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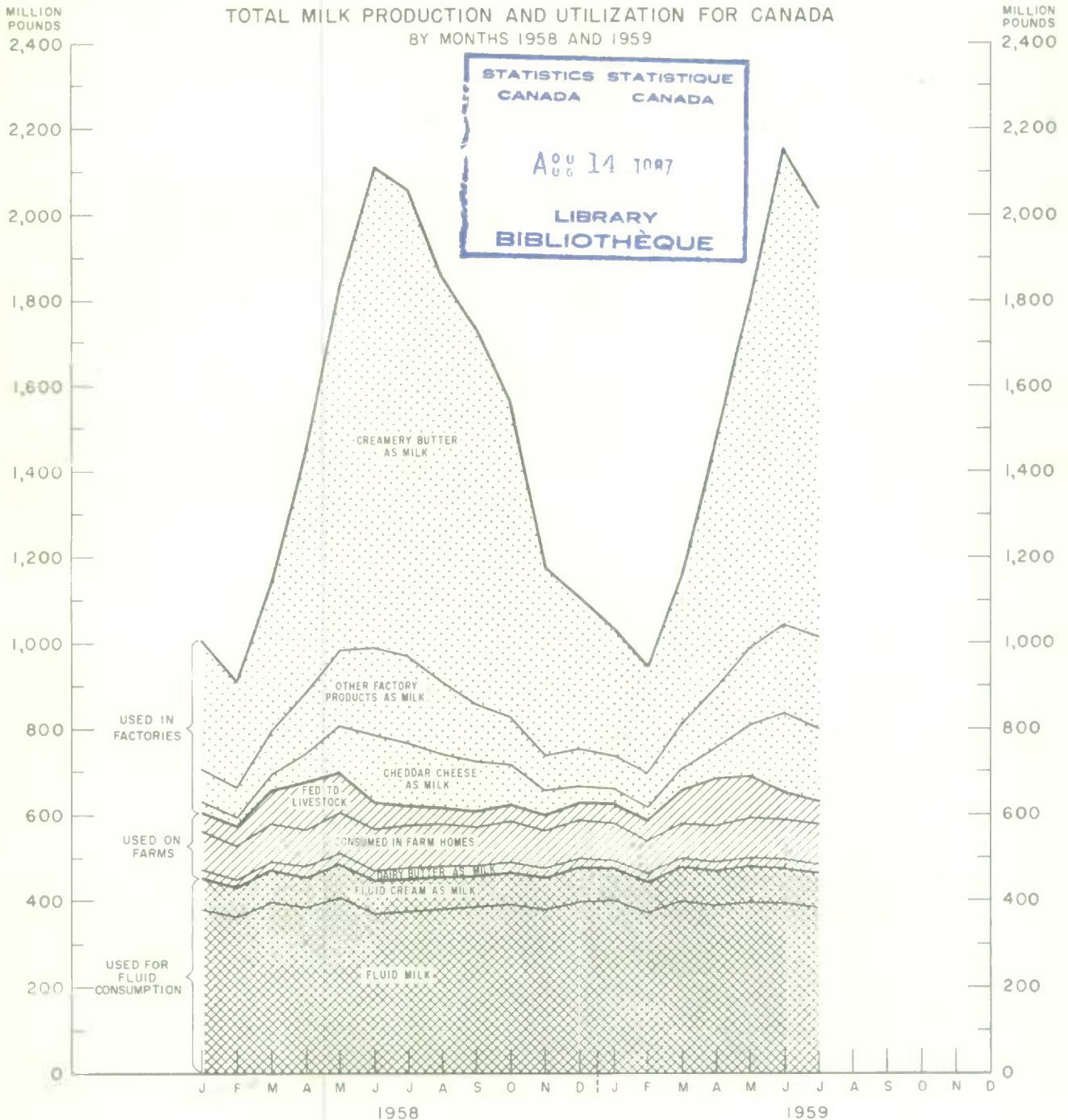


THE DAIRY REVIEW

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Preliminary Indications of the Dairy Situation in August, 1959

Total milk production during August is tentatively estimated at about 1,856,000,000 pounds, one-half of one per cent less than production in August last year. Cumulative January to August milk production was estimated at about 12,411,000,000 pounds, almost identical to production in the first eight months of 1958.

