

## PRELIMINARY INDICATIONS OF THE DAIRY SITUATION, APRIL, 1966

The preliminary estimate of milk produced in April is 1,507,000,000 pounds. This is 1.9 per cent lower than production in the same month last year and would make the total estimate of production during the first four months of the year 4,786,000,000 pounds. This too, is 1.9 per cent below production in the January-April period a year ago.

Almost 59 per cent of the milk produced in April, or 884,000,000 pounds, was used for dairy factory products. This was 2.4 per cent below factory utilization in April, 1965. Creamery butter production during the month accounted for 610,000,000 pounds of milk, 2.0 per cent less than in April a year ago. Milk used for concentrated whole milk products and ice cream mix declined 19.7 and 2.4 per cent, respectively, while milk used in the manufacture of cheese increased 6.7 per cent over that recorded for April, 1965. During the January-April period, 1.7 per cent less milk was utilized for dairy factory products than in the corresponding period a year ago.

Fluid sales of milk and cream during April, for the purpose of the preliminary estimate, are calculated at 436,000,000 pounds, an increase of 0.5 per cent over fluid sales in April, 1965. This assumes the same relationship to year-earlier estimates as for the January-March period.

According to indications from the monthly survey of farms keeping milk cows, milk and cream consumed in farm homes was 3.7 per cent below the quantity used in April, 1965, while milk used for livestock feeding was 4.8 per cent below that of a year ago. Reports from farm dairy correspondents participating in the survey, indicate 2.0 per cent fewer cows kept on farms at April 15, and 2.7 per cent less cows being milked than at the same date last year. Milk production per cow, for cows milked on farms in the sample, increased 5.2 per cent above the level at April 15, 1965. The estimate of total milk production is not based only on the farm sample but is the sum of the estimates of milk utilization.

## FARM MILK PRODUCTION, UTILIZATION AND CASH RECEIPTS IN MARCH, 1966

Farm Milk production: The estimated quantity of milk produced on farms in March amounted to 1,251 million pounds, a decrease of 42 million pounds or 3.2 per cent below that of March, 1965. Of this amount, 645 million pounds or 52 per cent was utilized in factory production, and approximately 452 million pounds or 36 per cent was used for fluid sales. During the January-March period, the estimated production was 3,280 million pounds, a decrease of 62 million pounds below that produced in the same period of the previous year. The quantity of milk utilized for factory production in the January-March period amounted to 1,592 million pounds while fluid sales accounted for 1,296 million pounds.

Fluid Sales: Sales of fluid milk and cream, the latter expressed as milk, amounted to 452 million pounds in March, a decrease of approximately half a million pounds in comparison with March of the previous year. This included about 385 million pounds of fluid milk, comprising about 31 per cent of the farm milk supply, and fluid cream sales of 67 million pounds representing about 5 per cent. During the three month period, fluid sales totalled 1,296 million pounds, an increase of 6 million pounds or 0.5 per cent over those of the corresponding 1965 period.

Farm Butter: Butter made on farms in March amounted to 263,000 pounds, decreasing 4 per cent from the corresponding month in 1965. For the January-March period, 775,000 pounds were produced, a decrease of 7 per cent from the same period last year.

Farm Cash Receipts: Cash receipts from the sale of dairy products in March amounted to \$40,333,000. This represented an increase of 2.7 per cent or \$1,044,000 in comparison with the same month last year. The weighted average value of \$3.68 per hundred pounds of milk was 15 cents higher than in March, 1965. Fluid milk at \$5.16 per hundred was 16 cents higher than in March, 1965. Creamery butterfat increased from 74.2 cents to 76.6 cents per pound, and farm butter at 58 cents per pound was 1 cent higher than in March, 1965. Milk used in manufacture averaged \$3.11 per hundred, 17 cents higher than in March, 1965. Cheese milk increased to \$3.29 per hundred, an increase of 10 cents per hundred in comparison with the same month a year earlier.

Farm cash receipts estimates cover all money received by farmers for the sale of milk, cream and farm butter, including government subsidies and bonuses where applicable. The estimates, however, exclude federal government Supplementary Payments made to producers in 1965 but include premium payments for milk and cream used exclusively for manufacturing purposes in Quebec from October 1, 1964 to date. Farm cash receipts do not make any allowances for costs incurred by farmers in the production of dairy products.

## PRODUCTION AND PRICES OF DAIRY PRODUCTS IN MARCH, 1966

Creamery Butter

Production: Creamery butter production amounted to 18.0 million pounds in March 1966, a decrease of approximately 0.5 million pounds as compared to production in the same month of the previous year.

Stocks: Combined holdings of creamery butter and butter oil (in butter equivalent) in store and transit on April 1, 1966, amounted to 34.0 million pounds, approximately 28.5 million pounds lower than at April 1 last year. On March 1, 1966, stock holdings at 46.4 million pounds were 29.1 million pounds less than at the same date a year earlier. Stocks at April 1 adjusted to omit imported butter held for processing into materials for food preparations for export.

Supply: The combined quantity of creamery butter and butter oil represented by stocks on March 1, plus production and imports during the month, amounted to 64.4 million pounds of butter at March 31, 1966. This was a decrease of approximately 29.6 million pounds compared to the corresponding supply figure at March 31, 1965.

Domestic Disappearance: The combined domestic disappearance of creamery butter and butter oil in March amounted to 30.3 million pounds of butter, a decrease of 1.1 million pounds or 3.6 per cent less than the corresponding figure for the same month last year. On a per capita basis, it amounted to 1.53 pounds as compared with 1.60 pounds in March, 1965.

Prices at Montreal: Butter prices at Montreal, based on dealers' quotations for first grade solids, averaged 56-7/8 cents per pound in March, as against 52-3/4 cents in March, 1965.

Cheddar Cheese

Production: Cheddar cheese production in March amounted to approximately 8.1 million pounds, a decrease of about 350 thousand pounds compared to production in the same month of the previous year.

Prices: The Belleville price of Ontario coloured cheese averaged 42-1/2 cents per pound in March. The comparative price in 1965 was 38 cents.

Ice Cream Mix

The quantity of ice cream mix manufactured in March was approximately 2.0 million gallons or 172 thousand gallons more than that produced a year ago.
