## SUMMARY STATEMENT OF DAIRY PRODUCTION IN CANADA (January, 1941)

<u>CREAMERY BUTTER PRODUCTION</u> in January increased approximately 12 per cent as compared with the January make of 1940 and decreased 5 per cent, as compared with the output for the preceding month. During the month of January 11.7 million pounds of butter were produced as compared with 10.4 million pounds in January, 1940. The increase in the January make occurred in all provinces except New Brunswick and British Columbia.

<u>CHEESE PRODUCTION</u> decreased approximately 37 per cent in January as compared with January, 1940, and decreased 37 per cent as compared with the output for the preceding month. In January, 1941, the make was approximately 1.1 million pounds as compared with 1.8 million pounds in January, 1940. There was no cheese produced in New Brunswick and Saskatchewan in January; of the remaining provinces, all contributed to the decrease except Alberta and British Columbia.

The production of <u>CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS</u> for the month of December registered an increase of approximately 9 per cent as compared with the same month last year and an increase of 3 per cent as compared with the preceding month. During December 10.1 million pounds of Concentrated Whole Milk Products were manufactured in Canada and 2.2 million pounds of Concentrated Milk By Products. During the twelve months January to December 156.5 million pounds of the former and 39.0 million pounds of the latter were produced in condenseries and creameries in the Dominion, making a total of 12.3 million pounds for December and 195.5 million pounds for the twelve months ending December.

<u>CREAMERY BUTTER PRICES</u> at Montreal, as quoted daily by the Canadian Commodity Exchange for the first grade product, averaged 34 cents a pound, compared with 27 5/8 cents in January, 1940. Ontario coloured cheese at Montreal based on daily quotations averaged 14 cents in January compared with 18 1/4 cents in January, 1940.

The combined output of creamery butter and factory cheese during the month of January represented the equivalent of 286.0 million pounds of milk, registering an increase of approximately 21.1 million pounds as compared with the combined make in terms of milk for the same month a year ago. Creamery butter represented 95.6 per cent and cheese represented 4.4 per cent of the total.

Exports of Butter in January amounted to 66,300 pounds as compared with 115,700 pounds last month and 93,700 pounds in January, 1940.

Exports of Cheese in January reached a total of 866,700 pounds as against 3,969,700 pounds last month and 1,966,400 pounds in January a year ago.

The domestic disappearance of butter in the month of December amounted to 20.9 million pounds, representing an increase of 4.4 per cent as compared with the same month last year and a decrease of 15.5 per cent in comparison with the preceding month. This estimate is based on storage and transit stocks amounting to 33.6 million pounds at January 1, 1941, and exports and imports amounting to 115,700 pounds and 395 pounds respectively.



#### DAIRY PRODUCTION CONDITIONS

### Weather:

Temperature conditions during January ranged below normal throughout the Maritimes and Quebec and at Ottawa. Lennoxville and Ottawa marked the greatest drop below normal with 3.1 and 3.2 degrees below normal, while Charlottetown was 1.4 degrees under normal. Snowfall was heavy in the Maritimes, and at Morden, Manitoba, the snowfall of 17.25 inches was double that of normal. Generally speaking January was cloudy, with the exception of Ottawa which had 106 hours of sunshine, being 15 hours above average. At Harrow, Ontario, It was unusually cloudy with only 38 hours of sunshine against a normal of 86 hours.

#### Feed Prices:

Bran registered an increase of \$1.00 per ton at the end of January at Montreal while at Winnipeg the price was the same as at January 31, 1940. Oats declined approximately seven cents a bushel at Montreal and Winnipeg and barley declined about three cents a bushel at Montreal and six cents at Winnipeg. The price of Linseed Oil Cake, 38 per cent, was \$39.00 per ton as compared with \$39.50 on the same date as last year, while Cotton Seed Meal was quoted the same as last year.

### Milch Cows:

The numbers of milch cows on farms of Dairy Correspondents in December was practically the same as those reported in the same month of the preceding year and the percentage milking was only slightly higher than in December 1939.

#### Milk Production:

The reports from Dairy Correspondents indicated that milk production in December was practically on a par with the same month of 1939. The production per cow was 17.2 pounds per day; and, including those both dry and in milk, the average was 12.1 pounds. These figures are almost the same as reported in the corresponding month of the previous year.
