THE CANADA YEAR BOOK 1911

Messrs. Skead and Wilkins have prepared the tables of the *Canada Year Book* for 1911, as during former years, and the *Introductory Notes on Events of the Year* have been written by Mr. E. H. Godfrey. The new tables of statistics in this volume include the population of Canada by provinces, the population of cities and towns and the conjugal condition of the people, as taken by the Census of 1st June 1911 and the Census of each decade, and the estimated population of each of the forty years 1871-1911, with averages of each year's revenue and expenditure. There are also tables of the Ottawa Branch of the Royal Mint and of the telephone and express companies of the Dominion, as well as statistics of pulpwood and of imports into the British Islands of animal and agricultural products according to the British Trade Returns.

EVENTS OF THE YEAR

The third session of the eleventh Parliament of the Dominion of Canada lasted from November 17 1910 to July 29 1911. From May 19 to July 18 Parliament adjourned to enable senators and members to visit England for the King's coronation. The session resulted in the passing of 150 measures, of which the public general acts numbered 28 and the private local acts 122. Commercial reciprocity with the United States was the chief question of debate.

An act respecting aid towards the construction of the Canadian Northern Ontario Railway (chapter 6) provides for the guarantee by the Dominion Government of the principal and interest of the various securities of the Canadian Northern Ontario Railway Company to the extent of \$35,000 per mile for a total mileage not exceeding 1,050. The line thus guaranteed will extend from Montreal to Port Arthur and will traverse the southern part of New Ontario south of the district to be served by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. It is intended also eventually to form part of a third transcontinental railway extending from the Pacific ocean to Montreal, and affording an interchange of through traffic with the Dominion Government railway system in Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. The interest on the guaranteed securities is to be at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ p.c. per annum, payable half-yearly, and the principal is re-payable in 50 years. The act provides also that the Canadian Northern Railway Company shall guarantee to the Dominion Government the due payment by the Canadian Northern Ontario Railway Company of the principal and interest of all the securities guaranteed by the Government under the act.

Chapter 7 continues for two years from July 17 1911 (when the act came into force by Order of the Governor in Council) the existing customs tariff upon importations into Canada from Japan, with a view to the negotiation within that period of a new commercial treaty between Canada and Japan, the Dominion Government having decided not to adhere to the new commercial treaty concluded between Great Britain and Japan. A condition precedent to the coming into force of the act was that Canadian imports into Japan should not be liable to duties or restrictions different from those imposed by Japan upon imports from other countries.

Chapter 9 amends the Fisheries Act, R. S. 1906 c. 45, by the addition of provisions for the licensing in British Columbia, at an annual fee of \$1, of manufacturers of oil or other commercial products from sea lions, hair seals, sharks or dog fish. The sites

of reduction works for this purpose must be approved by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. Salmon canneries or salmon curing establishments in British Columbia are also subjected to license at an annual fee of \$50, and it is provided that the annual fee for the licensing of lobster canneries shall in future be determined by the weight of lobsters cured instead of by the number of cases. The annual fee is fixed at \$5 for the first 4,800 lb. (or fraction thereof) of canned or cured lobsters and \$2 for each additional 4,800 lb. Another new section makes lobster pounds or enclosures subject to license at an annual fee of \$75.

Forest reserves.

The Dominion Forest Reserves and Parks Act (chapter 10) repeals previous acts, R. S. 1906 c. 56 and 60,¹ but re-enacts their main provisions with new clauses giving increased powers to the forest rangers. Section 18 provides for the proclamation by the Governor in Council, as he sees fit, of areas within forest reserves to be known as Dominion Parks and to be for public use as pleasure grounds, subject to regulations made in the same way. A schedule to the act describes the areas now set apart as forest reserves in British Columbia and the Northwest provinces. These consist of nine in British Columbia (2,115 $\frac{1}{4}$ square miles), five in Manitoba (3,584 $\frac{3}{4}$ square miles), seven in Saskatchewan (937 square miles) and four in Alberta (18,564 $\frac{1}{2}$ square miles). Altogether these forest reserves now number 25, and comprise a total area of 25,201 $\frac{1}{2}$ square miles, or 16,128,960 acres. The principal addition to the schedule since the previous enactment of 1906 is the forest reserve in Alberta on the eastern slope of the Rocky Mountains, which reserve covers the area of 18,213 square miles.

Opium and Drug Act.

The Opium and Drug Act (chapter 17), which consists of 16 sections, repeals the short two-section Opium Act of 1908 (7-8 Edw. VII c. 50) and prohibits the importation, manufacture, sale or possession for other than scientific or medicinal purposes of scheduled drugs, viz., opium, cocaine, morphine and eucaïne, or any salts or compounds thereof. The Governor in Council may add to this schedule such alkaloids, derivatives or preparations of these drugs as may be deemed necessary in the public interest.

Prohibition of opium smoking.

Section 4 renders smokers of opium, persons in possession of opium for smoking and persons found in opium resorts liable on summary conviction to fines and imprisonment, the maximum fines and terms of imprisonment being \$100 and three months for smoking and \$50 and one month for being found in opium resorts.

Regulation of the sale of drugs.

By section 5 dealers in the drugs named may only furnish them to medical men and druggists, and must duly record the transactions in books open to police inspection. Persons failing to do so are liable upon summary conviction to a fine not exceeding \$200 and costs, or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding

three months, or to both fine and imprisonment. A similar section applies to medical prescriptions or orders given for other than medical treatment. The exportation of the drugs to other countries prohibiting their entry is made a criminal offence, punishable by fine not exceeding \$500 and costs, or by imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, or by both fine and imprisonment. Other sections provide for the seizure and destruction of the drugs by order of magistrate or court.

Provisions as to export, seizure, etc.

Chapter 23 repeals the Seed Control Act of 1905, with the amending Act of 1910 (R. S. 1906, c. 128 ; c. 54 of the statutes of 1910), and enlarges the scope of the original provisions in a new act of 21 sections. It prohibits the sale of the seeds of cereals, flax, grasses, clovers or forage plants (except timothy, alsike, red clover and alfalfa) that are not free from noxious weeds unless marked with the seller's name and address, the name of the kind or kinds of seeds and the common names of the noxious weeds of which the seeds are present.

New Seed Control Act.

Timothy, red clover, alsike or alfalfa seeds may only be sold in packages bearing the full name and address of the seller, the name of the kind or kinds of seed and the name of one of the four following grades into which all such seeds must be divided :

Grading of timothy and clover seeds.

(a) "Extra No. 1", seeds pure as to kind, clean, sound, plump, of good colour, free from the seeds of any noxious weeds and containing not more than 30 seeds of all kinds of weeds including other useless or harmful plants per ounce of the seed so marked.

(b) "No. 1", seeds clean, sound, reasonably plump, of good colour and containing not more than five noxious weed seeds per ounce of timothy, red clover or alfalfa, or ten of them per ounce of alsike seed, and not more than 100 seeds of all kinds of weeds including other useless or harmful plants per ounce of the seed so marked.

(c) "No. 2", seeds reasonably clean, sound, and containing not more than 20 noxious weed seeds per ounce of timothy, red clover or alfalfa, or 40 of them per ounce of alsike seed and not more than 200 seeds of all kinds of weeds, including other useless or harmful plants per ounce of the seed so marked.

