

## FARM CASH INCOME

APRIL TO JUNE 1954



Prepared in Research Section, AGRICULTURE DIVISION

During the first six months of 1954, Canadian farmers (excluding Newfoundland) received an estimated 1,093.9 million dollars from the sale of farm products and from participation payments on previous years' wheat crops. This estimate is 7.5 per cent below the 1,182.6 million dollars realized during the same period of 1953 and nearly 12 per cent below the all-time high January-June total of 1,241.7 million dollars established in 1951. The total reduction in farm cash receipts between the first six months of 1953 and the same period of 1954 amounted to 88.7 million dollars, with 72.6 million of this reduction occurring in the second quarter. The Prairie Provinces and Prince Edward Island accounted for the entire reduction in cash income with declines ranging from six per cent for the latter province to 36 per cent for Saskatchewan. Gains were registered for the remaining provinces varying from less than one per cent for New Brunswick to about nine per cent for Quebec. Contributing largely to the reduced income for the first half of this year were substantial reductions in returns from wheat, barley, barley participation payments, rye, corn and potatoes.

Wheat accounted for more of the decline in cash income than any other single commodity. As a result of much smaller marketings and lower prices, total receipts from this commodity during the first six months of this year amounted to only 132.7 million dollars, 45 per cent below the total of 242.9 million dollars for the same period a year ago. Wheat deliveries in western Canada were about 40 per cent below the level of marketings for the first half of 1953. No increase was made in the initial producer price of wheat during the first half of this year such as was made during the same period a year ago. The initial wheat price of \$1.40 per bushel basis No 1 Northern at the Lakehead, in effect during the first two months of 1953, was increased to \$1.60 on March 1, 1953. The initial producer wheat price for the first half of this year remained unchanged at \$1.40 per bushel, basis No 1 Northern, in store Fort William-Port Arthur. Income from the sale of barley was also well below the level established a year ago as a result of substantially smaller marketings and lower prices. As in the case of wheat, no increase was made in the initial price of barley during the first six months of 1954.

In contrast to field crop receipts, returns from the sale of live stock and products were higher during the first six months of 1954 as compared with the same period a year ago. Larger marketings for all live stock more than offset lower prices for all classes except hogs to give a total return of 368.5 million dollars, 16 per cent above the 1953 level of 317.4 million dollars. Income from cattle and calves at 185.8 million dollars was about seven per cent above the 1953 level, while income from hogs at 180.5 million was nearly 27 per cent higher.

Cash income from the sale of eggs at 62.3 million dollars during the January-June period of 1954 compares with 60.3 million for the same period in 1953. Lower egg prices were more than offset by higher marketings. Farm income from dairy products at 200.5 million dollars in 1954 compares with 196.5 million dollars a year ago.

In Table 1 below, is summarized the preliminary estimate of cash income from the sale of farm products, by provinces, for the first six months of 1953 and 1954, and revised estimates for 1952. Table 2, 3 and 4, overleaf, present farm cash income by commodity sources for each province in the three years and include supplementary payments. No information is available for Newfoundland.

The estimates are based on reports of marketings and prices received by farmers for principal farm products and are subject to revisions as more complete data become available. The estimates include amounts paid out as grain participation, adjustment and equalization payments and those Dominion and Provincial payments

which farmers receive as subsidies to prices. Payments made under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act are not included in the totals for "Cash Income from the Sale of Farm Products", but are included in the grand totals in the year in which payments are made under the heading "Supplementary Payments".

NOTE: - Marketing estimates for live stock and some live-stock products for 1952, 1953 and 1954 are based on 1951 Census data. Consequently income estimates for these commodities for these years are not strictly comparable with earlier years.
