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
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
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

PASTURE CONDITIONS ON FARMS KEEPING MILK COWS



SEPTEMBER 15th 1965



The preliminary estimate of milk produced in September is 1,706,000,000 pounds. This is 1.6 per cent lower than production in the same month last year and would make the total estimate of production during the first nine months of the year 14,419,000,000 pounds. This is 0.9 per cent below production in the January-September period a year ago.

More than 67 per cent of the milk produced in September, or 1,149,000,000 pounds, was used for dairy factory products. This was 2.5 per cent below factory utilization in September, 1964. Creamery butter production during the month accounted for 812,000,000 pounds of milk, 5.9 per cent less than in September a year ago, while milk used for the manufacture of factory cheese, concentrated whole milk products and ice cream mix increased 6.3, 3.6 and 15.9 per cent, respectively. During the January-September period 1.4 per cent less milk was utilized for dairy factory products than in the corresponding period in 1964.

Fluid sales of milk and cream during September, for the purpose of the preliminary estimate, are calculated at 432,400,000 pounds, an increase of 2.7 per cent over fluid sales in September, 1964. This assumes the same relationship to year-earlier estimates as for the month of August.

According to indications from the monthly survey of farms keeping milk cows, milk and cream consumed in farm homes was 5.5 per cent below that used in September, 1964, while milk used for livestock feeding dropped 7.5 per cent from that a year ago. Reports from farm dairy correspondents participating in the survey, indicate 0.7 per cent more cows kept on farms at September 15, and 2.3 per cent more cows being milked than at the same date last year. Milk production per cow, for cows milked on farms in the sample decreased 3.2 per cent below the level at September 15, 1964.

In contrast to the warm, dry weather that prevailed in British Columbia during September, weather conditions were generally cool and wet throughout the rest of Canada. The generally good pasture conditions at September 15 were above conditions a year ago and, except for the Prairies, had improved over conditions at the same date in August. Regional pasture conditions at September 15, 1964 and 1965, are shown by the maps on the opposite page.

FARM MILK PRODUCTION, UTILIZATION AND CASH RECEIPTS IN AUGUST, 1965.

Farm Milk Production: The estimated quantity of milk produced on farms in August amounted to 1,885 million pounds, a decrease of 17 million pounds or 0.9 per cent below that of August 1964. Of this amount, 1,317 million pounds or 70 per cent was utilized in factory production, and approximately 429 million pounds or 23 per cent was used for fluid sales. During the January-August period, the estimated production was 12,712 million pounds, a decrease of 98 million pounds below that produced in the same period of the previous year. The quantity of milk utilized for factory production in the January-August period amounted to 7,991 million pounds while fluid sales accounted for 3,459 million pounds.

fluid Sales: Sales of fluid milk and cream, the latter expressed as milk, amounted to 429 million pounds in August, an increase of approximately 11 million pounds in comparison with August of the previous year. This included about 361 million pounds of fluid milk, comprising about 19 per cent of the farm milk supply, and fluid cream sales of 68 million pounds representing about 4 per cent. During the eight month period, fluid sales totalled 3,459 million pounds, an increase of 72 million pounds or 2.1 per cent over those of the corresponding 1964 period.

Farm Butter: Butter made on farms in August amounted to 357,000 pounds, decreasing 13 per cent from the corresponding month in 1964. For the January-August period, 2,507,000 pounds were produced, a decrease of 25 per cent from the same period last year.

Farm Cash Receipts: Cash Receipts from the sale of dairy products in August amounted to \$55,895,000. This represented an increase of 4.25 per cent or \$2,281,000 in comparison with the same month last year. The weighted average value of \$3.20 per hundred pounds of milk was 15 cents higher than in August, 1964. Fluid milk at \$4.98 per hundred was 6 cents higher than in August, 1964. Creamery butter-fat increased from 71.6 cents to 76.4 cents per pound, and farm butter at 57 cents per pound was the same as in August, 1964. Milk used in manufacture averaged \$2.82 per hundred, 11 cents higher than in August, 1964. Cheese milk increased to \$3.04 per hundred, an increase of 12 cents per hundred in comparison with the same month a year earlier.

Estimates of farm cash receipts cover money received by farmers for the sale of milk, cream and farm butter. Normally both federal and provincial government subsidies and bonuses are included in these estimates. With regard to current estimates, however, it has not been possible to take into account the supplementary and deficiency payments that will be paid with respect to the 1965-66 dairy year, nor do the estimates include retroactive premium payments by the province of Quebec on milk and cream for manufacturing purposes from October 1, 1964 to April 1, 1965. If possible, these payments will be reflected in year-end revisions for both 1964 and 1965. The estimates do not make any allowances for costs incurred by farmers in the production of dairy products.

PRODUCTION AND PRICES OF DAIRY PRODUCTS IN AUGUST, 1965.

Creamery Butter

Production: Creamery butter production amounted to 40.5 million pounds in August, 1965, a decrease of approximately 1.6 million pounds as compared to production in the same month of the previous year.

Stocks: Combined holdings of creamery butter and butter oil (in butter equivalent) in store and transit on September 1, 1965, amounted to 104.8 million pounds, approximately 65.9 million pounds lower than at September 1 last year. On August 1, 1965, stock holdings at 94.8 million pounds were 74.2 million pounds less than at the same date a year earlier.

Supply: The combined quantity of creamery butter and butter oil represented by stocks on August 1, plus production and imports during the month amounted to 135.3 million pounds of butter at August 31, 1965. This was a decrease of approximately 75.8 million pounds compared to the corresponding supply figure at August 31, 1964.

Domestic Disappearance: The combined domestic disappearance of creamery butter and butter oil in August amounted to 30.5 million pounds of butter, an increase of 2.7 million pounds or 9.5 per cent more than the corresponding figure for the same month last year. On a per capita basis, it amounted to 1.57 pounds as compared with 1.45 pounds in August, 1964.

Prices at Montreal: Butter prices at Montreal, based on dealers' quotations for first grade solids, averaged 55 1/8 cents per pound in August, as against 52 cents in August, 1964.

Cheddar Cheese

Production: Cheddar cheese production in August amounted to approximately 17.9 million pounds, an increase of about 165 thousand pounds compared to production in the same month of the previous year.

Prices: The Belleville price of Ontario coloured cheese averaged 41 3/4 cents per pound in August. The comparative price in 1964 was 38 3/8 cents.

Ice Cream Mix

The quantity of ice cream mix manufactured in August was approximately 3.1 million gallons or 455 thousand gallons more than that produced a year ago.