(d) "No. 3", seeds containing not more than 80 seeds of noxious weeds per ounce of timothy, red clover or alfalfa, or 160 of them per ounce of alsike seed and not more than 400 seeds of all kinds of weeds including other useless or harmful plants per ounce of the seed so marked.

The sale of these seeds of a lower grade than No. 3 is prohibited.

The sale is also prohibited of farm and vegetable seeds which are not capable of germinating in the proportion of two-thirds of the percentage standard of vitality for good seed of the kind, unless marked with the name of the kind and the percentage of the seeds that are capable of germination.

Standard of vitality.

Garden seeds sold in paper packets must be labelled with the date of the year when filled, and no such seeds may be used to mix with other seeds offered for sale for seeding.

The names of noxious weeds are not now specified in the act itself, but power is given to the Governor in Council to make regulations determining (a) the species of farm weeds that are to be deemed as "noxious weeds"; (b) the maximum proportion

of seeds of noxious weeds that may be tolerated in seeds other than those sold only in grades as above; and (c) percentage standards of vitality.

The other sections of the act deal with offences, penalties, analyses and procedure.

Chapter 25 provides for a subsidy not exceeding £25,000 (\$121,667) per annum to be paid by the Governor in Council for a steamship service between a port or ports on the Pacific coast of Canada and China and Japan for such period as may be deemed expedient, not exceeding in the aggregate ten years. The subsidy is made in respect of the carriage of mails by steamers of the Canadian Pacific Railway and is in continuance of one that has been in existence for many years.

Chapter 28 confirms and sanctions the treaty relating to the boundary waters and to questions arising along the boundary between Canada and the United States, which was signed at Washington on January 11 1909, and the protocol relating thereto of May 5 1910. It provides also for the establishment so far as Canada is concerned of the International Joint Commission under the treaty and for the annual appropriation of a sum not exceeding \$75,000 towards payment of salaries and expenses. The maximum salaries payable and the maximum amounts to be devoted to office accommodation, equipment and supplies are prescribed by the act.

Other public acts passed during the session relate to the following subjects: National Battlefields at Quebec (chapter 5), leasing by the Government of Canada of a proposed new line of railway in New Brunswick (chapter 11), immigration (chapter 12), correction of clerical errors in the Inland Revenue Act (chapter 13), the Indian Act (chapter 14), penny banks (chapter 18), the Post Office Acts (chapters 19 and 20), the Quebec Savings Bank (chapter 21), amendment and consolidation of the Toronto Harbour Acts (chapter 26) and the water carriage of goods (chapter 27). Chapter 8 amends the Department of Railways and Canals Act by permitting the establishment of suspense accounts for purposes named. Chapter 22 amends the Railway Act, R. S. 1906 c. 37, and chapter 15 amends the Inspection and Sale Act, R. S. 1906 c. 85, by providing that when potatoes are sold by the barrel the barrel shall mean 160 lb. of potatoes.

At the coronation in Westminster Abbey on June 22 of Their Majesties King George and Queen Mary the Dominion of Canada was officially represented by the Right Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, G.C.M.G., the Hon. Sir Frederick Borden, K.C.M.G., and the Hon. L. P. Brodeur as Ministers of the Crown. The Canadian Senate was officially represented by the Honourables Sir Mackenzie Bowell, K.C.M.G., J. P. B. Cas-

grain, J. A. Loughheed, K.C., L. G. Power and Robert Watson, and the Canadian House of Commons by the Hon. George E. Foster, the Hon. John G. Haggart, and Messrs. H. B. Ames, H. S. Béland, F. B. Carvell, J. W. Daniel, James M. Douglas, Hugh Guthrie, George E. McCraney, C. A. Magrath, John H. Sinclair, Ralph Smith and A. B. Warburton. Official delegations were also sent by each of the provincial Legislatures. Throughout Canada the day of the coronation was observed as one of general rejoicing and thanksgiving, the people uniting everywhere in demonstrations of loyal enthusiasm.

In accordance with His Majesty's desire that the naval and military forces of His Dominions beyond the seas should be adequately represented in the processions and other functions connected with the coronation, contingents representing the Canadian military and naval forces and the Royal Northwest Mounted Police proceeded to England, and whilst there were the guests of His Majesty's Imperial Government. The military contingent numbered 53 officers and 655 non-commissioned officers and men, the naval contingent consisted of one lieutenant, two midshipmen, three petty officers and 32 men, and the Royal Northwest Mounted Police were represented by seven officers and 75 non-commissioned officers and constables. The contingents furnished escorts and guards of honour in connection with the coronation processions, and assisted also in lining the processional routes. Arriving in England early in June, they re-embarked for Canada early in July. A warm welcome was everywhere extended to them by the British populace.

On January 25 the Hon. W. S. Fielding, Minister of Finance, and the Hon. William Paterson, Minister of Customs, returned to Ottawa with the text of a provisional agreement concluded at Washington for settlement of the future trading relations of Canada with the United States upon the basis of reciprocal free trade in natural products. This agreement was embodied in letters exchanged on January 21 between the Canadian Ministers of Finance and Customs and the United States Secretary of State. In these letters it was agreed that the desired tariff changes should not take the formal shape of a treaty, but that the Governments of the two countries should use their utmost efforts to bring about such changes by concurrent legislation at Washington and Ottawa.

The agreement proposed that the existing duties as between Canada and the United States should be replaced by a reciprocal tariff in four schedules A, B, C and D. In schedule A were proposed to be placed a large variety of articles the growth, produce or manufacture of each country to be admitted from each country into the other free of duty. Included amongst these free articles were live stock, cereals, hay, straw, vegetables, fruits, dairy products, oilseeds, field, grass and garden seeds, fish, salt, mineral waters, timber, iron and steel plates and wire,

and cream separators. The principal articles to be placed in schedule B included meat, flour and agricultural machinery and implements as defined, the rates of duty upon these articles to be common to both countries. In schedules C and D were to be placed at reduced rates of duty a number of articles imported respectively by the United States from Canada and by Canada from the United States, the latter schedule including coal. Paper and pulpwood were to be admitted free reciprocally provided that no export charges were imposed thereon in Canada whether by provincial or federal authority.

Resolutions approving of these proposals were submitted to the House of Commons by Mr. Fielding on January 26, and debates ensued which lasted for almost the entire remainder of the session.

On February 22 the House of Commons, on the motion of Mr. F.D.Monk, adopted unanimously the following as an amendment to the motion for going into Committee of Ways and Means on the reciprocity resolutions :

But, before resuming the discussion of the terms of the agreement concluded between the Government of Canada and the President of the United States, and with a view to dispel the feeling of unrest created in Canada by comments made in both countries as to the political consequence of the agreement, the House wishes to affirm emphatically its determination to preserve intact the bonds which unite Canada to the British Empire, and the full liberty of Canada to control her fiscal policy and internal autonomy.