The manufacture of dairy factory products in August required about 2 per cent less milk than in the same month a year ago. The reduction in milk used for manufacture is reflected directly by a decline in creamery butter production of 6 per cent for the month of August and 3 per cent over the past 8 months. Utilization of milk for all other dairy products was equal to or greater than the corresponding period last year. The increase over August 1958 in milk used for cheddar cheese and concentrated whole milk products was 12 and 23 per cent respectively, both higher than the corresponding increases over the first eight months. Utilization of milk for ice cream production appears to show the influence of a warm summer as cumulative January to August production exceeded production in the same period last year by about 9 per cent.

The sale of fluid milk and cream in July and in the May, June and July period exceeded the corresponding period last year by about 2.5 per cent. For the purpose of the preliminary estimate, fluid milk and cream sales in August were estimated to have exceeded sales in August 1958 by the same percentage.

From the monthly survey of farmers keeping milk cows, indications are that milk consumed in farm homes was 3 per cent lower in August and, at 715,000,000 pounds, over one per cent lower during the first eight months than in the corresponding periods a year earlier. Milk pail-fed to livestock, on the other hand, was reported to be 19 per cent higher in August and, at 537,000,000 pounds, 4 per cent higher in the first 8 months. Cow numbers at August 15, on the farms covered by the monthly survey, were one-half per cent lower than at August 15, 1958. One per cent fewer cows were reported to be milking at this date. Milk production per cow on these farms however, was reported to be one per cent higher.

Farm Milk Production, Utilization and Income in July, 1959

Farm Milk Production: The estimated quantity of milk produced on farms in July amounted to 2,015,521,000 pounds, a decrease of 50 million pounds or 2.4 per cent below that of July, 1958. Of this amount, 1,385 million pounds or 68 per cent was utilized in factory production, and approximately 461 million pounds or 23 per cent was used for fluid sales. During January-July, the estimated production was 10,555 million pounds, a decrease of 9 million pounds from that produced in the same period of the previous year. The quantity of milk utilized for factory production in January-July amounted to 6,037 million pounds while fluid sales accounted for 3,267 million pounds.

Fluid Sales: Sales of fluid milk and cream, the latter expressed as milk, amounted to 461,246,000 pounds in July, an increase of approximately 11 million pounds in comparison with July of the previous year. This included about 386 million pounds of fluid milk, comprising about 19 per cent of the farm milk supply, and fluid cream sales of 75 million pounds representing 4 per cent. During the seven month period, fluid sales totalled 3,266,923,000 pounds, an increase of 78 million pounds or approximately 2.5 per cent over those of the corresponding 1958 period.

Farm Butter: Butter made on farms in July amounted to 887,000 pounds, decreasing 15 per cent from the corresponding month in 1958. For January-July, 5,895,000 pounds were produced, a decrease of 13 per cent from the same period last year.

