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

FARM CASH INCOME FROM THE SALE OF FARM PRODUCTS, JANUARY-MARCH, 1956 1/

A preliminary estimate indicates that farm cash income from the sale of farm products and from participation payments on previous years' grain crops amounted to 517.9 million dollars during the first three months of 1956. This is about 11 per cent above the first quarter estimate of 467.2 million dollars for 1955, and about one per cent above the estimate of 512.8 million dollars for 1954. The level of income established for the first three-month period of 1956 has been exceeded only by the record-high estimate of 555.7 million dollars established in 1952 and the 1953 figure of 534.4 million dollars. Increases occurred in all provinces except Prince Edward Island and Ontario and ranged all the way from about 7 per cent in New Frunswick to approximately 50 per cent in Saskatchewan. The increase in the cash income estimate for Canada as a whole is largely attributable to increased income from the sale of wheat and poultry meat and to significantly larger wheat participation payments. To a lesser extent, increased returns from the sale of oats, rye, flax, corn, cattle, dairy products and eggs also contributed to the increase in total farm cash income.

Field Crops Higher average farm prices and increased marketings provided an income from the sale of wheat during the first three months of 1956 of 69.1 million dollars as against 50.0 million dollars for the same period a year earlier. Participation payments, including those made in connection with the interim payment on the 1954 wheat crop, amounted to 22.3 million dollars during the January-March period 1956, well above the 0.2 million dollars paid during the corresponding period of 1955. As in the case of wheat, larger marketings and higher prices contributed to a significant increase in income from flaxseed. Larger marketings were entirely responsible for the enhanced income received from the sale of oats and rye. Of the grains, barley was the only one for which a reduction in farm cash income was recorded during the first three months of 1956, largely as a result of reduced marketings.

Substantially lower prices for potatoes contributed to the estimated lower income from this source so far this year. Income from tobacco, well below the first quarter level of 1955, reflects the sizeable reduction in output in 1955 as against 1954.

During the first three months of 1956 cash income from the sale of livestock and poultry amounted to 182.9 million dollars, about 4 per cent
above the 175.7 million dollars realized during the same period a year earlier.
Compared with a year ago, income from cattle and calves was up from 91.8 to 93.6 million
dollars; increased marketings more than offset lower prices. The greatest gain in this
sector was recorded for poultry when a substantial increase in marketings boosted income
from 11.3 million to 18.8 million dollars. Although hog marketings during the first
quarter of 1956 were above the first quarter level of 1955, the effect of this increase
was more than offset by lower prices to yield an estimated income of 68.7 million
dollars as against 70.8 million dollars in 1955.

Livestock Products

Income from dairy products at 84.8 million dollars for the

January-March period was 4.6 million dollars above the estimate
for the corresponding period of a year ago; increased production more than compensated
for lower prices. Higher average prices for eggs during the first three months of
this year together with a total output virtually unchanged from that of a year ago,
provided an income from this source of 32.8 million dollars, 12 per cent above the
1955 level for the same period.

The estimates contained herein are based on reports of marketings and prices received by farmers for principal farm products and are subject to revision as more complete data become available. They include in the period in which paid, grain participation payments and those Federal and Provincial Government payments which farmers receive as subsidies to prices. Payments made under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act are not included with cash income from the sale of farm products but are included in total cash income in the year in which payments were made, being classified as "Supplementary Payments."

In Table I below, is summarized the preliminary estimates of cash income from the sale of farm products, by provinces, for the first quarters of 1955 and 1956, and revised estimates for 1954. Tables 2, 3 and 4 present farm cash income by commodity sources for each province in the three years and include supplementary payments. No information is available for Newfoundland.

NOTE: - Marketing estimates for some livestock products for 1952, 1953, 1954, 1955 and 1956 are conditioned by 1951 Census data. Revisions for the intercensal period 1941-51 have not been completed and consequently, income estimates for these commodities since 1951 are not strictly comparable with earlier years.
