## FARM CASH INCOME FROM THE SALE OF FARM PRODUCTS, JANUARY-MARCH, 1954 1/

Cash receipts to Canadian farmers (excluding Newfoundland) from the sale of farm products during the first three months of 1954 are estimated at 504.3 million dollars. This estimate is nearly 6 per cent below the 536.2 million realized during the same period of 1953 and about 9 per cent below the all-time high first-quarter estimate of 555.7 million dollars established in 1952. A decline in farm cash income occurred in all provinces except Quebec, Manitoba and British Columbia. These declines ranged from less than one per cent for Ontario to 28 per cent for Saskatchewan. Gains were recorded in three above mentioned provinces, ranging from about 7 per cent for Quebec to nearly 22 per cent for Manitoba. Supplementary payments made to western farmers under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act amounted to 2.1 million dollars during the first three months of this year as against 1.8 million and 0.9 million dollars for the same period of 1952 and 1953 respectively. Contributing largely to the reduced income for the first quarter of this year were smaller returns from the sale of wheat, barley, rye, potatoes, cattle and calves.

By far the largest decline in income for any one commodity occurred in the case of wheat when receipts dropped from 112.8 million dollars for the first three months of 1953 to 49.7 million for the corresponding period of this year. To a large extent this substantial decline can be attributed to much smaller marketings, and to a lesser extent to somewhat lower average prices. As a result of congested country elevators, wheat deliveries by western producers during this period were reduced to about 40 per cent of the level established during the same period of 1953. Lower wheat prices during the first quarter of 1954 were due largely to a lack of increase in initial prices such as took place during the same period a year ago. Initial wheat prices of \$1.40 per bushel basis No 1 Northern at the Lakehead, in effect during the first two months of 1953, were increased to \$1.60 on March 1, 1953. Initial producer wheat prices for the first quarter of this year remained unchanged at \$1.40 per bushel, basis No 1 Northern, in store Fort William-Port Arthur. Offsetting to some extent the significant decrease in wheat receipts was the distribution of part of the final payment on the 1952-53 western wheat crop during the first quarter of this year. Amounting to 27.7 million dollars, it compares with payments of about 3.0 million dollars made during the corresponding period of 1953.

During the first quarter of this year, cash income from the sale of barley was estimated at 11.8 million dollars, down by nearly 40 per cent from the 1953 estimate for the same period as a result of much smaller marketings. Larger marketings of potatoes were far more than offset by a significant lowering of prices providing an income of 5.8 million dollars, 50 per cent below that realized during the first three months of 1953.

Income from the sale of cattle and calves estimated at 81.0 million dollars was down nearly 9 per cent from the estimate of 88.7 for 1953. Lower prices more than offset an increase in marketings. On the other hand a very substantial increase in hog prices far outweighed smaller marketings to provide a total income from this source of 82.0 million dollars, about 21 per cent above the 1953 level. Receipts for poultry meat at 26.8 million dollars for the first quarter of 1954 were also substantially higher than for the same period in 1953.

Cash receipts from the sale of eggs at 32.9 million dollars for the January-March period of this year were 11.8 per cent above those for the same period of 1953. Although egg prices averaged somewhat lower this year, marketings were substantially higher. Farm income from dairy products at 79.1 million dollars for the first quarter of 1954 compares with 77.5 million realized in 1953. Higher production more than offset slightly lower prices.

In Table 1 below, is summarized the preliminary estimate of cash income from the sale of farm products, by provinces, for the first quarters of 1953 and 1954, and revised estimates for 1952. Tables 2, 3 and 4, overleaf, present farm cash income by commodity sources for each province in the three years and include supplementary payments. No information is available for Newfoundland.

The estimates are based on reports of marketings and prices received by farmers for principal farm products and are subject to revisions as more complete data become available. The estimates include amounts paid out as grain participation, adjustment and equalization payments and those Dominion and Provincial payments which farmers receive as subsidies to prices. Payments made under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act are not included in the totals for "Cash Income from the Sale of Farm Products", but are included in the grand totals in the year in which payments are made under the heading "Supplementary Payments".

NOTE: - Marketing estimates for live stock and some live-stock products for 1952, 1953 and 1954 are based on 1951 Census data. Consequently income estimates for these commodities for these years are not strictly comparable with earlier years.