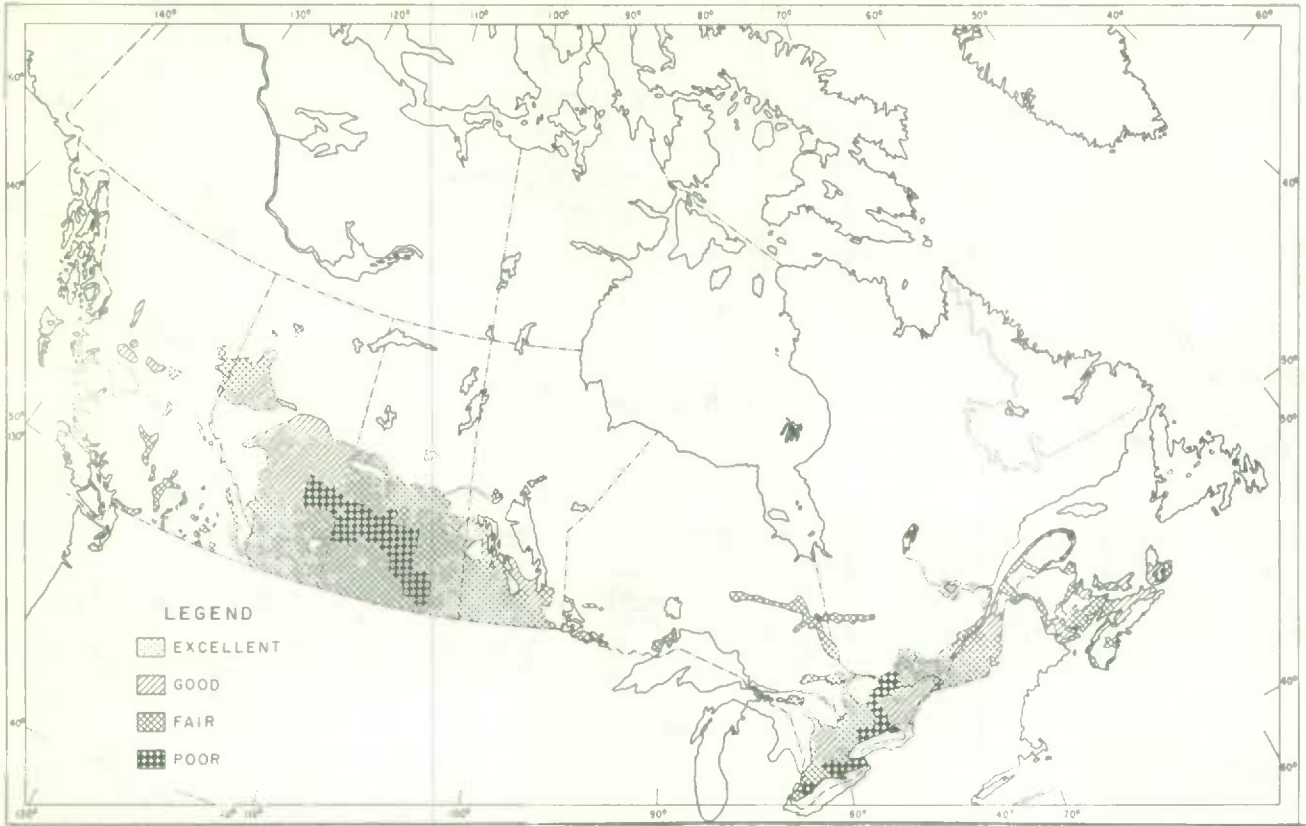
Farm Cash Income: Cash income from the sale of dairy products in July amounted to \$54,620,000. This represented an increase of approximately 1 per cent or \$369,000 in comparison with the same month last year. The weighted average price of \$2.96 per hundred pounds of milk was 10 cents higher than in July, 1958. Fluid milk at \$4.62 per hundred was 4 cents higher than July, 1958. Creamery butter-fat increased from 66.1 cents to 67.5 cents per pound, and farm butter at 60 cents was 2 cents lower than in July, 1958. Milk used in manufacture decreased from \$2.81 per hundred in July 1958, to \$2.78 per hundred in July, 1959. Cheese milk increased to \$2.92 per hundred, an increase of 39 cents per hundred in comparison with the same month a year earlier.

