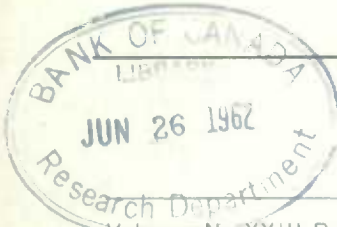

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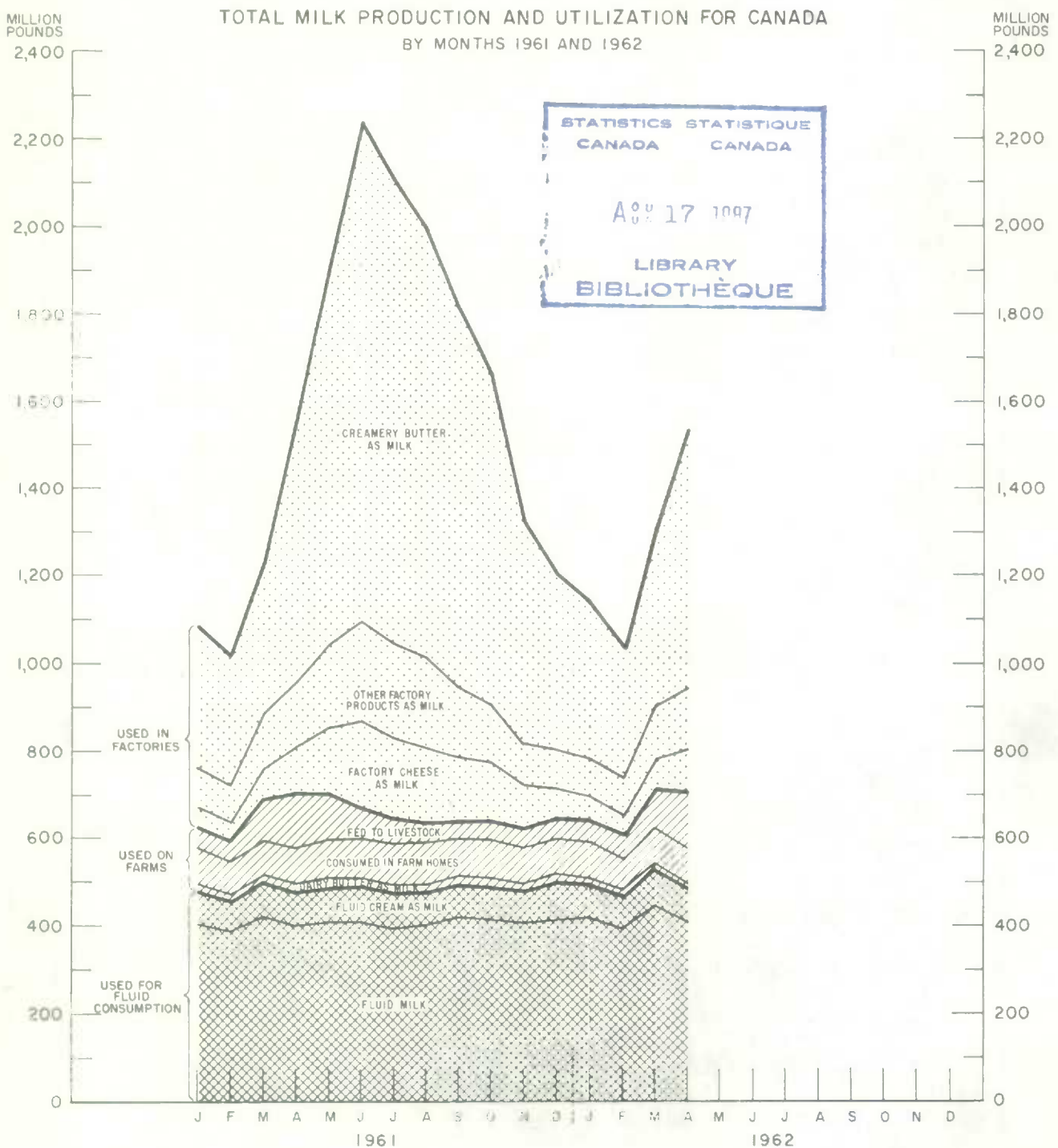

## Preliminary Indications of the Dairy Situation, May, 1962

The preliminary estimate of milk produced in May is 1,933,000,000 pounds. This is 0.9 per cent greater than production in the same month last year and would make the total estimate of production for the first five months of the year, 6,956,000,000 pounds. This is 1.1 per cent higher than production in the January to May period a year ago.