A Bill to give effect to the agreement on the part of the United States was introduced into the United States Congress on January 29. It passed the House of Representatives by 221 votes to 93 on February 14. On April 4 a newly elected Congress met in extraordinary session to consider the agreement, and on April 21 the Bill relating to it passed the House of Representatives by 267 votes to 89. On July 22 the Bill passed the United States Senate by 53 votes to 27, and it was enacted that its provisions should become operative as soon as the necessary counterpart legislation had been passed by the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada.

Discussion of the reciprocity proposals was resumed in the House of Commons directly Parliament reassembled on July 18 after the coronation adjournment. No progress was made however towards their adoption, and on July 29 the Government decided to recommend the dissolution of Parliament and to submit their proposals for commercial reciprocity with the United States to the judgment of the Canadian people at a general election, the date of which was fixed for September 21.

The General Election of September 21 resulted in the defeat of the Government and in the consequent rejection of the proposals for commercial reciprocity with the United States. On October 6 Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the other members of his Administration formally resigned office.

Mr. R. L. Borden, leader of the Opposition, called upon to form an Administration, accomplished this task on October 10, and the new Ministry was constituted as follows : R. L. Borden, premier and president of the Privy Council ; George E. Foster, Trade and Commerce ; Robert Rogers, Interior ; F. D. Monk, Public Works ; Francis Cochrane, Railways and Canals ; William T. White, Finance ; Louis P. Pelletier, Postmaster General ; John D. Hazen, Marine and Fisheries and Naval Service ; Charles J. Doherty, Justice ; Samuel Hughes, Militia and Defence ; William J. Roche, Secretary of State ; Thomas W. Crothers, Labour ; Wilfrid B. Nantel, Inland Revenue and Mines ; John D. Reid, Customs ; Martin Burrell, Agriculture ; George H. Perley, Albert E. Kemp and James A. Lougheed, members without portfolios.

The twelfth Parliament of the Dominion of Canada was opened on November 15 by H. R. H. the Governor General in person. The address in reply to the speech from the throne was voted on November 29, and on December 7 Parliament adjourned over the Christmas recess until January 10 1912.

On October 23 the Hon. Auguste Lanlry was appointed to be Speaker of the Senate, and on November 15 Dr. T. S. Sproule was elected Speaker of the House of Commons.

Under the terms of Resolution 1 of the Colonial Conference of 1907 the Imperial Conference, now held quadrennially, fell due to take place in 1911. It was accordingly held in London from May 20 to June 20, just before His Majesty's coronation. The following representatives of the United Kingdom and of the five self-governing Dominions beyond the seas took part in the proceedings as members of the conference : United Kingdom: The Right Hon. H. H. Asquith, K.C., M.P., Prime Minister, president, and the Right Hon. L. Harcourt, M.P., Secretary of State for the Colonies ; Dominion of Canada : The Right Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, G.C.M.G., Prime Minister, the Hon. Sir F. W. Borden, K.C.M.G., Minister of Militia and Defence, and the Hon. L. P. Brodeur, Minister of Marine and Fisheries ; Commonwealth of Australia : The Hon. A. Fisher, Prime Minister, the Hon. E. L. Batchelor, Minister of External Affairs, and the Hon. G. F. Pearce, Minister of Defence ; Dominion of New Zealand : The Right Hon. Sir Joseph G. Ward, K.C.M.G., Prime Minister, and the Hon. J. G. Findlay, K.C., LL.D., Attorney General and Colonial Secretary ; Union of South Africa: General the Right Hon. L. Botha, Prime Minister, the Hon. Sir David de Villiers Graaff, Bart., Minister of Public Works, Posts and Telegraphs, and the Hon. F. S. Malan, Minister of Education ; Newfoundland : The Hon. Sir E. P. Morris, Prime Minister, and the Hon. R. Watson, Colonial Secretary.

Proposal of Sir Joseph Ward for closer political union.

After settlement of procedure the first question discussed was the possibility of a closer form of political union between the self-governing parts of the British Empire, as to which Sir Joseph Ward, Prime Minister of New Zealand, submitted a resolution in favour of the creation of an Imperial Council of State. Certain concrete proposals which he explained were however regarded as impracticable by his fellow members of the conference; and the resolution was by leave withdrawn.

Consultation of Dominions as to international agreements affecting them.

Twenty resolutions were adopted by the conference. Amongst them were several of particular interest as affecting the commercial relations of Canada with other countries. Resolution I was as follows:

That this conference after hearing the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs cordially welcomes the proposals of the Imperial Government, viz: (a) that the Dominions shall be afforded an opportunity of consultation when framing the instructions to be given to British delegates at future meetings of the Hague Conference and that conventions affecting the Dominions provisionally assented to at that conference shall be circulated among the Dominion governments for their consideration before any such convention is signed; (b) that a similar procedure where time and opportunity and the subject matter permit shall, as far as possible, be used when preparing instructions for the negotiation of other international agreements affecting the Dominions.

Abrogation of most favoured nation clauses in commercial treaties.

Another aspect of the same question relates to the effect, both present and future, upon the commercial interests of the overseas Dominions of the most favoured nation clauses in certain ancient treaties still in force between Great Britain and other countries. It was pointed out by Sir Edward Grey, Imperial Foreign Secretary, that certain existing treaties were made in the time of Oliver Cromwell and Charles II and were not therefore applicable to the conditions of the present. Difficulties in the way of the denunciation of treaties were mentioned, and eventually resolution XIX was adopted, on the motion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, as follows:

That His Majesty's Government be requested to open negotiations with the several foreign governments having treaties which apply to the overseas Dominions with a view to securing liberty for any of those Dominions which may so desire to withdraw from the operation of the treaty without impairing the treaty in respect of the rest of the Empire.

Steps have since been taken by the Imperial Government towards the opening of negotiations with the countries concerned.

Royal Commission on natural resources and trade of the Empire.

Resolution xx, also adopted on the motion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, suggested the appointment of a Royal Commission representing the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and Newfoundland to investigate and report upon the natural resources of the Empire and the development of mutual trading relations. Effect has been given to this suggestion and steps are being taken towards constitution of the commission. The representative of Canada upon the commission is the Hon. George E. Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce.

Resolutions relating to shipping, emigration, naturalisation, mail, cable and wireless telegraphy services, and questions of legal administration were also adopted by the conference. Subjects of other resolutions.

Questions of imperial defence were discussed at special conferences with the British Admiralty and War Office. In regard to the naval services and forces of both Canada and Australia the principle was affirmed that these should be under the control of their respective governments; the naval stations for each Dominion were defined and rules of naval etiquette and procedure were adopted. In regard to military matters a Committee of the Imperial Conference reported upon the progress made in the organisation of an Imperial General Staff and of the local sections of this staff in Canada and the other Dominions. Imperial Defence, naval and military.

