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

FARM CASH INCOME FROM THE SALE OF FARM PRODUCTS 1/

Preliminary estimates indicate that during the first quarter of 1953, Canadian farmers (excluding Newfoundland) received a total of 531.1 million dollars from the sale of farm products and from wheat adjustment payments on previous years' crops. This figure is 5 per cent below the 559.8 million dollars realized in the corresponding period of 1952, but is 10 per cent above the estimate of 481.1 million for the first quarter of 1951. Supplementary payments made to western farmers under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act were quite small, amounting to only 0.9 million dollars during the first three months of this year as against the corresponding payments of 7.9 million in 1951 and 1.8 million dollars in 1952.

Substantially smaller wheat payments and reduced returns from the sale of potatoes, tobacco and hogs accounted largely for the reduction in cash receipts during the first quarter of 1953. These declines more than offset a significant increase in income from the sale of wheat and moderately larger returns from barley, eggs, dairy products, cattle and calves.

Wheat payments made by the Canadian Wheat Board during the first three months of 1953 totalled slightly less than three million dollars as compared with 48.9 million dollars for the same period of a year ago. As outlined below, this situation may be explained in the light of the effective dates of the announced increases in initial wheat prices to producers in 1952 and 1953. In each of the two years it was announced that the initial producer price per bushel for all grades of western wheat at Fort William-Port Arthur and Vancouver would be increased by 20 cents, except durum wheat in 1953 which was increased by 25 cents per bushel. At the same time it was announced that adjustment payments equal to the increase in initial prices would be made to producers for their deliveries of wheat from the beginning of each of the two crop years to the effective date of the announced increases. In 1952 the increase became effective on the first of February while in 1953 it did not become effective until the first of March, or one month later than in the previous year. As a result, the payment of the major portion of these retroactive increases for 1953 have been delayed by one month, or from the latter part of the first quarter until the forepart of the second.

Largely as a result of substantially lower prices, cash receipts from the sale of potatoes during the first quarter of 1953 totalled only 11.6 million dollars as against 17.5 million for the same period a year ago. A smaller crop and reduced prices combined to provide returns for tobacco of 45.4 million dollars during the first quarter of 1953, 13.4 per cent below the 1952 level. Income from the sale of hogs was down 10 per cent to 70.6 million dollars, due to lower average prices and smaller marketings.

A heavy year-end carry-over of the record 1952 crops of high quality western wheat and barley provided unusually large marketings of these crops during the first quarter of 1953. As a result, receipts from the sale of wheat during this period amounted to 112.2 million dollars, 36.4 per cent above the first quarter level of a year ago. Barley income too was up by about 16 per cent, to 19.0 million dollars. Income from eggs at 29.7 million dollars for the first three months of 1953 was 23.5 per cent above the level of receipts received during

the comparable period of 1952 as a result of larger marketings and higher prices. Lower prices for dairy products were more than offset by increased sales to give a total income from this source of 72.9 million dollars, an increase of 5.6 per cent over the 1952 level. Substantially larger marketings of cattle and calves more than compensated for marked declines in prices to provide receipts amounting to 81.2 million dollars as compared with 76.1 for the first quarter of 1952.

Declines in cash income were registered for all provinces except Nova Scotia, Saskatchewan and Alberta and ranged all the way from 5.2 per cent in British Columbia to 24.9 per cent in Manitoba. The gains registered were of minor proportions, ranging from one per cent for Nova Scotia to 2.8 per cent for Alberta.

In Table 1 below, is summarized the preliminary estimate of cash income from the sale of farm products, by provinces, for the first quarters of 1952 and 1953, and revised estimates for 1951. Tables 2, 3 and 4, overleaf, present farm cash income by commodity sources for each province in the three years and include supplementary payments. No information is available for Newfoundland.

The estimates are based on reports of marketings and prices received by farmers for principal farm products and are subject to revisions as more complete data become available. The estimates include amounts paid out as grain participation, adjustment and equalization payments and those Dominion and Provincial payments which farmers receive as subsidies to prices. Payments made under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act are not included in the totals for "Cash Income from the Sale of Farm Products", but are included in the grand totals in the year in which payments are made under the heading "Supplementary Payments".
