## PREFACE

This edition of the Statistics Canada Catalogue of Publications updates the titles released as of June 30, 1976 and incorporates the listings contained in the 1975 issue and its supplement. It is intended that this edition, and its supplements, will remain in use until 1978.

All publications from both the 1971 Census of Population and Housing and the Census of Merchandising and Services are included, although in certain instances the publications will be issued after June 30, 1976

Among the new features of the 1976-77 Catalogue are a special listing of publications containing urban data, and the International Standard Serial Numbers (ISSN) assigned to Statistics Canada publications by the National Library. Also listed for the first time are the public libraries which make all of Statistics Canada's publications available for reference.

Part II of the Catalogue, which provides information about unpublished information, has been enlarged, as has the section dealing with selected statistical publications of other Federal Government departments and agencies.

Users should note that the 1975 edition discontinued listing all "vintage" publications, many of which were out-of-print. It is therefore suggested that those wishing to refer to such publications should use the 1973-74 issue, since it provides a link between the Historical Catalogue ( $11-504$ ) and the current edition. Together, these provide a record of Statistics Canada publications since the Bureau was formed in 1918.

It is expected the 1976 Census publications will be listed in a separate Catalogue.

## INTRODUCTION

Statistics Canada responsibilities in the Canadian statistical system concern the whole range of statistics on the economic and social activities and conditions of the Canadian pcople.

The bureau's publishing program reflects this responsibility, and is designed to make statistical information readily available to users in the form in which it is most frequently wanted, including publications, computer tapes, and microform. Data are also available on-line through the CANSIM system.

It is obviously not practicable to publish compilations which will serve every purpose or need. Therefore, users should keep in mind that a considerable volume of unpublished information is available from Statistics Canada on request, on a cost-recovery basis.

This Catalogue is presented in two main sections: Part 1 provides annotations on publications bearing catalogue numbers, while Part 11 provides information on unpublished or uncatalogued materials referred to above.

All information compiled by Statistics Canada is subject to the clauses of the Statistics Act which protect organizations and persons from individual disclosure.

## How to Use The Catalogue

For many users of Statistics Canada information, the Table of Contents beginning on page 5 will lead to the statistics wanted. For others, however, the Title, Subject, and Commodity Index beginning on page 217 will be helpful. It contains several thousand entries arranged in alphabetical order and is cross-referenced to show the several publications (if such is the case) in which information on a given subject may be found.

Under the Statistics Canada system of cataloguing, each publication is assigned a fivedigit catalogue number which is printed in large type in the upper left-hand corner of the front cover. These catalogue numbers are a permanent means of identification, additional to the title.

This use of cataloguc numbers on Statistics Canada publications is in line with suggestions made by various large users of bureau publications; for these and others, it should facilitate and simplify both the ordering and filing of bureau publications.

## Formation of Five-digit Catalogue Numbers

First Digit: Under the grouping arrangement, all Statistics Canada publications are classificd into 9 major subject groups, as follows: (I) Gencral; (2) Primary Industries; (3) Manufacturing; (4) Manufacturing (concluded); (5) Transportation, Communications and Utilities; (6) Commerce, Construction, Pinance and Prices; (7) Employment, Unemployment and Labour Income; (8) Education, Health and Welfare; and (9) Census, Population Estimates, Citizenship and Immigration. Thus, the first digit in the catalogue number ranges from 1 to 9 .

Second Digit: Each of the above 9 major groups is further divided into 1 to 9 subgroups as required. An example: Major Group 3 (Manufacturing) is divided into six sub-groups - (1) General Survey; (2) Foods, Beverages and Tobacco; (3) Leather and Rubber Products; (4) Textiles and Apparel; (5) Wood Products; (6) Paper Products and Printing. Numbers 7,8 and 9 have not been allothed and will provide for possible future sub-groups.

Third Digit: The third digit indicates frequency of publication as follows: " 0 " and " 1 ", issued more than once a year; " 2 " and " 3 ", annuals; " 4 " biennials; " 5 ", occasional publications; and "6" annual/various - annuals with variable sub-titles.

Fourth and Fifth Digits: The fourth and fifth digits are used to give each title its own permanent number. The numbers are allotted in chronological sequence as new titles are published.