Amidst universal expressions of regret and farewell Their Excellencies the Earl and Countess Grey embarked at Quebec for England on October 13, when His Excellency finally relinquished the office of Governor General of Canada, which he had filled with marked ability, distinction and success for seven years. Appointed on September 26 and assuming office on December 10 1904 Lord Grey's tenure of office was in 1909 extended beyond the usual term of five years and again for another year after the death of King Edward in 1910. He had thus held the office of Governor General longer than had any of his eight predecessors since Confederation. Entering heartily into the life of the people and travelling through all parts of the Dominion, Lord Grey acquired a thorough first-hand knowledge of Canadian conditions. He showed himself at all times in full sympathy with Canadian national aspirations and he did much to strengthen still further the ties of loyalty and affection which bind Canada to the motherland and to the rest of the British Empire. Probably the most notable event with which he was personally identified during his term of office was the great tercentenary celebrations at Quebec in 1908 and the public preservation of the historic battlegrounds of the Plains of Abraham. The success of these celebrations, especially in the direction of promoting a better understanding between English- and French-speaking Canadians, was due largely to His Excellency's personal initiative and example. Departure of Their Excellencies the Earl and Countess Grey.

In January official notification was received by the Government that H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught would be appointed to succeed Lord Grey as Governor General of Canada upon the expiration of His Excellency's term of office later in the year. On March 21 the Duke of Connaught was formally gazetted as Governor General and Commander in Chief for a period of two years. On October 13 the Duke and Duchess of Connaught were Appointment of H.R. welcomed at Quebec where the new Governor General was duly sworn in. At the state luncheon which followed the inaugural ceremonies at Quebec the Duke communicated a special message from His Majesty the King expressing to the Canadian people his "personal affection and ever-abiding interest in all that concerns the welfare of the Dominion."

As the result of an international fur seal conference, held at Washington from May 11 to July 7, when Great Britain was represented by the Right Hon. James Bryce, O.M., British Ambassador, and Mr. (now Sir) Joseph Pope, C.V.O., C.M.G., Under Secretary of State of Canada for External Affairs, accompanied by Mr. W. A. Found and Mr. James Macoun as experts, a convention was signed on July 7 by which Great Britain, the United States, Russia and Japan undertook that pelagic sealing should cease for a period of 15 years from December 15 1911 and thereafter until duly terminated by a year's written notice from any one or more of the four signatory Powers to all the others.

Object of the
convention.

The object of the convention is to prevent the rapid destruction of fur seals and sea otters which has continued during recent years. As this destruction has been due almost entirely to the capture of seals and sea otters while away from land it is believed that the convention will preserve the small herds now in existence and will enable them to increase in numbers in future and thus eventually replenish the supply of seal skins in the world's markets.

Terms of
convention.

By the convention all pelagic sealing, except that carried on in canoes by Indians or other aborigines for their own sustenance, is prohibited in the waters of the North Pacific ocean north of the 30th parallel of north latitude and including the seas of Behring, Kamschatka, Okhotsk and Japan. Provision is also made for an apportionment amongst the signatory Powers of the annual proceeds from the seals killed in the various herds on land, the share of Great Britain which is payable to Canada being 15 per cent of the annual gross takings on land by the United States and Russia respectively and 10 per cent of the gross annual takings by Japan. Ratifications of the convention were exchanged at Washington on December 12 1911.

Population of
Canada, 1911.

During the year the fifth census of Canada was taken as for June 1. As the result the population was ascertained to be 7,204,838¹, an increase of 1,833,523, or 34.13 p.c., since the previous census of March 31 1901. Tables I and II on page 2 of this volume of the Year Book give the distribution of the population by provinces and territories according to sex, with the totals of the previous census for comparison.

The census records of butter, cheese and condensed milk produced in Canada in 1910, as enumerated in 1911, show that there were 3,628 factories in operation. The quantity of butter made in the year was 59,875,097 lb., having a value of \$15,682,564. This was 23,818,358 lb. more than in 1900, and the value was more by \$8,441,592. The quantity of cheese was 231,012,798 lb., which was more than at the previous census by 10,179,529 lb., but the value was less by \$600,776. The total value of butter, cheese and condensed milk in 1910 was \$39,143,089, and in 1900 it was \$29,731,922, being an increase of \$9,411,167 in ten years.

Census of dairy industries, 1911.

Taking butter alone the value of the factory product was \$7,240,972 in 1900 and \$15,682,564 in 1910, and the value of cheese alone was \$22,221,430 in 1900 and \$21,620,654 in 1910. The average price of factory butter was 20 cents per lb. and of cheese 10 cents per lb., whilst in 1910 the average price of butter was 26.2 cents per lb. and of cheese 9 cents per lb. The increased price of factory butter led to a larger production in 1910 than in 1900, and this was made, especially in Quebec, at the cost of a lower production of cheese. The change was further induced by the lower rate of duty on cream in the United States, which encouraged larger exports to that country.

Value of factory butter and cheese in Canada, 1910.

The number of condensed milk factories in operation increased from four in 1900 to 12 in 1910, and the value of the product increased from \$269,520 to \$1,839,871. There are now six factories in Ontario with a product value of \$1,335,689, two in Nova Scotia with \$133,956, two in Quebec with \$275,000, one in British Columbia with \$44,326 and one in Prince Edward Island with \$50,900. In 1900 there were two factories in Nova Scotia and one each in Prince Edward Island and Ontario.

Condensed milk factories, 1910.

Upon the whole the agricultural season of 1911 proved favourable, though prolonged drouth in the east and a cold, wet ripening period, with storms and frost in the west, depreciated quality and lessened the yields which early conditions had promised. Excepting in the case of fall wheat the figures denoting condition, as returned during the season of growth by the crop-reporting correspondents of the Census and Statistics Office, remained high for cereals, being over 90 p. c. of the standard up to June 30 and, except for rye, over 80 p. c. up to the time of harvest. The yield anticipated for wheat was over 10 p. c. above the average of the three years 1908-10, and in the result it proved to be as much as 18 p. c. above this average.

Harvest results of 1911.

The final estimates of the production and value of the principal field crops of Canada in 1911, based upon returns made by correspondents on December 31, with records of areas obtained by the census of 1911, are given in the following table:

This table shows that a total area in Canada of 32,404,110 acres yielded in 1911 a harvest which, computed at local market prices, had a value of \$558,099,600. For wheat, Canada's principal cereal crop, the total production was estimated at 215,851,300 bushels, with a value of \$138,567,000, from an area of 10,373,958 acres. This is the largest wheat crop in the history of the Dominion both as regards area and total production. Except as regards flaxseed the areas in the table represent the totals of the schedules obtained from every agricultural occupier by the census of 1911, and the total yields are calculated therefrom according to the estimated yields per acre as returned by the crop-reporting correspondents of the Census and Statistics Office. The figures of 1911 possess therefore a greater degree of statistical accuracy than can be attributed to the estimates of 1908, 1909 and 1910, published on page xxiii of the Year Book of 1910, the latter being calculated from the areas as estimated by correspondents. It may however be mentioned that the area and yield of wheat in 1911 exceed by over 1,000,000 acres and by 65,861,000 bushels the estimated area and yield of 1910.

Data as to the numbers of live stock in Canada were collected from correspondents on June 30, and the following table gives

the estimated numbers of horses, cattle, sheep and swine for 1911 and the three previous years 1908-10:¹

The condition of live stock in Canada has remained generally satisfactory throughout the year.

