and quality of services offered by each province. For example, the expense of Ontario and Quebec are among the highest, but perhaps the quantity and quality of their specialized and highly specialized services account for some of the best in Canada (Table X).

The differences can perhaps be explained by other factors such as different salary scales. However, only a more detailed study could establish the exact weight of each factor.

Operating expense consists of four major components:

- gross salaries and wages
- medical and surgical supplies
- drugs
- other supplies and expenses.

The cost of each component has risen in absolute terms in the last twenty years. However, only the gross salaries and wages have increased relative to the total operating expense (Table XI).

As shown in Chart 4 (p. 151), salaries and wages represented 58% of the operating expense in 1953, and 70% in 1973, or \$2,182,912,000 in current dollars. Thus the increased quality of hospital personnel referred to earlier is reflected in an absolute and relative increase in the proportion of operating expense allocated to salaries and wages.

Utilization

This section describes the utilization of resources in the hospital sector. Only the quantitative aspect is discussed since it is the only type of data available.

The number of admissions per 1,000 population in public general and allied special hospitals increased from 119 to 166 between 1953 and 1973, an increase of 39%. However, the average length of stay remained approximately the same, and hence the turnover rate was proportionally the same (Table XII).

As shown in Table XIII, the average daily number of patients in public general and allied special hospitals almost doubled; this indicates a relatively greater increase in the rate of utilization of hospital services by the general public.

These statistics show that the demand for hospital services increased between 1953 and 1973. As we saw earlier, the supply of services also increased in the form of greater material resources and more and better trained personnel.

When we examine the percentage occupancy figures, we find, however, that supply increased faster than demand. We see that the percentage occupancy in general and allied special hospitals dropped from 81.2% to 78.8%. This trend is even more pronounced in some provinces as Table XIV shows.

Summary

The data contained in this paper illustrate the general trends noted in public general and allied special hospitals from 1953 to 1973.

First to be noted is the rise in the operating expenses of these hospitals which, in terms of operating expense per patient-day, have increased six-fold in these two decades. If we compare this rise to the ones observed for the same period in set-up hospital beds (86%), personnel (238%) or the average number of patients per patient-day (238%), the ratios may appear out of scale. To some extent, this can be explained by the fact that almost 70% of the operating expenses incurred by the public general and allied special hospitals represent gross salaries and wages. The hospital personnel has more than tripled from 1953 to 1973, not only in quantity but also from a quality point of view, since many technical and professional groups have increased fourfold and sometimes more than ninefold. Medical technologists, radiology technicians, registered nurses and physiotherapists, to name a few.

During the last two decades, it seems that the variety and availability of hospital services have made rapid

progress along with the introduction of new techniques in order to meet the increased demand of health services.

Glossary

Hospital:

Is defined as an institution where patients are accommodated on the basis of medical need and are provided with continuing medical care and supporting diagnostic and therapeutic services, and which is licensed or approved as a hospital by a provincial government, or is operated by the Government of Canada. This definition includes mental institutions.

Public Hospital:

Public (incl. voluntary, provincial and municipal) – Applies to a hospital recognized by the province as a "public hospital". Such a hospital generally is not operated for profit.

Proprietary: Applies to a hospital owned by an individual or by a private organization, operated for a profit and recognized by the province as a "proprietary hospital".

Federal:

Applies to a hospital owned by a department or agency of the Government of Canada and operated on a non-profit basis.

Allied Special Hospitals:

Includes pediatric, rehabilitation, extended care and other hospitals.

Pediatric – Applies to a hospital which provides for the diagnosis and short-term treatment of pediatric patients, generally 14 years of age and under.

Rehabilitation (including convalescent) – Applies to a hospital which provides primarily for the continuing assessment and treatment of patients whose condition is expected to improve significantly through the provision of physical medicine and other rehabilitative services.

Extended care (including chronic) – Applies to a hospital which provides primarily for the continuing treatment of patients with long-term illness or with a low potential for recovery and who require regular medical assessment and continuing nursing care.

Other – A hospital which provides primarily for the treatment of a limited range of diseases or injuries, or which restricts admissions to a particular age group or sex. Examples of such specified categories may include orthopaedic, maternity, neurological, cancer hospitals. A hospital which provides a combination of various types of service and cannot be classified in any one of the foregoing categories is included in this group. "Other" also includes nursing stations and output hospitals.

Patient day:

The period of service to an inpatient between the census-taking hours on two successive days; the day of admission is counted as a patient-day but the day of separation is not.

Rated Bed Capacity:

The number of beds and cribs (bassinets) which the hospital is designed to accommodate on the basis of established standards of floor area per bed (bassinet) as at December 31 of the reporting year.

Operating Public General and Allied Special Hospitals, Canada, 1953 to 1973



model has been tested with the quarterly data for Canada and the provinces for the past 12 years. The results show that, excepting two isolated instances, empirically the technique has given highly satisfactory results.

Relatively, it is found that the variation between the actual and the estimated counts was less in respect of deaths than either marriages or births; marriages are showing greater variation than births.

It was observed that in 73 out of 132 (55.3%) annual birth estimation cases, the difference between the estimated and actual counts was less than 1%; in 91.7% of the cases the difference was less than 3%. Respective percentages for marriage and death estimates were 21.2, 59.9 and 59.1, 92.4.

It was found that the estimates were relatively more efficient in 2nd and 3rd quarters for births, 3rd and 4th quarters for marriages and 2nd and 4th quarters for deaths. These peculiarities are being further investigated.

Beginning with the fourth quarter of 1976, the estimates generated by the regression model will replace registrations that are presented in the publication *Vital Statistics* (Catalogue No. 84-001) and in the CANSIM data base. In addition, as and when the actual counts of events are available, these quarterly estimates will be revised.