Example Catalogue Number: The following is a typical example of the application of the above catalogue numbering system: Catalogue number 31-001 has been assigned to the Statistics Canada report entitled Inventories, Shipments and Orders in Manufacturing Industries

> 3 - Manufacturing (Major Grouping)
> 1 - General Survey (Minor Grouping)
> 0 - Periodical (in this case, monthly)
> 01 - First title in this particular grouping.

The main features of this grouping arrangement, including code numbers of main subject groups and specific sub-groups are shown in the Table of Contents on page 5 . These grouping do not coincide with the bureau's Divisional organization and Division titles are of no assistance in ordering or cataloguing Statistics Canada publications.

International Standard Serial Numbers (ISSN). - The National Library of Canada is assigning 8 -digit International Standard Serial Numbers (ISSN) to Statistics Canada serial publications (periodicals and annuals). The purpose of this numbering system is to facilitate identification, citation, ordering, check-in and automated control of serials among countries. Numbers assigned by the National Library to June 30, 1976 have been included in the appropriate annotations in Part I of the Catalogue. An example: 21-003 Quarterly Bulletin of Agricultural Statistics. Bil. Approx. 282 pp. (ISSN 0033-5320).

## Local Access to Data

Statistics Canada has a Central Inquiries Service which operates as a focal point to deal with inquiries from the general public. This group of specialists is thoroughly conversant with the variety of information available throughout the burcau and is also knowledgeable about other sources of information in the federal and provincial governments as well as private organizations. The group can be reached by writing to Statistics Canada, Ottawa K1A 0T6, or by telephoning (613) 992-4734 or 992-2959. The lafter telephone is equipped to record requests on a 24 hom a day basis.

Also, Regional Advisors are located in Statistics Canada Regional Offices across Canada. These officers have backgrounds in business and government, and will suggest ways to solve problems using Statistics Canada data. Addresses and toll-free telephone numbers of these officers and their support staffs are listed on page 12.

Statistics Canada publications are also available for reference in libraries, including the National Library, federal and provincial legislative libraries, and major public and university libraries. The Statisties Canada Library holds the historical colloction of all bureaupublications and provides a reference service to the statistical information included in them. Libraries mak ing publicly avalable all publications are tisted on pate 13.

## Ordering Publications

The descriptive notes provided with each title or group of tiles listed are intended to serve only as a guide to their contents. They should be sufficient, in most cases, to help iif the selection of publications for any specific purpose. If in doubt, contact any of the


How to Order. - When ordering, catalogue numbers, titles and issues (month, year), of publications should be quoted.

Subscriptions or standing orders are accepted for all periodical and annual publications, but not for biennial and oecasional publications. Subseriptions should be forwarded to Publications Distribution, Statistics Canada, Ottawa KIA 0T6, and order forms will be found at the end of the Catalogue. Individual publications may be ordered from either Publitations Distribution, or the regional offices listed on page 12 may be of assistance.

Those interested can order the Full Publication Service and receive all Statistics Canada publications automatically as soon as they are released. The current cost is $\$ 840$ per year for the service to locations in Canada and $\$ 1,008$ for the service to locations elsewhere. An additional charge is levied if Air Mail dispatch is required.

The Full Publication Service does not include decennial or quinquennial Census publications which are priced at $\$ 300$ ( $\$ 360$ outside Canada) for the 1971 series on population, agriculture, houscholds and families, and the labour force. The cost in Canada for the 1971 Census series on Merchandising and Services is $\$ 24.75$, and $\$ 29.70$ to other countrics.

How to Make Payment. - Regulations require that renittance be made prior to the servicing of subscriptions or the mailing of single issues. Purchasers will avoid delay by including remittanee with their order.

Alternatively, purchasers may use Publishing Centre eredit accounts, and receive regular statements. Account application lorms are available from the Publishing Centre, Supply and Services Canada, 270 Albert St., Ottawa K1A 0S9, of from the Regionat Advisors listed on page 12 of the Catalogue.

Prices listed in this Catalogue apply to Canada, and customers in countries outside Canada should add $20 \%$ to cover postage and handling charges. An additional charge is levied if Air Mail is required. Prices of publications are subject to change without notice.

Renittances should be in the form of cheque or money order made payable to the Receiver General for Canada. Postage stamps and currency should not be used in payment for publications.

