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MON THLY


Sales of market eggs during August are estimated at 29.8 million dozen compared with 29.3 million dozen in August 1963. The average price of eggs to producers as reported in the monthly survey was 34.6 cents per dozen in August and 31.2 cents per dozen in July. The corresponding farm prices reported in August and July 1963 were 39.0 and 38.0 cents, respectively.

According to preliminary estimates, egg production in the first eight monchs of 1964 was 290.7 million dozen, up 3.7 per cent from the 280.2 million diozen produced during the corresponding period of 1963.

FROZEN EGGS: Processing to frozen egg in all plants under inspection reporting to the Department of Agriculture during the 4 week period ending August 29 was $1,720,892$ pounds as compared with $1,273,742$ pounds during the corresponding period in 1963.

TURKEY SURVEY - August 1, 1964: The estimated number of turkeys at August 1, 1964 ( 1963 figures in brackets) was as follows: Maritime Provinces, $76,000(100,000)$; Quebec, $1,115,000(1,050,000)$; Ontario, 4,370,000(3,850,000); Manitoba $1,200,000(1,200,000)$; Saskatchewan, $870,000(975,000)$; Alberta, 900,000 ( $1,040,000$ ); British Columbia, 435,000 ( 390,000 ) ; and Canada, $8,966,000$ $(8,605,000)$.

The estimated output of turkeys for the period January-July 1964 amounted to $3,784,000$ birds. Between August 1 and Thanksgiving the expected output is 3,892,000 birds and between Thanksgiving and Christmas 4,533,000 birds. Thus it is anticipated that there will be an output of $12,209,000$ birds in 1964 compared to $11,309,000$ birds in 1963, an increase of 8.0 per cent (see page 4). The average weight of the birds produced will be less than a year earlier because of a larger proportion of broilers in the 1964 output. In terms of turkey meat production this output in 1964 is expected to be approximately $154,500,000$ pounds compared to $146,317,000$ pounds in 1963, an increase of 5.6 per cent.
