

Total milk production during September is tentatively estimated at about 1,763,000,000 pounds, 1.3 per cent more than production in September last year. Milk production in the first nine months of 1959 is estimated at 14,172,000,000 pounds, almost the same level reached at September 31 last year.

The manufacture of dairy factory products in September required about 1.5 per cent more milk than in September 1958. The increase in milk utilized for dairy factory products, compared to September a year ago, was due to a 32 per cent increase in milk used for cheddar cheese production, a 24 per cent increase in milk used for ice cream and a 14 per cent increase in milk used for concentrated whole milk products. The increase in milk used for cheddar cheese production is indicative of the increasing importance being placed upon this product in the competition for milk. Milk utilized for creamery butter, in contrast, showed a decrease of 5 per cent from the corresponding figure for September 1958 and 3.5 per cent from the cumulative January to September figure of last year.

For the purpose of the preliminary estimate, fluid milk and cream sales in September were estimated to have exceeded fluid sales in September 1958 by about two per cent, the increase in August fluid sales over the corresponding figure a year earlier.

Indications from the monthly survey of farmers keeping milk cows are that about 3 per cent less milk was consumed in farm homes during September than in September 1958 while in the first nine months of this year, milk consumption in farm homes decreased about one and one-half per cent from the corresponding figure in 1958. On the other hand, about 11 per cent more milk was reported fed to livestock in September and 4.5 per cent more in the first three-quarters of 1959 compared to the corresponding periods last year. Cow numbers at September 15 on farms covered by the monthly survey were down almost one per cent from September 15, 1958, but slightly more cows were milked. Milk production per cow on these farms remained slightly higher than at this time last year.

Pasture conditions during September were more favourable to dairying than in September last year. The two maps on page 3 illustrate pasture conditions at September 15, 1958 and 1959.

Farm Milk Production, Utilization and Income in August, 1959

Farm Milk Production: The estimated quantity of milk produced on farms in August amounted to 1,853,472,000 pounds, a decrease of 11 million pounds or 0.6 per cent below that of August, 1958. Of this amount, 1,233 million pounds or 67 per cent was utilized in factory production, and approximately 462 million pounds or 25 per cent was used for fluid sales. During January-August, the estimated production was 12,409 million pounds, a decrease of 20 million pounds from that produced in the same period of the previous year. The quantity of milk utilized for factory production in January-August amounted to 7,270 million pounds while fluid sales accounted for 3,729 million pounds.

Fluid Sales: Sales of fluid milk and cream, the latter expressed as milk, amounted to 461,936,000 pounds in August, an increase of approximately 9 million pounds in comparison with August of the previous year. This included about 389 million pounds of fluid milk, comprising about 21 per cent of the farm milk supply, and fluid cream sales of 73 million pounds representing 4 per cent. During the eight month period, fluid sales totalled 3,728,859,000 pounds, an increase of 87 million pounds or approximately 2.4 per cent over those of the corresponding 1958 period.

Farm Butter: Butter made on farms in August amounted to 857,000 pounds, decreasing 17 per cent from the corresponding month in 1958. For January-August, 6,752,000 pounds were produced, a decrease of 14 per cent from the same period last year.

Farm Cash Income: Cash income from the sale of dairy products in August amounted to \$50,643,000. This represented an increase of approximately 1.7 per cent or \$866,000 in comparison with the same month last year. The weighted average price of \$2.99 per hundred pounds of milk was 7 cents higher than in August, 1958. Fluid milk at \$4.61 per hundred was 3 cents higher than in August, 1958. Creamery butterfat increased from 66.2 cents to 67.2 cents per pound, and farm butter at 62 cents was the same as in August, 1958. Milk used in manufacture decreased from \$2.81 per hundred in August, 1958, to \$2.79 per hundred in August, 1959. Cheese milk increased to \$2.87 per hundred, an increase of 29 cents per hundred in comparison with the same month a year earlier.

Production and Prices of Dairy Products in August, 1959


Greamery Butter

Production: Creamery butter production amounted to 38.1 million pounds in August, 1959. This was 2.5 million pounds or approximately 6 per cent less than that produced in the same month of the previous year.


Stocks: Holdings of creamery butter in store and transit on September 1, amounted to 124.9 million pounds, approximately 23.0 million pounds greater than at September 1 last year. On August 1, 1959, stock holdings at 111.4 million pounds were 24.8 million pounds greater than at the same date a year earlier.

Supply: The quantity of creamery butter represented by stocks on August 1, plus production and imports during the month amounted to 149.5 million pounds at August 31, 1959. This was an increase of approximately 22.3 million pounds compared to the corresponding supply figure at August 31, 1958.

Domestic Disappearance: The domestic disappearance of creamery butter in August amounted to 24.6 million pounds, a decrease of 0.7 million pounds or 3 per cent from the corresponding figure for the same month last year. On a per capita basis, it amounted to 1.42 pounds as compared with 1.49 pounds in August, 1958.

Prices at Montreal: Butter prices at Montreal, based on dealers' quotations for first grade solids, averaged 63 1/4 cents per pound in August as against 63 1/2 cents in August, 1958.

#### Cheddar Cheese

Production: Cheddar cheese production amounted to approximately 12.8 million pounds, an increase of about 1.3 million pounds compared to production in the same month of the previous year.

Prices: Although very little trading occurred, the Montreal price of Ontario coloured cheese averaged 37 cents per pound in August. The comparative price in 1958 was 35 1/8 cents.

#### Ice Gream

The quantity of ice cream manufactured in August was approximately 5.0 million gallons or 233 thousand gallons more than that produced a year ago.