## Publications in Microform

Byarrangement with Micromedia Limited, all publications issued by Statisties Canada and its predecessors from pre-Confederation to date (1841-1975) are being released on microfiche over a five-year period. All nicrofiche are identified with catalogue numbers used in Statistics Canada Catalogues, including the Historical Catalogue of Dominion Burcau of Sfatistics Publications 1918-1960 (Ot tawa, 1967): thus fiche may be filed and retrieved in the same sequence as printed publications. ## Standard Geographical Classification

The Standard Geographieal Classification is a system for the identification and coding of geographical areas. It consists of a set of geographical units, usually municipalities, each identified by a unique code number which reflects municipal boundaries as of December 31, 1973 (January 1, 1974 for Ontario), and a list of place names related to these units. The objective of the system is to make available a standard set of geograplinical units which, when used throughout Statistics Canada and elsewhere, will facilitate the comparison of statisties for particular areas. ## 3: MANUFACTURING

## Description of Reports

Publications listed under "Manufacturing" relate to Division 5 of the Standard Industrial Classification.

These publications consist of a large number of reports, some of which provide summarized and analytical information for manufacturing as a whole and others which provide detailed information on individual manufacturing industries or on various commodities.

Although titles of the various reports are broadly indicative of the subject matter covered, explanatory notes have been included under title headings where necessary. Such notes are generally restricted to reports dealing with the manufacturing industries as a whole (sub-group 31) and to those publications dealing with commoditics. The reports on individual industries are gencrally similar to each other in character and include such principal statistics as: number of establishments, number and type of employees and their salaries and wages, cost of fuel and electricity, value of shipments of goods of own manufacture, and value added. Comparative statistics are given for Canada for earlier years and for the preceding year for provinces. Also shown are the value and, where applicable, quantities of major products shipped and purchased materials used by establishments classified to the industry. Some reports also show total manufacturers' shipments of relevant commodities without regard to industry of origin, but this is given comprehensively for all commodities in
an annual report on products shipped by Canadian manufacturers.

Primarily due to the fact that annual surveys cannot be initiated until the end of the calendar year and to the time required to collect, edit and compile extensive data, most annual industry reports are not available until a year or more after the end of the year of survey. However, two-page preliminary bulletins providing data on shipments of goods of own manufacture and on principal statistics by province are issued to subscribers as soon as the statistics on individual industries are compiled, expediting their availability to users considerably. Other preliminary bulletins are also published relating to manufacturing as a whole.

In addition there are a large number of publications which are published more frequently than once a year and which contain current information on commoditics (generally shipments, production or consumption). Although not exactly suitable to industry analyses, except in the case of one-industry commodities, they have proven to be most useful in commodity analyses.

Current estimates of the value of shipments, inventorics and orders for manufacturing industries in total, numerous sub-aggregations and selected industries are issued monthly. They are based on a sample survey of establishments representing about $75 \%$ of the shipments, determined from the Census of Manufactures.

## PART II

## UNPUBLISHED INFORMATION

Part Il of this Catalogue consists of iso mam elements, data files and information apart from data files which is generally described as unpublished information. This latter is information which may be useful to a limited number of individuals or organizations, but which is not published because the interest in it is not considered to be sufficiently broad.

Data files include summary tapes, punch card decks and micro data files. These latecr are files of individual survey records which have been stripped of any information tending to identify the individual, family, household, etc., to which the record relates.

Unpublished information includes special tabulations, copies of special statements, computer print-outs, and so on. Some unpublished non-statistical information, teclinical papers and maps such as census maps are also available.

Like all information issued by Statistics Canada, however, data files and unpublished information are subject to the limitations of the Statistics Act which prevents the disclosure of information tending to Identify individual persons or companies.

In instances where a request for unpublished information or a data file can be met without a considerable amount of time and effort, there is no charge. In some cases where the work to be done is substantial, a charge may be made. In still other cases a standard charge is made. Where charges are not specified in this Catalogue an estimate of cost will be provided before the work is undertaken.

Some of the elassifications in use in the bureau can be made available in machine-readable form. Those interested
in acquiring such material should apply in the first instance, to the Standards Division, Statistics Canada, Ottawa KIA 0T6. Otherwise, your dealings would be with the subject area division which produces the information you are interested in or with the Regional Advisor in your region listed on page 12 of this Cataloguc.

## Computer Print-outs and Microfilm

In addition to the tabular results released it the form of reports or butletins, a large number of tables were produced in the form of computer print-outs. These tabulations were microfilmed and their contents can be made available as photocopies or on microfilm, subject to confidentiality constraints. Data in these formats are individually prepared on reguest and a charge to cover the cost of reproduction is made.

