COPPER AND NICKEL PRODUCTION IN CANADA - SEPTEMBER, 1935.

COPPER - The Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa reports that Canada produced 33,941,168 pounds of copper in September; during the preceding month 32,603,557 pounds were produced while in September, 1934, the production was 27,551,889 pounds. Output during the first nine months of 1935 totalled 312,520,346 pounds as compared with 266,302,345 pounds in the corresponding months of 1934. Blister copper production in September amounted to 30,437,986 pounds; a year ago, 25,814,617 pounds were produced.

The average price of electrolytic copper on the London market in September was 8.42077 cents per pound in Canadian funds, at which price the Canadian output during the month was worth \$2,858,108. Quotations in August averaged 8.00627 cents per pound and the value of the month's output was 2,610,329.

The world production of refined copper in September according to the Metal and Mineral Markets amounted to 113,000 tons; shipments during the month totalled 131,200 tons, as a result world stocks doclined 18,200 tons to 531,600 tons. Refined copper stocks held in the United States were 7,300 tons lower in September and amounted to 241,300 tons. Stocks in other countries recorded a falling-off of 19,900 tons to 290,300 tons. On September 30th London Metal Exchange official warehouses contained 88,683 tons of refined copper and 12,862 tons of rough copper as compared with the August 31st holdings of 84,717 tons of the former and 12,806 tons of the latter.


Exports of refined copper from the United States in September declined 39 per cent to 17,331 tons from the August total of 28,403 tons. The September exportations were consigned to the following countries: Great Britain, 25.5 per cent; Japan, 18.3 per cent; Italy, 16.4, per cent; Sweden, 10.4 per cent; Germany, 8.0 per cent; Belgium, 7.4 per cent; France, 5.5 per cent, and the remainder principally to the Netherlands, China and Hong Kong, British India and Denmark.

Great Britain imported 20,533 tons of electrolytic copper during September as against 13,244 tons in the preceding month. Receipts of other unwrought copper declined to 8,183 tons from the August imports of 12,489 tons.

NICKEL - Nickel production in Canada rose to 12,896,865 pounds in September; this was the highest monthly output on record since August, 1934, when 14,257,921 pounds were produced. The August, 1935, output amounted to 10,869,647 pounds but the September, 1934, total was only 8,764,513 pounds. During the nine months ending September Canada produced 97,587,654 pounds as compared with 96,942,883 pounds in the corresponding period of 1934.
