PETROLEUM and NATURAL GAS PRODUCTION IN CANADA - NOVEMBER, 1938

and

GASOLINE SALES IN CANADA - OCTOBER, 1938.

CRUDE PETROLEUM - Crude petroleum and natural gasoline production in Canada during November totalled 445,514 barrels; in October, 685,083 barrels were produced while in November, 1937, the output was 341,627 barrels, according to a report just issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa. Production during the eleven months ending November aggregated 6,447,176 barrels compared with 2,587,352 barrels a year ago.

Alberta's output in November amounted to 427,236 barrels and consisted of 422,471 barrels from the Turner Valley field, 1,098 barrels from the Red Coulee field, 2,323 barrels from the Wainwright-Ribstone field, and 1,344 barrels from the Taber field. According to the provincial government's records the following wells were completed in November:

Anglo-Canadian #1 on November 5th at 8,222 feet Royalite #34 on November 23rd at 7,500 feet Command #1 on November 27th at 7,908 feet West Turner #3 on November 29th at 7,850 feet.

Petroleum and its products exported from Canada in November were valued at \$132,200; the preceding month's export valuation was \$147,610.

Imports of petroleum, asphalt and their products into Canada in November were appraised at \$5,676,479; this represented an increase of 0.9 per cent over the October total of \$5,624,457. Receipts of crude petroleum rose 0.8 per cent to 128,619,895 imperial gallons from the October imports; the United States supplied 71.6 per cent of the November importations; Colombia, 24.2 per cent, and Venezuela, 4.2 per cent.

NATURAL GAS - The Canadian production of natural gas in November recorded an increase of 34 per cent over the October output and 0.2 per cent over the November, 1937, total. The current month's production was 3,354,385 thousand cubic feet; the October total was 2,503,641 thousand cubic feet and the November, 1937, production was 3,347,444 thousand cubic feet. During the first eleven months of 1938 Canada produced 29,102,476 thousand cubic feet of natural gas compared with 28,074,086 thousand cubic feet a year ago.


Mixed gas (natural and artificial) importations in November were recorded at 8,124 thousand cubic feet worth \$4,885; in the preceding month, 13,205 thousand cubic feet at \$8,416 were imported.