At the end of March Dr. William Saunders, C.M.G., in consequence of advancing years, retired from the office of Director of the Dominion Experimental Farms, a post which he had held since the establishment of the farms in 1886. The vacancy thus created was filled by the promotion on April 1 of Mr. J. H. Grisdale from the office of Agriculturist to that of Director. The original five experimental farms have increased to 11 and now consist of the central farm at Ottawa and of 10 branch farms, viz., Charlottetown, P. E. I., Nappan, N.S., Cap Rouge, Que., Brandon, Man., Indian Head, Rosthern and Scott, Sask., Lacombe and Lethbridge, Alta., and Agassiz, B. C.

At the first annual Land Show of the American Land and Irrigation Exposition, held at New York, November 3-12, a prize of \$1,000 in gold for the best 100 lb. of hard red wheat, spring or winter, grown on either continent of America during 1910 or 1911, was gained by a Canadian farmer, Mr. Seager Wheeler, of Rosthern, Saskatchewan, with a sample of Marquis wheat, the new variety produced at the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa. A silver cup, value \$1,000, for the best exhibit of marketable late potatoes, was awarded at the same show to Mr. Asahel Smith, of Ladner, B.C.

Statistics collected by the Forestry Branch of the Department of the Interior and published in the Department's annual report for the fiscal year 1910-11 show that the total quantity of timber cut in Canadian forests during 1909 was 2,896,000,000 cubic feet of the estimated value at the point of manufacture of \$166,000,000. The report states that owing to the very great waste in the utilisation of wood in Canada only about one-half of the quantity named was actually put into use.

Railway
statistics of
Canada.

According to the report of the comptroller of railway statistics the increase in the railway mileage of Canada for the year ended June 30 1911 was 669 as compared with 627 in 1910 and 1,138 in 1909. Seventy per cent of the increase in 1910-11 was in the western provinces. The total railway mileage in actual operation on June 30 was 25,400 as against 24,731 in 1910 and 24,104 in 1909. There were in addition 1,577½ miles of railway in actual operation but officially regarded as still under construction.

During the year ended June 30 1911 \$118,391,514 were added to the total capital liability of railways in Canada. This brings the total amount of capital invested in Canadian railways to \$1,528,689,201 of which \$749,207,687 are stocks and \$779,481,514 are funded debt. Eliminating the capital liability of railways under construction and the mileage of government owned lines, the capital obligation per mile is \$55,829. The railways of Canada carried 37,097,718 passengers and 79,884,282 tons of freight in 1911, an increase of 1,203,143 passengers, or 3·3 p.c., and of 5,401,416 tons of freight, or 7·2 p.c., as compared with 1910. The aggregate earnings for the year from all sources were \$188,733,494, an increase over 1910 of \$14,777,277, or 8·7 p.c. The operating expenses were \$131,033,785, as compared with \$120,405,440 in 1910.

Electric
railways.

The business of the electric railways in Canada has continued to expand during 1911. During the year the total liability was increased from \$102,044,979 in 1910 to \$111,532,347 in 1911. Of this amount \$62,251,203 are in stocks and \$49,281,144 in funded debt. The number of passengers carried was 426,296,792, as compared with 360,964,876 in 1910. The freight handled was 2,496,072 tons in 1911, as compared with 842,294 tons in 1910. Gross earnings were \$20,356,952, as compared with \$17,100,789 in 1910.

Reports covering the year ended June 30 1911 have been issued by the comptroller of railway statistics for the first time in respect of express and telephone companies. These show that the total capital of the three distinctly Canadian express companies was on June 30 \$4,005,200. The total operating mileage of all companies in Canada was 27,585. The gross operating receipts amounted to \$9,913,018 and the total net revenue to \$1,211,477. Operating expenses amounted to \$4,151,228. Statistics of express companies.

The report on telephones relates to 537 organisations with a total capitalisation of \$40,043,982, of which \$21,527,374 are in stocks and \$18,516,608 are in funded debt. The gross earnings amounted to \$10,068,220 and the operating expenses to \$6,979,045. Equipment was represented by 302,759 telephones and 687,729 miles of wire, of which 576,713 miles are urban and 111,016 are rural. The total number of telephone employees was reported as 10,425 with a wage list of \$915,636. Statistics of telephone companies.

The total foreign trade of Canada for the calendar year 1911 amounted to \$799,212,342, exclusive of coin and bullion, as compared with \$740,024,880 in 1910. Imports in 1911 amounted to \$502,641,115, as compared with \$444,610,449 in 1910, and exports to \$296,571,227, as compared with \$295,414,431 in 1910. Trade with Great Britain reached a total of \$260,717,743, as compared with \$248,768,284 in 1910. Imports from Great Britain in 1911 were \$113,299,422, as compared with \$108,272,427, and exports to Great Britain in 1911 were \$147,418,321, as compared with \$140,495,857 in 1910. Trade with the United States reached the total of \$456,396,070, as compared with \$383,173,805 in 1910. Imports from the United States were \$341,192,612, as compared with \$269,464,731, and exports to the United States were \$115,203,458, as compared with \$113,709,074 in 1910. Canadian trade with other countries.

For the calendar year 1911 the number of immigrants into Canada was 350,374, made up of 144,076 from the United Kingdom, 131,114 from the United States and 75,184 from other countries. The corresponding figures for the calendar year 1910 were; total 303,091, United Kingdom 112,638, United States 124,602 and other countries 65,851. For the fiscal year ended March 31 1912 the total arrivals were 354,237 of whom 138,121 were from the United Kingdom, 133,710 from the United States and 82,406 from other countries. The figures for the past fiscal year again constitute a record, the total being about 14 per cent in excess of that of the previous fiscal year. The proportion of British and American immigrants is 77 per cent of the total. According to the annual report for March 31 1911 of the Department of the Interior the quality of the British and American immigration has also improved, the present regulations admitting none but high class immigrants who are well qualified to succeed in Canada. The immigrants from the United States are stated to Immigration statistics.

be practically all farmers and farm labourers, drawn for the most part from the farming communities of the western states, and they come well equipped for making a good start in their new surroundings. The enforcement of the existing regulations moreover had the effect of reducing the deportation of undesirable immigrants of all nationalities from 1,748 in 1908-9 to 784 in 1910-11.

Chinese immigration.

Following a report made by Mr. Justice Murphy, Royal Commissioner appointed to investigate certain alleged Chinese frauds and opium smuggling on the Pacific coast, an Order in Council of May 31 transferred from the Department of Trade and Commerce to the Department of the Interior all matters pertaining to Chinese immigration, the Order taking effect from October 2. By a further Order in Council of August 4 the immigration officers of the Department of the Interior were made controllers of Chinese immigration under authority of R.S. 1906, c. 95, s. 6, ss. "B." The number of Chinese immigrants during the fiscal year ended March 31 1912 was 6,584, compared with 5,320 in 1910-11, 2,302 in 1909-10, and 2,106 in 1908-9.

Homestead entries.

