COPPER - Copper production in Canada during May amounted to 48,429,331 pounds compared with 47,750,255 pounds in April and 41,561,784 pounds in May, 1937, according to a statement just issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa. During the first five months of 1938 Canada produced 243,558,959 pounds of copper or 21.1 per cent above the total for the corresponding period of 1937. Blister copper production in May was recorded at 40,888,525 pounds; a year ago, 37,385,252 pounds were produced.

Copper quotations on the London market in May averaged 9.162 cents per pound, in Canadian funds; based on this price the month's output in Canada was worth \$4,437,095. During April the average price of copper was 9.701 cents per pound and the value of the Canadian output was \$4,632,252.

The world output of refined copper in May was estimated at 149,344 tons; in the preceding month, 162,588 tons were produced. The United States production declined 8,449 tons in May to 47,300 tons; deliveries to customers and exports of domestic copper totalled 33,154 tons, as a result, stocks increased 14,146 tons during the month to 369,809 tons. A decline of 4.5 per cent in production was recorded in countries other than the United States when 102,044 tons were produced; stocks in these countries declined 1,369 tons in May to 184,547 tons.

The United States exported 25,360 tons of refined copper (foreign and domestic); in April, 39,366 tons were exported. The May exports were consigned to the following countries: Germany, 5,780 tons; Great Britain, 5,309 tons; France, 4,641 tons; Japan, 2,326 tons; Italy, 1,906 tons; Sweden, 1,894 tons, and other countries, 3,504 tons.
