PUBLICATIONS OF THE DOM BUREAU OF STATISTICS

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics was established in 1918—under the Statistics Act, a consolidation of all previous statistical legislation, enacted in that year by Parliament—to form a central statistical department for Canada, which would co-ordinate and revise the existing statistics and extend them as required to meet Canada's needs.

In the years since its creation, the Bureau has greatly extended the scope of its work and now collects, compiles and analyses statistical data relating to all important and significant phases of the national economy. In the course of this expansion, the Bureau has developed its organization and methods to enable it to provide a wide range of closely up-to-date statistics on various segments of the country's economic and social activities both for public information and use by private enterprise and government.

To make its information freely and conveniently available, the Bureau issues numerous periodical and special reports and bulletins, many brief releases, and a number of bound publications. Some of these are printed from type by the King's Printer, but the Bureau itself operates its own offset printing presses and completely prints as well as publishes the majority of its reports, bulletins and special releases.

DISTRIBUTION POLICY

The distribution of Bureau publications is based on the policy of sales to the public at actual cost of paper and presswork only. The alm is to extend the service and make the information available as widely as possible.

COVERAGE OF LIST

The following list includes all regularly issued releases, reports and bulletins, special reports of recent issue and those of earlier date containing information still of interest or basic utility, and reports of the decennial census of Canada and the quinquennial census of the Prairie Provinces from 1931 inclusive. It should be noted that the list of Bureau publications is not a rigidly fixed one. New reports are added to meet new needs or demands for information not previously compiled, and likewise the issue of reports is stopped if the need or demand for their information falls off or ceases.

LIST ARRANGEMENT

For practical convenience, the list is divided into two parts. Part I contains the reports and bulletins of planned regular, periodical issue and special reports, other than Census reports, while Part II consists only of Census reports.

Publications in Part I are grouped under general subject headings, which are in alphabetical order from AGRICULTURE to VITAL STATISTICS, except for the GENERAL (omnibus) group, which is placed first.

Those in the larger groups are further divided under sub-headings. Listings in each group or sub-group are generally in alphabetical order of title, but other arrangements have been adopted in some instances for reasons of practical convenience. Cross references have been added to meet pussible confusion or uncertainty over group classification.

DESCRIPTION OF PUBLICATIONS

The entry for each publication gives the title in bold type (except for some series of Census bulletins), frequency of issue (monthly, annual, etc.), subscription rate or single copy price, a brief indication of the nature and extent of contents (except for those in groups covered by a general descriptive nate), and the usual number of pages as a further indication of the extent of contents. Following abbreviations are used: W—weekly; M—monthly; Q—quarterly; TA—three times a year; SA—semi-annual; A—annual; Sp.—special; Eng. and Fr.—separate English and French editions.

GROUP SUBSCRIPTIONS

A copy of each publication issued by the Burcau, with the exception of the Daily and Weekly Bulletins, the reports on external merchandise trade, and the Fact a Day about Canada, may be obtained at a special subscription rate of \$30 a year. There are other special rates for series of publications in related groups; these are given in the respective sections of the list.

ORDERS AND REMITTANCES

Except as otherwise indicated in this list, orders for publications should be addressed to the Dominion Statistician, Dominion Bureau of Statistics, Ottawa, and be accompanied by the necessary remittance in the form of a cheque or money order made payable to the Receiver General of Canada, Owing to numerous similarities in titles, applicants should be careful to state clearly the publication or series of reports wanted as shown in this list. In cases where they are unable to decide which of the listed publications will supply the information they want, Bureau officials will make every effort to assist them if they will supply a clear and full statement of their requirements.
