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## Preliminary Indications of the Dairy Situation, October, 1967

The preliminary estimate of milk produced in October is 1,544,000,000 pounds which is 1.9 per cent above production in the corresponding month last year. This would make the total estimate of production during the first ten months of the year 15,763,000,000 pounds or 1.0 per cent below that for the January-October period a year ago.

Slightly over 63 per cent of the milk produced in October, or 974,000,000 pounds, was used for dairy factory products. This is 2.1 per cent above factory utilization in October, 1966. Creamery butter production during the month accounted for 672,000,000 pounds of milk, 4.3 per cent more than in October a year ago; however, milk used for factory cheese and concentrated whole milk products decreased 4.3 and 8.4 per cent respectively from October 1966. Approximately 14.8 per cent more milk was used for ice cream mix than in October 1966. During the January-October period 1.8 per cent less milk was utilized for dairy factory products than in the corresponding period a year ago.

Fluid sales of milk and cream during October, for the purpose of the preliminary estimate, are calculated at 451,000,000 pounds of milk, an increase of 2.1 per cent from the sales in October 1966. This assumes the same relationship to year-earlier estimates as for the July-September period.

According to indications from the monthly survey of farms keeping milk cows, milk and cream consumed in farm homes was 0.9 per cent below that used in October 1966, while milk used for livestock feeding rose 1.8 per cent from that of a year ago. Reports from farm dairy correspondents participating in the survey indicate 4.0 per cent fewer cows kept on farms at October 15, and 2.8 per cent less cows being milked than at the same date last year. Milk production per cow, for cows milked on farms in the sample, increased 2.0 per cent from the level at October 15, 1966.

### FARM MILK PRODUCTION, UTILIZATION AND CASH RECEIPTS IN SEPTEMBER, 1967

Farm Milk Production: The es imated quantity of milk produced on farms in September amounted to 1,718 million pounds, a decrease of 21 million pounds or 1.2 per cent below that of September, 1966. Of this amount, 1,143 million pounds or 67 per cent was utilized in factory production, and approximately 454 million pounds or 27 per cent was used for fluid sales. During the January-September period, the estimated production was 14,219 million pounds, a decrease of 182 million pounds from the corresponding period last year. The quantity of milk utilized for factory production in the January-September period amounted to 8,999 million pounds while fluid sales accounted for 3,949 million pounds.

Fluid Sales: Sales of fluid milk and cream, the latter expressed as milk, amounted to 454 million pounds in September, an increase of approximately 14 million pounds from September of last year. This included about 386 million pounds of fluid milk, comprising about 23 per cent of the farm milk supply, and fluid cream sales of 68 million pounds representing about 4 per cent. During 'he nine month period, fluid sales totalled 3,949 million pounds, an increase of 38 million pounds or 1.0 per cent over those of the corresponding period a year earlier.

Farm Butter: Butter made on farms in September amounted to 271,000 pounds, decreasing 8 per cent from the corresponding month in 1966. For the January-September period, 2,374,000 pounds were produced, a decrease of 5 per cent from the same period last year.

Farm Cash Receipts: Cash receipts from the sale of dairy products in September amounted to \$59,289,000. This represented an increase of 6.6 per cent or \$3,667,000 from the corresponding month last year. The weighted average value of \$3.71 per hundred pounds of milk was 27 cents higher than in September, 1966. Fluid milk at \$5.89 per hundred was 37 cents higher than in September, 1966. Creamery butterfat increased from 76.1 cents to 82.2 cents per pound, and farm butter at 61 cents per pound was 2 cents higher than in September, 1966. Milk used in manufacture averaged \$3.32 per hundred, 24 cents higher than in September, 1966. Cheese milk increased to \$3.37 per hundred, an increase of 24 cents per hundred from the corresponding month a year earlier. Approximately 87 per cent of all milk utilized for factory dairy products was eligible for Federal government Subsidy in September, 1967.

Estimates of farm cash receipts from the sale of dairy products, as set forth in this report, include the basic plant paying price less haulage and, where applicable, quality premiums, bonuses, patronage dividends and those government subsidies which have been paid indirectly through plants as part of the plant price. They do not include government payments made direct to farmers by government cheque, nor do they reflect any allowance for costs incurred by farmers in the production of dairy products.

Direct Federal subsidy payments during the 1966-67 dairy year commenced on April 1, 1966, and amounted to 75 cents per hundred pounds for 3.5 per cent processing milk or the equivalent of 21.43 cents per pound of butterfat. On April 1, 1967, these payments were increased to \$1.10 per hundred pounds for milk and 31.42 cents per pound of butterfat. Unlike the previous program, manufacturing milk and cream shippers will be allotted a quota based on their 1966-67 shipments and will not be eligible if any portion of their deliveries is used for fluid purposes. Effective April 1, 1967, the Quebec government discontinued to make direct payments to farmers for manufacturing milk and cream. These payments had amounted to approximately 5 and 10 cents per pound butterfat depending on the period of the year. Also, effective the same date, direct payments of 25 cents on all industrial, secondary and excess milk and 10 cents on cream were stopped by the Ontario government. PRODUCTION AND PRICES OF DAIRY PRODUCTS IN SEPTEMBER, 1967

### Creamery Butter

Production: Creamery butter production amounted to 34.8 million pounds in September, 1967, a decrease of approximately 82 thousand pounds from production in the corresponding month of the previous Year.

Stocks: Combined holdings of creamery butter and butter oil (in butter equivalent) in store and transit on October 1, 1967, amounted to 83.9 million pounds, approximately 2.5 million pounds lower than at October 1 last year. On September 1, 1967, stock holdings at 76.1 million pounds were 6.3 million pounds less than at the same date a year earlier.

Supply: The combined quantity of creamery butter and butter oil represented by stocks on September 1, plus production and imports during the month, amounted to 110.9 million pounds of butter at September 30, 1967. This was a decrease of approximately 6.4 million pounds compared to the corresponding supply figure at September 30, 1966.

Domestic Disappearance: The combined domestic disappearance of creamery butter and butter oil in September amounted to 27.0 million pounds of butter, a decrease of 3.8 million pounds or 12.4 per cent less than the corresponding figure for the same month last year. On a per capita basis, it amounted to 1.34 pounds as compared with 1.55 pounds in September, 1966.

Prices at Montreal: Butter prices at Montreal, based on dealers' quotations for first grade solids, averaged 63 cents per pound in September, as against 60 cents in September, 1966.

# Cheddar Cheese

Production: Cheddar cheese production in September amounted to approximately 15.2 million pounds, a decrease of about 2.6 million pounds from production in the corresponding month of the previous year.

Prices: The Belleville price of Ontario coloured cheese averaged 46 1/4 cents per pound in September. The comparative price in 1966 was 43 1/8 cents.

#### Ice Cream Mix

The quantity of ice cream mix manufactured in September was approximately 2.4 million gallons or 124 thousand gallons more than that produced a year ago.
