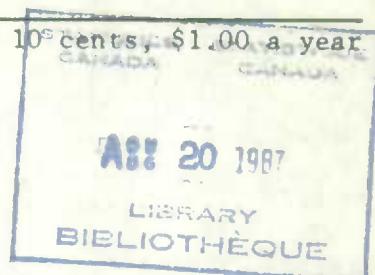
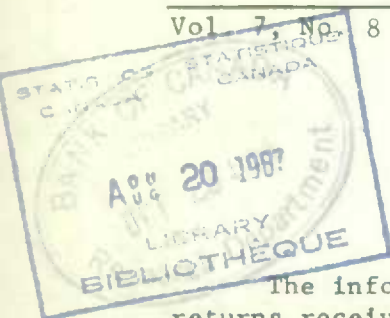

PULPWOOD AND WOOD RESIDUE STATISTICS

AUGUST 1964

The information contained herein on pulpwood and wood residue is based on returns received from the users of these materials for the manufacture of pulp, paper and paperboard. In addition pulpwood production and pulpwood inventories includes data collected from exporters of pulpwood reporting to the Department of Trade and Commerce.

In Eastern Canada, the wood-year for reporting companies begins June 1st and at the request of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association cumulative figures for their wood-year as well as the calendar year are provided. Inventory figures for pulpwood (Table 3) include wood on land and in water storage (roadside, block pile, rivers, lakes, etc.).

The 1963 data has been converted from rough cords to cunits on the basis of 85 cu. ft. of solid wood per rough cord.