Microfilm of the foregoing tabulations are on 16 -millimeter diazo film and are supplied in conventional 100 -foot rolls ( $1,500-2,500$ images). Silver copies are available on a special order basis.

In most cases, more than one tabulation will be found on an individual roll of microfilm. However, only complete rolls are supplied. Cartridges and cartridge loading are the customer's own responsibility. More information can be obtained by contacting the Census User Inquiry Service.

## Maps and Geographic Reference Materials

Large scale maps depicting the boundaries of the 1971 Census enumeration areas and other statistical areas can be purchased. These include an urban map scries, a rural map series and a census tract map series showing enumeration areas (i.e. the territory covered by each enumerator in taking the census). In addition, various sinall scale maps are available depicting census divisions and other statistical areas. Maps from the 1971 Census are also available on 35 -millimeter microfilm. A detailed list of the reference maps indicating scales, dimensions and costs can be obtained by requesting "Availability of Reference Maps 1971, Census 1 ield". (G-71).

Official Lists, identifying the composition of administrative and statistical areas (i.c. counties, cities, towns, villages, municipalities, census tracts, metropolitan arcas and census agglomerations) in terms of the component enumeration areas and census codes, are available at nominal cost.

Street Indexes providing the link between civic addresses and enumeration areas (and census tracts where they exist) were compiled for 59 centres in
the year preceding the 1971 Census and are available in published form and on magnetic tape. Indexes for 37 of the largest centres have been updated as of June 1, 1971 and are available at nominal cost in the form of computer printouts and also on computer tape.

## Magnetic Tape Files

Area Master Files describe the street network and other plysical features as defined by means of geographic coordinates within a designated area. Presently there are 16 census metropoli$\tan$ areas for which this file is available.

Cartlib is a geographic boundary file of Census divisions and Census tracts in a format usable by computer mapping programmes.

The GEOGRAPHY TAPE FILE links the snrallest unit of collection, namely Enumeration Areas and corresponding centroids to all higher level geographic codes such as l'ederal Electoral Districts, Municipalities, Counties, Cities, Towns, Villages, etc. for all of Canada. This file also provides a linkage between Census and Standard Geographic Codes.

Other general reference materials available include Enumeration Area and Census Tract Deseriptions, changes in Municipal Boundaries, Census Tract and Enumeration Area Correspondence Tables.

## User Summary Tapes

A large number of tables were produced and are available on computer tapes. The tape files contain tabulated data and usually have more detail than is provided in printed reports. The summary tapes allow users to aggregate the tabulations either on a geographic basis or by combining data cells. They are available for a variety of geographic areas includ ing enuineration areas (225-500 persons), census tracts ( $2,000-4,000$ persons) and municipalities (Population 5,000 and over).

The tape files are organized to provide Canada-wide coverage for a particular geographic level. Separate tape series have been produced for the short 2 A . form ( $100 \%$ coverage) questions, the long 2 B -form ( $1 / 3$ sample) questions, and for the census of agriculture. Additionally for the first time, micro data in the form of public use sample files based on $1 \%$ sample of the 1971 Census are also available.

In addition to tapes containing tabulated information from the census questions, several tapes containing supplementary geographic data are available. The most commonly used are the Geography Tape and the Statistical Area Boundary File (CARTL1B). The former contains the complete higher level geographic codes for all enumeration areas (which is the smallest collection unit) and the latter contains a machine-readable base map (geographic boundaries) for computer mapping of census tracts and and census divisions. Other files include area master and street index files.

## Special Tabulations

Insofar as eonfidentiality constraints permit, Statistics Canada will produce for users, at cost, special computer tabulations not included in the main programme. In most cases, these special tabulations will be produced using the Geographically Referenced Data Storage and Retrieval System (GRDSR) commonly known as Geocoding. The GRDSR system is designed to provide flexibility in cross-tabulation and specification of the geographical areas (i.e., user defined areas) for which special tabulations are to be produced.

Special tabulations can be produced in hard copy (print-out) form, or on magnetic tape. Cost estimates will be provided upon submission of the tabulation specifications. Users desiring special tabulations are requested to be as precise as possible in deseribing their requirements. Essential specifications are: the
exact variables or characteristics required; the set of responses or categories to be reported for each characteristic; and the specific geographic units for which data are to be tabulated. An illustration of the desired table layout and acceptable alternatives for any of the above will facilitate understanding of the specifications and processing of requests. Turn-around time for such requests will depend upon the complexity of the tables and availability of resources and the demand. Contracts and prepayment or deposits may be required.

