

## NE PASCASH INCOME

JULY TO SEPTEMBER 1953



During the first nine months of 1953 Canadian farmers (excluding Newfound-land farmers) received an estimated 1,901.5 million dollars from the sale of farm products and from participation payments on previous years' grain crops, the largest cash returns yet to be recorded for this period of the year. This estimate is 4 per cent above the corresponding 1952 figure of 1,827.2 million dollars and nearly 2 per cent above the 1951 estimate of 1,867.1 million dollars. Supplementary payments made to western farmers under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act amounted to only 1.1 million dollars during the first three quarters of 1953 as against 10.1 million and 4.5 million dollars received during the respective periods of 1951 and 1952.

The maintenance of farm cash income at this record high level can be attributed primarily to the unusually large amounts of western wheat delivered by producers during the January-September period of this year at weighted average initial prices somewhat higher than a year ago. While initial prices for specific grades were unchanged from a year ago, the higher grading in 1952 resulted in a higher weighted average initial price. Total wheat participation payments of 70.2 million dollars up to the end of September were well above the 51.0 million dollars paid during the same period of 1952. Slightly larger marketings of barley are reflected in the small increase in cash returns from this crop. Although receipts from most of the other grain crops were down by varying amounts, these declines were far from sufficient to offset increased returns from wheat and barley, with the result that total income from grains, seeds and hay rose to an estimated 713.9 million dollars up to the end of September 1953, about 16 per cent above the corresponding estimate of a year ago.

The major offset to the total increased returns from grain crops was provided by reduced receipts from other field crops such as tobacco, vegetables and potatoes. Of these crops the greatest reduction occurred in the case of potatoes. As a result of substantially lower prices, income from this crop estimated at 23 million dollars is about 56 per cent below the high level of 1952.

Total returns from live stock and poultry at 542.6 million dollars were only about one per cent below the 1952 level. Returns from cattle and calves rose from 237.9 million dollars in 1952 to 250.2 in 1953; a significant increase in marketings more than compensated for declining prices. In addition, poultry income was up about 5 per cent to 75.9 million dollars in 1953. More than offsetting these gains however, were the reduced income from the sale of hogs and slightly smaller returns from sheep and lambs. Higher prices for hogs only partially counterbalanced the substantial decline which took place in marketings.

Increased production accounted for the gain of approximately 9.0 million dollars in receipts from dairy products. A substantial increase in both prices and marketings accounted for the increased returns from the sale of eggs.

Increases in farm cash income were recorded in only three provinces, Nova Scotia, Saskatchewan and Alberta. The largest increase, both on a percentage basis and in absolute terms, occurred in Saskatchewan followed in order by Alberta and Nova Scotia. On a percentage basis the largest decline took place in Prince Edward Island, while in absolute terms it occurred in Quebec.

The estimates are based on reports of marketings and prices received by farmers for principal farm products and are subject to revisions as more complete

data become available. The estimates include amounts paid out as grain participation, adjustment and equalization payments and those Dominion and Provincial payments which farmers receive as subsidies to prices. Payments made under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act are not included in the totals for "Cash Income from the Sale of Farm Products", but are included in the grand totals in the year in which payments are made under the heading "Supplementary Payments".