The total number of ordinary homestead entries for the calendar year 1911 was 38,909, as compared with 48,257 in 1910, 37,061 in 1909 and 38,559 in 1908. In 1911 2,944 entries were made in Manitoba against 3,132 in 1910, 20,681 in Saskatchewan against 26,878 in 1910, 14,960 in Alberta against 18,013 in 1910 and 324 in British Columbia against 234 in 1910. The number of pre-emptions under the Dominion Lands Act was 10,583 in 1911 (6,714 in Saskatchewan and 3,869 in Alberta) against 18,352 in 1910 (10,795 in Saskatchewan and 7,557 in Alberta). The number of purchased homesteads under the act was 1,514 in 1911 (1,109 in Saskatchewan and 405 in Alberta) against 1,863 in 1910 (1,357 in Saskatchewan and 506 in Alberta). The entries for South African volunteer homesteads numbered 2,064 in 1911 (8 in Manitoba, 1,075 in Saskatchewan and 981 in Alberta) against 2,186 in 1910 (17 in Manitoba, 1,259 in Saskatchewan and 910 in Alberta).

Statistics of mineral production.

According to the annual preliminary report of the Division of Mineral Resources and Statistics of the Department of Mines the value of the mineral products of Canada in 1911 was \$102,291,686, as compared with \$106,823,623, the finally revised total of 1910. This represents a decrease of \$4,531,937, which, the report states, is not surprising in view of the substantial progress and large increase of output in 1909 and 1910 and the long continued strike in 1911 of coal miners in Alberta and British Columbia. The strike not only reduced the output of coal, but caused the closing down of the Granby smelter and consequently a lower production of copper, silver and gold than would otherwise have been obtained.

Of the total production in 1911 \$46,197,428, or 45 p.c., represents the value of metals and \$56,094,258, or 55 p.c., non-metallic products. Of the principal metals the value of gold was \$9,762,096, compared with \$10,205,835 in 1910. Silver amounted to 32,740,748 oz., value \$17,452,128, compared with 32,869,264 oz., \$17,580,455 in 1910; nickel to 34,098,744 oz., \$10,229,623, against 37,271,033 oz., \$11,181,310 in 1910; copper to 55,848,665 lb., \$6,911,831, against 55,692,369 lb., \$7,094,094 in 1910; lead to 23,525,050 lb., \$818,672, against 32,987,508 lb., \$1,216,249 in 1910; and pig iron to 917,535 tons, \$12,306,860, against 800,797 tons, \$11,245,622 in 1910. The production of coal in 1911 was 11,291,553 tons of the value of \$26,378,477, against 12,909,152 tons, \$30,909,779 in 1910.

Yield and value of principal metals and of coal.

Mr. Thomas W. Gibson, Deputy Minister of Mines for the province of Ontario, has supplied a special statement as to mines and minerals in the province during the calendar year. He writes that the products of the mines and mineral works of Ontario for the year 1911 had a value of \$41,975,427, based on the selling price at the point of production in the form produced. As compared with 1910 this was an increase of \$2,661,532.

Mineral production of Ontario, 1911.

The silver output of Ontario in 1911 was 31,507,880 oz., the total for Canada being about 2,000,000 oz. more. Ontario's yield comes from the mines of Cobalt, which since their opening in 1904 have yielded in all 125,572,069 oz. of silver, having a value of \$64,317,458. A feature of the year was the growth in shipments of bullion from the mine, bars being sent out containing 3,141,976 oz., as compared with 980,633 oz. in 1910. The concentration of low grade ores is now a regular practice, concentrates shipped amounting to 9,375 tons as against 6,845 tons in 1910. This development of treatment processes has had the natural effect of reducing the gross shipments from the camp, which were 26,653 tons in 1911 as compared with 34,282 tons in 1910. The mines of Cobalt are now operated almost wholly by hydraulically generated electric power derived from the falls on the Montreal and Matabitchuan rivers. The works for treating the Cobalt silver ores at Copper Cliff, Deloro, Thorold and Orillia handled 9,330 tons in 1911, recovering therefrom 17,756,651 oz. of silver. Cobalt oxide aggregating 62,859 lb. was shipped for consumption mostly in Europe and the United States, and 388,139 lb. of the mixed oxides of cobalt and nickel. Including the refineries 3,494 employees were engaged in the silver industry last year, earning wages amounting to \$2,921,751. Dividends to the extent of \$8,733,958 were paid to shareholders in silver mining companies in 1911, making a total since mining began in 1904 of \$31,122,867 not including privately owned mines or close corporations.

Silver.

The nickel mines of the Sudbury district are operated by two companies, the Canadian Copper Co. and the Mond Nickel Co. The former obtained its ores from the Creighton, Crean Hill

Nickel.

and No. 2 Mines; the latter from Victoria No. 1 and Garson. From these there was raised in 1911 a total of 612,511 tons of ore. The quantity smelted was 610,788 tons, yielding 32,607 tons of Bessemer matte. The matte contained 17,049 tons of nickel, worth \$3,664,474, and 8,966 tons of copper, worth \$1,281,118. The employees of the two companies numbered 2,439, to whom were paid \$1,830,526.

Iron ores. Of iron ore 175,061 tons were produced in 1911 from the Helen, Moose Mountain and Atikokan mines. A large deposit of sideritic ore is being opened up at Magpie by the Lake Superior Corporation. This ore will require preliminary roasting. The production of pig iron amounted in 1911 to 526,610 tons. Of the ores smelted 637,631 tons were of domestic and 84,814 tons of foreign origin.

Petroleum and natural gas. Petroleum has been steadily lessening in yield for a number of years, the output in 1911 being 10,102,801 imperial gallons, a decrease of over 900,000 gallons for the year. Natural gas on the other hand shows an increased production from year to year. In 1911 it amounted in value to \$2,186,762, as compared with \$1,490,334 in 1910. A very large proportion of the northern shore of Lake Erie is now producing gas.

Mineral production of Quebec, 1911. In the province of Quebec the mineral production is also making considerable progress. According to the reports of the Mines Branch of the provincial Department of Colonisation, Mines and Fisheries the total value of the mineral production of Quebec has increased from \$2,546,076 in 1900 to \$8,679,786 in 1911. The principal mining products included in this latter total are asbestos, 102,224 tons, \$3,026,306; cement, 1,588,283 barrels, \$1,931,183; brick, 176,532 thousand, \$1,129,480; and lime and limestone of the value of \$1,412,736. The Quebec mineral industry gave employment in 1911 to 7,846 men whose wages amounted to \$3,365,803.

Industrial disputes, 1911. The number of strikes and lockouts in Canada in 1911, as reported in the Labour Gazette of January 1912, was 104, compared with 87 in 1910 and 69 in 1909. Approximately the number of persons involved was 28,918 in 1911, 19,543 in 1910 and 17,881 in 1909. The time lost in working days amounted approximately to 2,018,740, compared with about 718,745 days in 1910. Of the 104 disputes in 1911 98 commenced in that year while six were in existence in the previous year. The great increase in working days lost was largely caused by the continuance until May 27 1911 of the coal strike at Springhill, N.S., which began on August 10 1909, and by the duration for nearly eight months of a coal strike involving 7,000 men in Alberta and eastern British Columbia. As a consequence of this strike an Order in Council was passed on July 31 remitting the duty on coal at all ports of entry along the international boundary west of Sault Ste. Marie for consumption in the prov-

inces of British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. The Order was revoked after the termination of the strike by Order in Council of December 16. These were the two most important disputes during the year; the only other one in which industrial conditions were largely affected was a general strike of the building trades in Vancouver, B.C., which impeded building operations there from June 5 to July 25.

