## Functions of the Bureau

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics was established under the Statistics Act of 1918 to form a central statistical department. It now operates under the Statistics Act of 1948 (revised in 1953) which defines its duties as follows:
(a) to collect, compile, analyse, abstract and publish statistical information relative to the commercial, industrial, financial, social, economic and general activities and conditions of the people;
(b) to collaborate with all other departments of the government in the collection, compilation and publication of statistical records of administration according to any regulations;
(c) to take the census of Canada as provided in this Act; and
(d) generally to organize a scheme of co-ordinated social and economic statistics pertaining to the whole of Canada and to each of the provinces thereof.

## Organization

The Bureau is organized in fourteen functional divisions, comprising an Administration Division, Mechanical Tabulation Division, eleven statistical or subject divisions and an Information Services Division. The latter twelve-most of which have two or more sections - are responsible for the preparation of the publications shown in this list. The names of these divisions and of their sections are as follows:

## Distribution of Publications

The distribution of Bureau publications is based on the policy of sales to the public at cost of paper and presswork only. The aim is to make the information as widely available as possible, and so costs of compilation are not included in the prices. At the same time a charge is made to avoid the danger of waste in free distribution.

## Classification of Publications

For further purposes of economy and efficiency in distribution, Bureau publications are divided into three classifications:
(a) regular periodical reports;
(b) periodical reports of more limited interest called Memoranda and designated by the abbreviation' $M$ " in the list;
(c) reports or releases on results of special studies called Reference Papers and designated by " $R$ " in the list.

## Subscriptions

In addition to the rates for individual publications shown in the list, Bureau publications may be obtained at the following group subscription rates and group discounts:

All regular periodical reports (excluding Memoranda) $\$ 30.00$ a year.

All Memoranda - $\$ 15.00$ a year.

All Reference Papers - $\$ 5.00$ a year. (If issues do not reach the aggregate subscription value of $\$ 5.00$ in the year a credit will be allowed).

Orders for selected publications to subscription value of more than $\$ 5.00$ :

25 per cent discount on value in excess of $\$ 5.00$ and up to $\$ 20.00$;

50 per cent discount on value in excess of $\$ 20.00$.
Note: No discount applies on first $\$ 5.00$ subscription value.

Example. Cost of an order to subscription value of $\$ 34.00$ would be: $\$ 5.00$ plus $\$ 11.25$ ( $\$ 15.00$ less 25 per cent) plus $\$ 7.00$ ( $\$ 14.00$ less 50 per cent) $=\$ 23.25$.

## Orders and Remittances

Orders should be addressed to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, Ottawa and should be accompanied by the necessary remittance in the form of a cheque or money order made payable to the Receiver General of Cansda. Postage stamps should not be used in payment.

Owing to numerous similarities in titles of publications, care should be taken to state clearly the title of the report wanted. Titles are shown in the list in black face.

Bureau officials will make every effort to assist persons unable to decide which of the publications will supply the information wanted, if they will provide a clear statement of their requirements.

## Arrangement of List

In the arrangement of the list, the aim has been to make it as easy as possible for a person unfamiliar with the Bureau organization to find a report on a given subject.

Publications are listed under twenty-three main headings. Except for the first heading "General", under which are listed the daily, weekly, monthly and annual publications providing summaries of information on the full range of Bureau releases, these main headings are in alphabetical order.

In some cases, there are two or more sub-headings under a main heading, and these also are in alphabetical order. Beneath the main headings and sub-headings, publications are listed in alphabetical order of titles, the latter being broken where necessary to give the significant word first. Numerous cross-references are also provided. The following contents table shows the main features of the arrangement.

## Index

In order to facilitate for users of Bureau publications the location of the title or titles of publications in which specific information is contained, the Bureau has in preparation a detailed commodity and subject index to its publications as a supplement to this list.

For the purpose of this index, each publication has been given a catalogue number, which appears in the left-hand column opposite the title. These numbers will be used in the index to indicate the publication or publications in which specific data will be found. From these numbers it will be easy to locate the required titles.
