

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FARM CASH INCOME

APRIL TO JUNE 1952



FARM CASH INCOME FROM THE SALE OF FARM PRODUCTS, JANUARY - JUNE, 1952 1/

During the first six months of 1952, Canadian farmers received an estimated 1,226.7 million dollars from the sale of farm products and from grain adjustment and participation payments on previous years' crops. This estimate is 2.0 per cent below the corresponding 1951 figure of 1,251.9 million dollars, but is well above the 1950 estimate of 886.6 million dollars. In addition, supplementary payments made to western farmers under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act amounted to only 2.4 million dollars during the first half of 1952 as against 13.5 million and 9.3 million dollars received during the respective periods of 1950 and 1951.

Two items appear to be largely responsible for the decline in the six-months total of farm cash receipts. Whereas nearly 183 million dollars were received by western farmers in the form of participation and adjustment payments during the first half of 1951, only about 64 million dollars were received in the corresponding period of this year. Income from the sale of live stock at 408.6 million dollars was nearly 20 per cent below the 1951 six-months figure of 501.2 million dollars. Lower marketings of cattle and calves together with a general and substantial drop in average live-stock prices contributed largely to this significant contraction in live-stock receipts. Cattle prices which started to decline at the beginning of the year, dropped still further after the Saskatchewan outbreak of Footand-Mouth disease in February and the imposition by the United States of an embargo on the imports of Canadian cattle. On April 9 the Agricultural Prices Support Board was authorized to establish support prices for cattle on the basis of \$25.00 per 100 lb. for good steers at Toronto, with appropriate differentials for other markets and other classes of cattle. Strengthening of cattle prices commenced early in May and continued throughout most of June. Hog marketings, up substantially during the first half of this year as compared with the same period a year ago, have been more than offset by significantly lower prices. Hog prices have been supported since February 16 at \$26.00 per 100 lb. Grade A dressed carcass, basis Toronto.

The heavy marketings of western grains which occurred during the first quarter of the year continued during the ensuing three-month period. This situation arose as a result of the adverse weather conditions in western Canada last fall which delayed harvesting to such an extent that by the end of the year there were an estimated 150 million bushels of wheat and about 135 million bushels of oats and barley still in the field. Favoured with warm, dry weather the harvesting of this carry-over got underway at the beginning of April and continued until completion early in May.

Income from the sale of potatoes was up as a result of higher prices. Income from dairy products at 177.6 million dollars in 1952 was 4.1 per cent above the 1951 six-months figure of 170.5 million dollars. Lower egg prices more than offset increased sales to give an income from this source of 52.1 million dollars as against 59.7 million in 1951.

Farm cash income from the sale of farm products was down in Nova Scotia, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba and British Columbia; in absolute terms the greatest decline occurred in Ontario while on a percentage basis it took place in Manitoba. For the remaining provinces farm cash income was up, with the greatest gain in absolute terms occurring in Saskatchewan and on a percentage basis in Prince Edward Island.

The estimates are based on reports of marketings and prices received by farmers for principal farm products and are subject to revisions as more complete data become available. The estimates include amounts paid out as grain participation, adjustment and equalization payments and those Dominion and Provincial payments which farmers receive as subsidies to prices. Payments made under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act are not included in the totals for "Cash Income from the Sale of Farm Products", but are included in the grand totals in the year in which payments are made under the heading "Supplementary Payments".