Since the beginning of the present century a marked increase has occurred in the prices of commodities, an increase which is not confined to one country but which is felt with more or less intensity throughout the civilised world. In 1910 the Labour Department published a special report by Mr. R. H. Coats on Wholesale Prices in Canada during the 20 years 1890 to 1909, and this has been since followed by similar reports on the prices of 1910 and 1911. In these reports prices are measured by means of index numbers based upon the average prices of from 230 to 261 selected commodities in the period 1890-1899. In 1890 the index number for 235 commodities was 110.3. From this date the course was downward until 1897 when the percentage figure was 92.2. Then occurred a sharp upward rise which continued with a slight fall in 1901 until 1907 when the figure reached was 126.2. Falling to 120.8 in 1908 a further rise occurred until last year when the highest point yet reached was recorded, viz. 127.3. Thus wholesale prices in Canada during 1911 were 27.3 p.c. higher than the prices of the closing decade of the nineteenth century.

According to Bradstreets of January 6 1912 the total number of commercial failures in Canada in 1911 was 1,359, as compared with 1,459 in 1910. This is a decrease of 4.1 p.c. from 1910, and the number is the smallest reported since 1907. The assets amounted to \$6,399,647 and the liabilities to \$12,799,001. The latter total represents a decrease from 1910 of 21.3 p.c. and is also the smallest since 1907. The record in Dun's Review of the same date gives the number of commercial failures in Canada as 1,332 compared with 1,262 in 1910, the assets amounting to \$9,964,604, compared with \$11,013,396 in 1910, and the liabilities to \$13,491,196, compared with \$14,514,650 in 1910.

Commercial
failures, 1911.

On August 28 a despatch was received from the Colonial Office stating that His Majesty the King had been graciously pleased to approve of the Naval Forces of Canada receiving the style of the "The Royal Canadian Navy" and of the ships-of-war of that navy being designated as "His Majesty's Canadian Ships". On December 16 the following regulations were published with regard to the distinguishing flag and pendants to be flown by the ships of the Royal Canadian Navy :

Canadian
Naval Service.

All ships and vessels of the Royal Canadian Navy shall fly at the stern the white ensign as the symbol of the authority of the Crown, and at the jack staff the distinctive flag of the Dominion of Canada, such distinctive flag being the blue ensign with the arms of the Dominion inset in the fly. The white pendant will be flown at the masthead.

At special conferences between the British Admiralty and the representatives of Canada and Australia, held in London in June at the time of the Imperial Conference to which reference has already been made, it was decided that the Canadian and Australian Governments should have their own naval stations as agreed upon from time to time. The Naval Stations for Canada were settled for the present to consist of two, one on the Atlantic coast and the other on the Pacific coast. The Canadian Atlantic Station will include the waters north of 30° north latitude and west of the meridian of 40° west longitude and the Canadian Pacific Station will include the waters north of 30° north latitude and east of the meridian of 180° longitude.

On July 29, during gale and fog, H.M.C.S. Niobe sustained damage by grounding on the coast off Cape Sable. On November 17, at Halifax, N.S., a court martial, composed of officers of a British squadron, found the Niobe's navigating officer guilty of negligence in suffering the vessel to strand and sentenced him to be severely reprimanded and dismissed his ship. Another officer of the Niobe was also reprimanded.

Especially gratifying were the successes gained by Canadian marksmen at the annual meeting of the British National Rifle Association held July 10 to 22 at Bisley, England. The MacKinnon Cup, for competition in long range shooting open to teams of 12 men representing the territorial and militia forces within the Empire, was gained on July 15 by the Canadian team for the third year in succession. On July 19 the Prince of Wales's prize and on July 22 the King's prize—the premier trophy of the meeting—were won by a member of the Canadian contingent, the successful marksman in both of these events being Private W. J. Clifford, of the 10th Royal Grenadier Guards, Toronto. The Canadian contingent numbered 20 marksmen, and was under the command of Lieut.-Col. G. A. Stimson, R.O., with Major W. W. Burland, 3rd V.R.C., as adjutant.

From August 16 to September 6 a composite team of Canadian artillery, selected from field, heavy and coast defence units and consisting of nine officers and 41 non-commissioners and men under the command of Lieut.-Col. Neil F. MacNachtan, were in England for the purposes of training and of taking part in the competitions of the National Artillery Association of Great Britain. The team were successful in several important events, taking first place and winning the Canada Cup for field artillery at Lydd, second place for heavy battery on Salisbury Plain, first place for coast defence and winning the Prince of Wales's prize in the Isle of Wight and retaining the Londonderry cup for heavy battery at Lydd. In the report of their Commanding Officer the members of the team received high praise for exemplary conduct, soldierly bearing and enthusiastic devotion to duty.

The thirty-third annual Canadian National Exhibition was held by the Industrial Exhibition Association at Toronto from August 29 to September 9 and was opened by His Excellency Earl Grey, Governor General of Canada. During the 12 days of the Exhibition the attendance reached the record total of 926,500, the largest attendance in one day being 151,000 on Monday, September 4. The total receipts amounted to \$336,178 and the profits to \$46,576.

Amongst present efforts of social amelioration none should appeal more strongly to public support than those which having regard to the future manhood of the Empire seek to build up character and form habits of discipline in boys. Cadet corps, boys' brigades and other quasi-military organisations have for many years done good work; but the latest institution of this type—the boy scout movement—has within three years attained to extraordinary influence and popularity throughout the British Empire and even in foreign countries.

Scouting is essentially for the purpose of character building, and it includes training in discipline, unselfishness and courtesy. The Canadian boy has usually plenty of resourcefulness and self reliance, which scouting develops, so much so that he may be inclined to be too independent and to be lacking in the other qualities mentioned. In a scout's training his loyalty and obedience are developed as matters of honour, and his instruction in woodcraft, camp work, pioneering, etc., tends to make him far more efficient as a soldier should he decide later to adopt a military career. Personal responsibility for his own physical development and health are encouraged in each boy, and he is trusted, on his honour, "to do a good turn every day". The movement is interdenominational, and the prerogatives of pastors and parents are not interfered with; but the observance and practice of whatever form of religion is professed is insisted upon. The main duty impressed upon each boy is the daily practice of chivalry and helpfulness to others.

When inaugurated early in 1908 by General Sir Robert Baden-Powell, the defender of Mafeking, the movement was intended to be used by existing boys' organisations, with, in some cases, unattached troops and patrols. Its rapid spread has however resulted in separate organisations, and in Great Britain the Boy Scouts' Association is now incorporated under royal charter with His Majesty the King as Patron and Sir Robert Baden-Powell as Chief Scout.