About 63 per cent of the milk produced in May, or 1,213,000,000 pounds, was used for dairy factory products. This was less than one per cent above factory utilization in May, 1961. Four point eight per cent more milk was used in the manufacture of creamery butter than a year ago, which more than offset respective decreases of 6.0, 13.1 and 21.1 per cent in milk utilized for cheese, concentrated whole milk products and ice cream mix. It should be noted that a very sizeable movement of butter into the manufacture of ice cream mix in May made a reduction in the conversion of this product to milk equivalent necessary to avoid duplication between the milk equivalents of butter and ice cream mix. During the January to May period 0.3 per cent more milk was used for dairy factory products than in the corresponding period a year ago.

Fluid sales of milk and cream in May, for the purpose of the preliminary estimate, were assumed to have amounted to 504,300,000 pounds, an increase of 3.0 per cent over fluid sales in May, 1961. This is the average percentage increase shown for the February to April period when compared to sales a year earlier.

According to indications from the monthly survey of farms keeping milk cows, milk and cream consumed in farm homes was 2.3 per cent below that used in May, 1961, while milk used for livestock feeding was 5.1 per cent above that of a year ago. Farm dairy correspondents participating in the survey, report only slightly more cows being milked than at the same date last year.

Weather conditions throughout May were generally cool and backward, and, with few exceptions, rainfall was limited. Seeding was delayed in most parts of the country and pasture growth got a slow start. Regional variations in pasture conditions at May 15, 1961 and 1962, are shown by the maps on page 3.

## Farm Milk Production, Utilization and Income in April, 1962

**Farm Milk Production:** The estimated quantity of milk produced on farms in April, amounted to 1,536 million pounds, a decrease of 27 million pounds or 1.7 per cent below that of April, 1961. Of this amount, 829 million pounds or 54 per cent was utilized in factory production, and approximately 480 million pounds or 31 per cent was used for fluid sales. During the January - April period, the estimated production was 5,023 million pounds, an increase of 58 million pounds over that produced in the same period of the previous year. The quantity of milk utilized for factory production in the January - April period amounted to 2,355 million pounds while fluid sales accounted for 1,973 million pounds.

**Fluid Sales:** Sales of fluid milk and cream, the latter expressed as milk, amounted to 480 million pounds in April, an increase of approximately 2 million pounds in comparison with April of the previous year. This included about 402 million pounds of fluid milk, comprising about 26 per cent of the farm milk supply, and fluid cream sales of 78 million pounds representing 5 per cent. During the four month period, fluid sales totalled 1,973 million pounds, an increase of 59 million pounds or 3.1 per cent over those of the corresponding 1961 period.

**Farm Butter:** Butter made on farms in April amounted to 592,000 pounds, decreasing 16 per cent from the corresponding month in 1961. For the January - April period, 2,234,000 pounds were produced, a decrease of 14 per cent from the same period last year.

**Farm Cash Income:** Cash income from the sale of dairy products in April amounted to \$41,113,000. This represented a decrease of 1.7 per cent or \$713,000 in comparison with the same month last year. The weighted average value of \$3.14 per hundred pounds of milk was 1 cent higher than in April, 1961. Fluid milk at \$4.75 per hundred was also 1 cent higher than in April, 1961. Creamery butter-fat decreased from 67.2 cents to 66.6 cents per pound, and farm butter at 61 cents per pound was 1 cent lower than in April, 1961. Milk used in manufacture averaged \$2.62 per hundred, 8 cents lower than in April, 1961. Cheese milk increased to \$2.59 per hundred, an increase of 12 cents per hundred in comparison with the same month a year earlier. Part of the increase may be attributed to the collection of more detail information from Ontario cheese factories since the beginning of the year, which has resulted in higher calculated average unit values than a year ago.

Farm cash income estimates cover all money received by farmers for the sale of milk, cream and farm butter. Government subsidies and bonuses are included in these estimates.