## Education

## Other Information

Computer tapes with the same information published in regular reports are available to users interested in obtaining
revised time series of selected commodity classes or collating with related economic data. Also available on tape is information tailored to user's specifications, e.g. by mode of transport, region of lading, etc.

## Microfiche

Commencing January 1975 a new subscription service was made available to users of Trade of Canada data. This constitutes complete copies on microfilm of regularly published reports. Micro-filming facilitates casier access and quicker dissemination of information as welt as enormous space savings. For example, the detailed monthly report "Exports by Commodities" (Catalogue 65-004) reproduced on three microfiches can be delivered to users approximately one month before the printed report.

## Reconciliation of United States Canada Trade Statistics

The United States - Canada Trade Statistics Committec has published two reports containing information on the methods and resulis of the bilateral resoarch program on the reconciliation of the two country's counterpart trade figures for the years 1970-1972. These reports were published jointly by the U.S. Department of Commeree, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C., and StatisticsCanada. Copies can be oblained from the External Trade Division. ## Family Expenditure

Input-Output tables for the years 1361-66 have been completed and pubished at two levels of aggregation, small and mediun. Work is underway on the compilation of annual tables for the years 1967 to 1971. A feature of the InputQutput tables for the 1970's will be a geatly expanded number of eommodities

tries will accord, in most cases, with the 4-digit level in the 1970 Standard Industrial Classification (S.I.C.). For historical continuity, a concordance has been prepared between the input-output commodity classification and the principal commodity classification as well as between the Input-Output industry classification, the 1960 S.I.C. and the 1970 SIC.

There is also work underway to prepare constant price Input-Output tables. Analysis of constant price equivalents may necessitate some revisions in the current price commodity balances. Such revisions to the 1961-66 data will be released with the Input-Output tables for 1967-71. It is planned to have the current price tables for the years 1967-71 completed by mid-1976, with the constant price results to follow by the end of the year.

## Labour

## Labour Force Statistics

Sul-prowincial data are alse provided.

## Structural Analysis

Structural Economic Models: A User's Guide. The International Classification of Diseases, Adapted for use in the United States (ICDA) is an explanded version of the Fighth Revision of the International Classification of Diseases (ICD) published by WHO. It is designed for the classification of morbidity and mortality information for statistical purposes, and for the indexing of hospital records for data storage and retrieval. The ICDA contains a coding and classification system for surgical operations and procedures not found in the ICD.

It is, however, an essential adjunct to the Tabular List, since it contains a great number of diagnostic terms which do not appear in Volume 1.

This book, produced on behalf of Statistics Canada by the C.D. Howe Research Institute, had its origins during International Women's Year as a continuing contribution to the role of women in Canadian Society. It is designed to broaden understanding of the role of women both for the general reader concerned with the place of women in society and for professionals in the disciplines of demography, economics, law, sociology and statistics.

The book contains a presentation of Statistics Canada data on women's participation in the family, educational institutions and the labour force and a comprehensive analysis and evaluation of the evidence. It contains an examination of the effectiveness of existing policies and proposes new ones relevant to the role of women. As the title indicates, a theme of the book is the extent to which wonten, and men, have opportunities to make choices concerning their roles.

## Title, Subject and Commodity Index

This combined Title, Subject and Commodity Index has been designed to help users locate the required publications. It contains numerous cross-references. Numerical references are to catalogue numbers of the publications for which further descriptive information is provided in the main part of this catalogue. All main words in titles are capitalized.

While this index contains several thousand references to subject and commodity data, not all subjects and commodities covered in Statistics Canada publications are listed. Excluded are the commodities covered in export and import statistics, which are adequately indexed in the Trade of Canada Commodity Classification 112-520F: ).

Again, the publication "Products Shipped by Canadian Manufacturers" (Catalogue 31-211) contains a detailed ahphabetical list of commodities manufactured in Canada, showing value and amount of production for the year covered. No reference is made to the publication in the index, except where the production statistics are not shown in any other publication. However, users may assume that manufactured commodities entered as appearing in other reports also appear in Catalogne 31-211.

In the case of other omissions, the entries for related items often afford a clue to where information, if available, may be found. Lastly, the coverage is increasing and those who cannot locate what they seek should send an incuiry to the Central Inquiries Service, User Advisory Services Division.
