## FARM CASH INCOME FROM THE SALE OF FARM PRODUCTS

JANUARY - SEPTEMBER, 1957 1/

The 1957 third quarter preliminary estimate of farm cash income is 638 million dollars, down 60 million from the estimate of 698 million dollars for the corresponding period in 1956. This decline can be attributed largely to smaller grain marketings in the Prairie Provinces, particularly in Saskatchewan. Income from the sale of livestock and livestock products was higher in the third quarter of 1957 than a year earlier but did not offset the smaller returns from grains.

The preliminary cash farm income estimate for the nine months, January through September, is 1,847 million dollars about three per cent smaller than the estimate of 1,911 million dollars for a year earlier. This lower estimate for the nine month period can be attributed in the main to reduced returns from cereal grains. Compared with a year ago, smaller incomes in the second and third quarters more than offset the higher returns in the first quarter.

Field Crops - Farm cash income from the sale of field crops during the three months, July through September 1957, was estimated at 184 million dollars, down almost one-third from the estimate of 267 mil1ion dollars for the corresponding period in 1956. Although prices averaged somewhat lower, the major part of this decline was due to smaller marketings of cereal grains (wheat, oats, barley and rye).

Wheat accounted for more than half of the reduction in income from field crops during the third quarter. Lower incomes from cereal grains were noted in each of the Prairie Provinces with the greatest decline occurring in Saskatchewan. On the other hand, sugar beets and flaxseed, exercised a sustaining influence on farm income from field crops during this period. Income from sugar beets was substantially higher but returns from the sale of flaxseed were about the same as a year ago.

Farm cash income derived from field crops over the nine months January through September, 1957, was estimated at 618 million dollars, 87 million less than the estimate of 705 miliion for the corresponding period a year earlier. As in the third quarter, this lower estimate, compared with a year ago, can be attributed in the main to lower returns from cereal grains. Partially offsetting the effects of the lower returns from grains were substantial increases in returns from flaxseed, tobacco, sugar beets and participation payments on previous years' western grain crops.

[^0]Livestock and Livestock Products - Income from the sale of livestock and livestock products in the third quarter of 1957 was estimated at 412 million dollars, up 22 million or 6 per cent from the estimate of 390 million for the corresponding period of 1956. Poultry meat was the only major commodity in the livestock and livestock products group that returned less income to farmers in the third quarter of 1957 than a year earlier; this decline can be attributed to lower prices which more than offset the effects of higher marketings.

Returns from the sale of hogs accounted for the major portion of the third quarter increase in farm income from livestock and livestock products and can be attributed to higher prices which more than offset the effects of lower marketings. Returns from dairy products and cattle accounted for the remainder of the increase. The combined effects of both higher prices and larger marketings accounted for the increased returns from dairy products. Larger cattle marketings more than offset lower average prices.

Over the nine months January through September 1957, farm income from livestock and livestock products was estimated at 1,096 million dollars compared with 1,073 million dollars in the corresponding period of 1956. Increases were noted for all commodities except eggs and poultry. As in the third quarter, hogs account for the major portion of the increase in returns from livestock and livestock products followed by dairy products and cattle.

The estimates contained herein are based on reports of marketings and prices recefved by farmers for principal farm products and are subject to revision as more complete data become available. They include in the period in which paid, grain participation payments and those Federal and Provincial Government payments which farmers receive as subsidied to prices. Payments made under the provisions of the Prairie Farm Assistance Act are not included with cash income from the sale of farm products but are included in total cash income in the year in which payments were made, being classified as "Supplementary Payments".

In Table 1 overleaf is summarized the preliminary estimate of cash income from the sale of farm products, by provinces, for the first nine months of 1956 and 1957, and revised estimates for 1955. Tables 2, 3 and 4 present farm cash income by comodity sources for each province in the three years and include supplementary payments. No information is avallable for Newfoundland.

NOTE:- Marketing estimates for some livestock products for the years 1952-1957 are conditioned by 1951 Census data. Revisions for the intercensal period 1941-1951 have not been published and consequently, income estimates for these comodities since 1951 are not strictly comparable with available data for earlier years.