## Production and Prices of Dairy Products in April, 1962

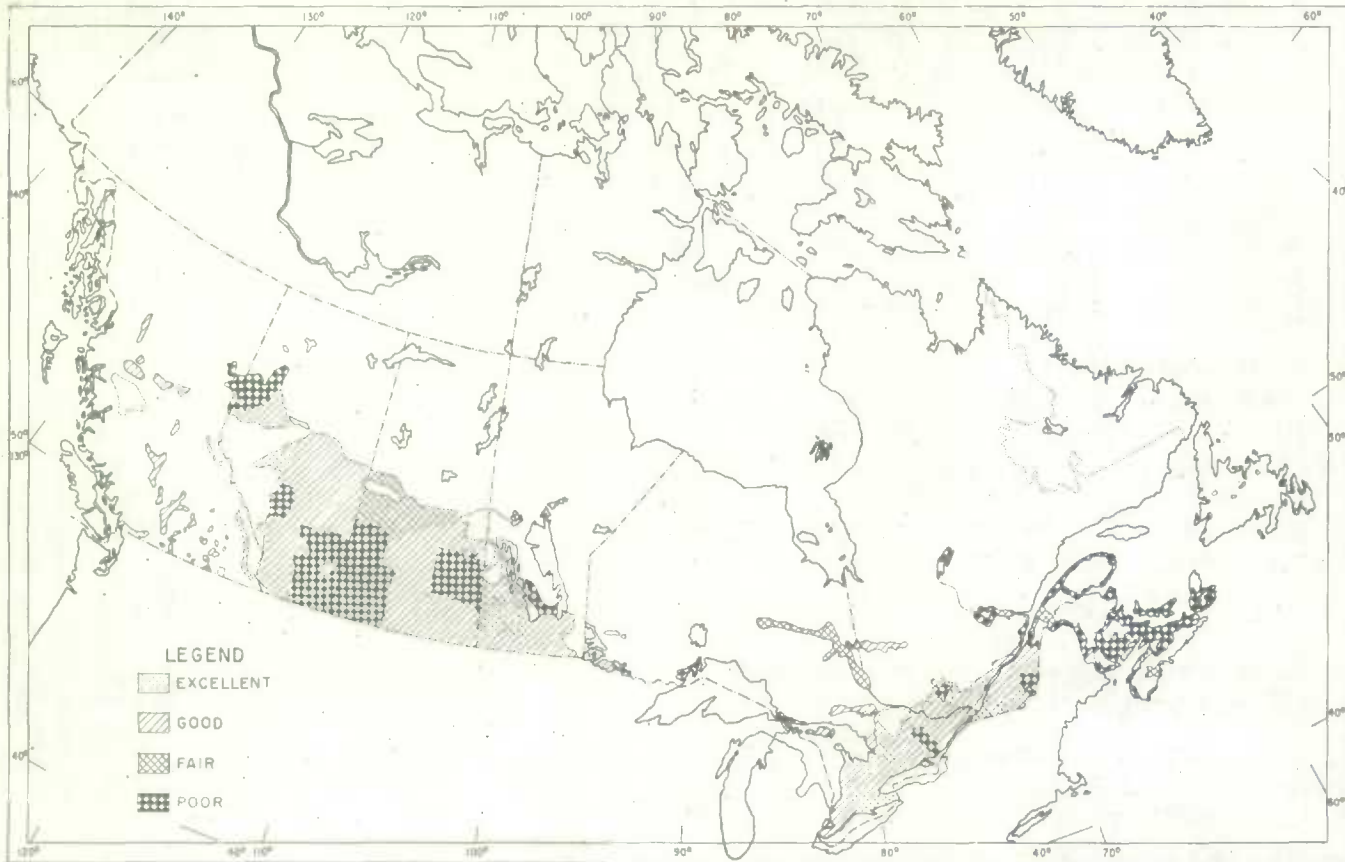
### Creamery Butter

**Production:** Creamery butter production amounted to 25.2 million pounds in April, 1962, a decrease of approximately 798 thousand pounds as compared to production in the same month of the previous year.