For the control and direction of the movement in Canada upon lines of general uniformity a headquarters council was formed at Ottawa in 1910, with an executive committee under His Excellency the Governor General (Earl Grey). Provincial councils, each with a commissioner and secretary, were formed for the nine provinces. On November 18 1911 H. R. H. the Governor General accepted the position of Canadian Chief Scout vacated by Lord Grey upon leaving Canada, and all Canadian warrants

are now issued in His Royal Highness's name. A contingent of 130 scouts from Canada visited England for the coronation under the command of Lieut.-Col. F. Minden Cole. They were honoured with a place along the route of the coronation procession, and on July 4 they attended a Scouts' Rally to H. M. the King in Windsor Great Park. On September 30 1911 the Boy Scouts of Canada numbered 13,808 in 297 associations.

Loss of Royal Northwest Mounted Police patrol. In February Inspector F. J. Fitzgerald and his three companions, members of a patrol of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police from Fort McPherson to Dawson, Yukon Territory, lost their lives through exposure and starvation after heroic but vain attempts to return to Fort McPherson for food and shelter. The bodies of the victims of this terrible tragedy were found within the Arctic Circle to the south of Fort McPherson.

Forest fires. Early in July forest fires of more than ordinary severity devastated the Porcupine mining districts of Ontario. Reaching their maximum severity about July 11 they assumed in fact the dimensions of a national disaster. About 70 persons lost their lives, the towns of Cochrane and South Porcupine were destroyed and damage to property occurred that was variously estimated at from one-and-a-half to three million dollars. Funds in aid of the sufferers were collected immediately by public subscription, and prompt relief in the shape of militia tents and blankets was furnished by the Dominion Government. Other forest fires during the same month of exceptionally dry weather occurred in Nova Scotia and British Columbia.

Heat wave of July 1911. Heat of unprecedented intensity characterised the weather of Ontario during the first six days of July. In many places in the peninsula the thermometer registered shade temperatures of 100° F. or higher on four successive days. At Stonecliffe, Ottawa river, 109° were recorded on July 2 and 103° at Chatham, Stony Creek, Renfrew and Toronto.

Department of Secretary of State. The number of charters of incorporation issued during the fiscal year 1911-12, including supplementary charters, was 658, as compared with 544 for the last fiscal year 1910-11. The total capitalisation of the new companies during the year 1911-12 was \$447,627,000, and the capital of existing companies was increased during the year by \$42,939,000, making the total of the capital authorised for the year to amount to \$490,566,000. as compared with \$483,131,400 for the previous year.

Juvenile Delinquents Act, 1908. The Juvenile Delinquents Act 1908 was put into force in three cities during 1911, viz., Halifax, February 11, Toronto, December 1, and Montreal, December 28. These, with Victoria, Vancouver, Winnipeg, Ottawa and Charlottetown, make eight cities in Canada to which the act now applies.

Post Office savings banks. Post Office savings banks have been authorised to accept deposits amounting to \$1,500 in any one year, and the maximum limit of an account has been fixed at \$5,000, exclusive of in-

terest. Formerly no more than \$1,000 could be accepted from a depositor in one year, and the maximum limit of an account was \$3,000.

For some years past the British Post Office has been endeavouring to have British postal notes adopted as a universal medium of exchange throughout the Empire. Owing however to the fact that Canada has already a postal note system of its own the Canadian Post Office Department has seen great difficulty in acceding to this scheme in its entirety; but has, during the past year, made arrangements by which British postal notes drawn on Canada will be paid at the post offices of the various cities in Canada.

A convention has been entered into for a direct exchange of parcels by post between Canada and France, the steamers of the Allan Line plying between Montreal and Havre being employed for the service. This is supplementary to the existing parcel post exchange with France by way of England. While the direct service is by slower steamers than those employed in the parcel post service by way of England the rates of postage on parcels sent direct are considerably lower. A convention for the direct exchange of parcels by post between Canada and St. Vincent, British West Indies, came into operation on October 1 1910.

The London Gazette of September 21 announced that H. M. the King had been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal of the First Class to Mrs. McFall, widow of the late William McFall, of Ottawa, who on April 14 under circumstances described remained heroically at his post, sustaining fatal injuries but preventing serious loss of life which in all probability would otherwise have occurred amongst 40 passengers on the train. On March 1 the Edward Medal of the second class was awarded by His Majesty to Albert H. Adcock for risking his life to save a little girl from being run over by a railway train at St. John, New Brunswick, on August 25 1909.

The rural population in 1911 was 3,924,328 and the urban population 3,280,444. In 1901 the rural population was 3,349,516 and the urban population 2,021,799. NOTE. New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Ontario and Quebec, the original provinces of the Dominion, were given representation in Parliament as provided in the B.N.A. Act, 1867, s. 37. British Columbia was admitted 20 July, 1871, by an Imperial Order in Council of 16 May in the same year, and Prince Edward Island, on 1st July, 1873, by a like order of 26 June in the same year. Chapter 3 of 33 V. provided that on, from and after a day the Queen should by Order in Council admit Rupert's Land and Northwest Territory into the Dominion, there should be formed out of the same a province to be called the province of Manitoba. The admission of Rupert's Land and Northwest Territory was made under an Imperial Order in Council of 23 June, 1870, to date 15 July of the same year. Manitoba was admitted under authority of chapter 3 of 33 V., 1870; but a doubt having arisen, the Imperial Parliament in 1871 passed an Act to make the Canadian Act valid and effectual. The Northwest Territories Representation Act, chapter 24 of 49 V. (assented to June, 1886), gave two members to Assiniboia, one member to Alberta, and one to Saskatchewan.

IRON BLAST FURNACES IN CANADA IN 1911.

Of eighteen completed furnaces fifteen were in blast in 1911 for varying periods of time. The operating companies, with numbers and capacities of furnaces, were as follows :—

Dominion Iron & Steel Company, Sydney, C.B.: four completed furnaces of 280 tons capacity each per day ; one operated throughout 1911, one for 305 days, one for 272 days, and the fourth for 244 days.

Nova Scotia Steel & Coal Company, Limited, New Glasgow, N.S., one furnace at Sydney Mines, C.B.: of 200 tons capacity ; operated 360 days.

Londonderry Iron & Mining Company, Limited, Londonderry, N.S.: one furnace of 100 tons capacity ; idle throughout the year.

Canada Iron Corporation, Limited, Montreal, Que.: two small furnaces of seven and eight tons capacity, at Drummondville, Que., one being operated 106 days ; one furnace of 25 tons daily capacity, at Radnor Forges, Que., idle throughout the year ; two furnaces of 125 tons and 250 tons at Midland, Ont., operated for 365 days.

Standard Chemical Iron & Lumber Company of Canada, Limited, Deseronto, Ont., one furnace with a daily capacity of 65 tons ; operated for 11 months during 1911.

The Steel Company of Canada, Limited, Hamilton, Ont.: two furnaces, one of 200 tons capacity operated for 308 days in 1911, a second furnace of 300 tons capacity, operated 327 days in 1911.

Algoma Steel Company, Limited, Sault Ste. Marie, Ont. : three furnaces at Steelton, near Sault Ste. Marie, two of 250 tons capacity each, operated for 310 and 357 days respectively ; and one of 450 tons capacity, operated for 261 days.

The Atikokan Iron Company, Limited, Port Arthur, Ont.: one furnace of 100 tons capacity ; operated for 228 days during 1911.

The total daily capacity of the eighteen furnaces is about 3,580 tons.