Pasture Conditions

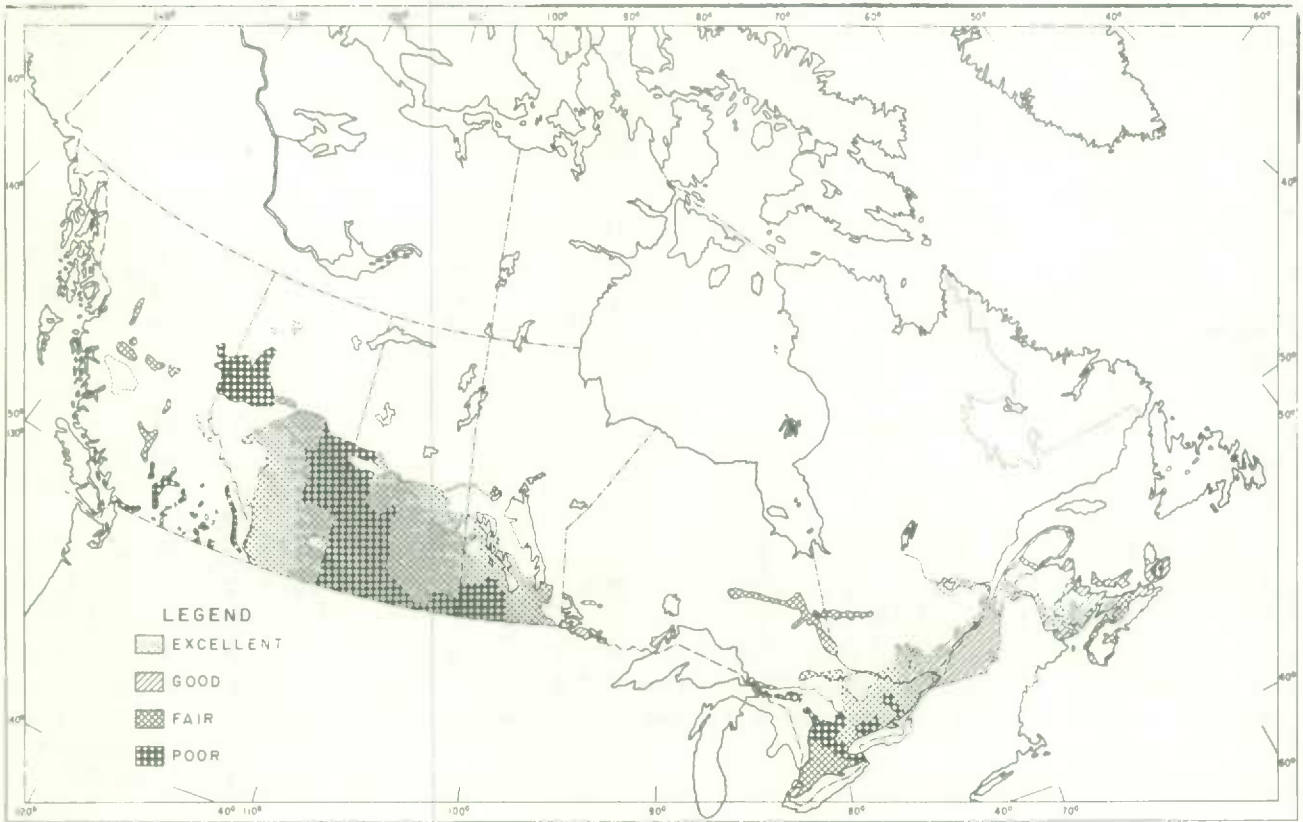
The first part of August saw a continuation of the dry weather experienced in late July. Pastures revived in the latter half of the month with general heavy rains. Throughout August, relentless high temperatures probably affected milk production as much as dry pastures. Forty per cent of the dairy correspondents reported pastures good or excellent at August 15 compared to 38 per cent a year earlier.

The two maps on the next page show pasture conditions at August 15, 1958 and 1959. The information was taken from a survey of about 4,500 farmers who keep milk cows. Each farmer was asked to rate the pasture on which his milk cows were grazing at the 15th of the month. The choices were: Excellent, Good, Fair and Poor. A short description was printed beside each choice. It should be noted that excellent pastures on the prairies may not carry the same number of stock as excellent pastures in Ontario and Quebec. In making up the map each report was considered as one vote and the pasture rating receiving the most number of votes was taken as descriptive of that county or crop district. For example, if 10 reports were received for one county and they arranged themselves: Excellent 1, Good 3, Fair 4, Poor 2, the county would be rated as Fair.

Production and Prices of Dairy Products in July, 1959

Creamery Butter

Production: Creamery butter production amounted to 42.9 million pounds in July, 1959. This was 3.5 million pounds or approximately 8 per cent less than that produced in the same month of the previous year.

Stocks: Holdings of creamery butter in store and transit on August 1, amounted to 111.4 million pounds, approximately 24.8 million pounds greater than at August 1 last year. On July 1, 1959, stock holdings at 92.9 million pounds were 25.5 million pounds greater than at the same date a year earlier.

Supply: The quantity of creamery butter represented by stocks on July 1, plus production and imports during the month amounted to 135.8 million pounds at July 31, 1959. This was an increase of approximately 22.0 million pounds compared to the corresponding supply figure at July 31, 1958.

Domestic Disappearance: The domestic disappearance of creamery butter in July amounted to 24.4 million pounds, a decrease of 2.8 million pounds or 10 per cent from the corresponding figure for the same month last year. On a per capita basis, it amounted to 1.41 pounds as compared with 1.60 pounds in July, 1958.

Prices at Montreal: Butter prices at Montreal, based on dealers' quotations for first grade solids, averaged 63 1/4 cents per pound in July as against 63 1/2 cents in July, 1958.

Cheddar Cheese

Production: Cheddar cheese production amounted to approximately 14.5 million pounds, an increase of about 1.3 million pounds compared to production in the same month of the previous year.

Prices: Although very little trading occurred, the Montreal price of Ontario coloured cheese averaged 37 cents per pound in July. The comparative price in 1958 was 35 1/8 cents.

Ice Cream

The quantity of ice cream manufactured in July was approximately 6.1 million gallons or 669 thousand gallons more than that produced a year ago.