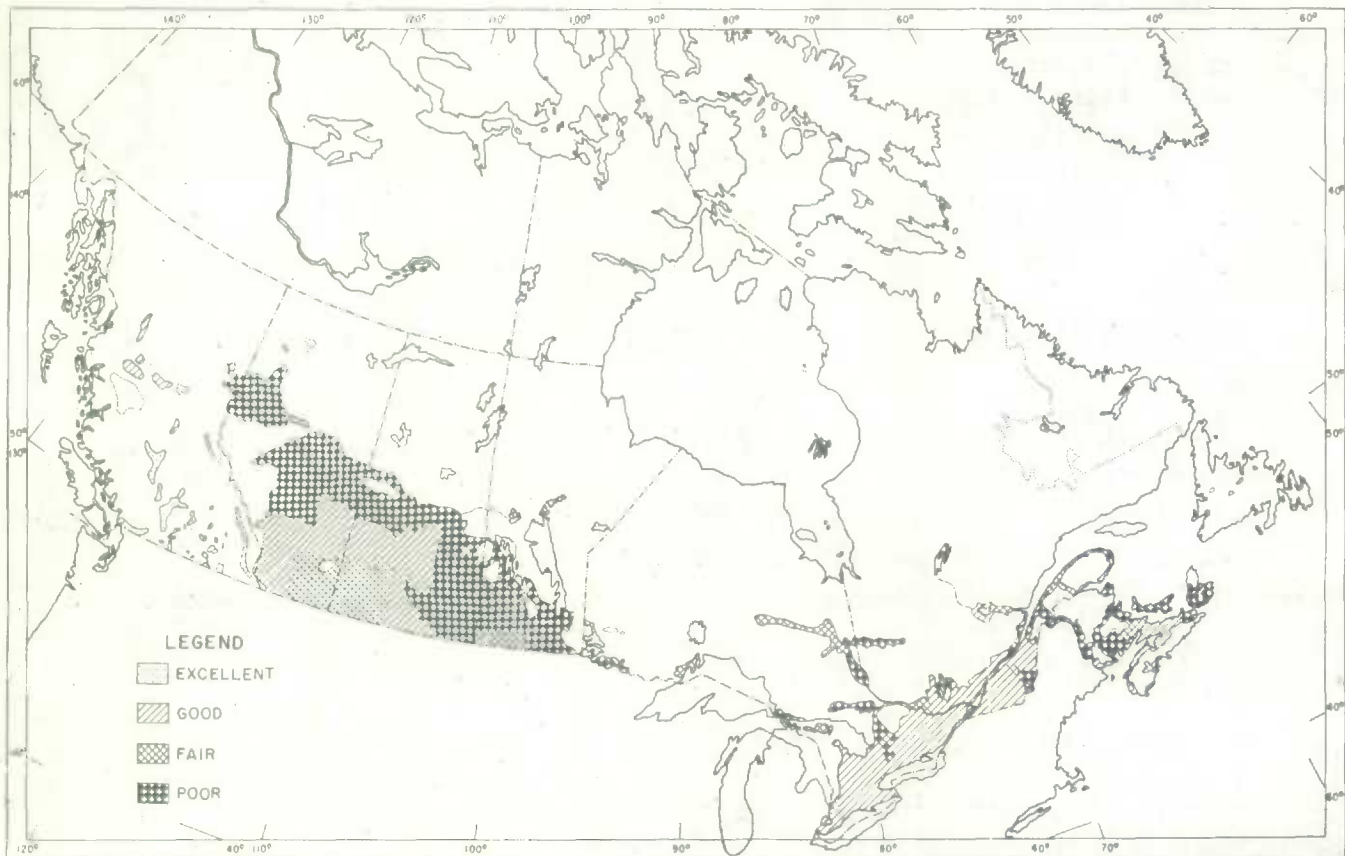
**Stocks:** Combined holdings of creamery butter and butter oil (in butter equivalent) in store and transit on May 1 amounted to 184.7 million pounds, approximately 68.1 million pounds higher than at May 1 last year. On April 1, 1962 stock holdings at 176.4 million pounds were 65.0 million pounds greater than at the same date a year earlier.

**Supply:** The combined quantity of creamery butter and butter oil represented by stocks on April 1, plus production and imports during the month, amounted to 201.6 million pounds at April 30, 1962. This was an increase of approximately 64.2 million pounds compared to the corresponding supply figure at April 30, 1961.

**Domestic Disappearance:** The combined domestic disappearance of creamery butter and butter oil in April amounted to 16.9 million pounds, a decrease of 3.9 million pounds or 18.9 per cent less than the corresponding figure for the same month last year. On a per capita basis, it amounted to 0.91 pounds as compared with 1.14 pounds in April, 1961. The April disappearance figures reflect a holdup in the out-of-storage movement of butter at manufacturers and wholesale levels with the liquidation of quantities on hand at retail levels, pending the change in the butter price to 52 cents, effective May 1.

**Prices at Montreal:** Butter prices at Montreal, based on dealers' quotations for first grade solids, averaged 62 1/2 cents per pound in April, as against 62 3/4 cents in April, 1961.

**Cheddar Cheese**

**Production:** Cheddar cheese production amounted to approximately 7.7 million pounds, a decrease of approximately 983 thousand pounds as compared to production in the same month of the previous year.

**Prices:** The Belleville price of Ontario coloured cheese averaged 32 1/2 cents per pound in April. The comparative price in 1961 was 32 3/4 cents.

**Ice Cream Mix**

The quantity of ice cream mix manufactured in April was approximately 1.8 million gallons or 196 thousand gallons more than that produced a year ago.
