# MONTHLY REPORT

# PETROLEUM and NATURAL GAS PRODUCTION IN CANADA - NOVEMBER, 1939

### and

## GASOLINE SALES IN CANADA - OCTOBER, 1939

CRUDE PETROLEUM - The Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa reports that the crude petroleum and natural gasoline production in Canada during November amounted to 731,209 barrels compared with 816,257 barrels in the preceding month and 445,640 barrels in November, 1938. During the eleven months ending November, the Canadian output totalled 7,334,583 barrels; this represented a 13.3 per cent increase over the production a year ago.

Alberta's output declined 10.5 per cent to 712,179 barrels, due principally to the seasonal decline in demand. The November output in this province included 709,175 barrels from the Turner Valley field, 849 barrels from the Red Coulee field, 834 barrels from the Wainwright-Ribstone field, and 1,321 barrels from the Taber, Moose Dome and Del Bonita fields. During the period, the provincial government granted licences for the drilling of seven new wells in this province. The Okalta 7 well in the Turner Valley field was completed on November 19 at a depth of 7,425 feet.

Petroleum and its products exported from Canada in November were valued at \$135,928 as against the previous month's export valuation of \$222,073.

Imports of petroleum, asphalt and their products into Canada in November were appraised at \$7,260,223 compared with the October valuation of \$6,915,569. Crude petroleum receipts totalled 144,622,251 imperial gallons; in October, 153,349,405 imperial gallons were received from outside sources.

NATURAL GAS - Canadian producers reported an output of 3,482,027 thousand cubic feet of natural gas in November or 23.4 per cent above the previous month's total, and 3 per cent above the November, 1938 production. During the eleven months ending November, Canada produced 31,378,954 thousand cubic feet as against 29,352,340 thousand cubic feet a year ago.

Imports of mixed gas (natural and artificial) were recorded at 4,951 thousand cubic feet worth \$3,950; in October, 7,167 thousand cubic feet at \$5,193 were reported. Receipts during the period January to November aggregated 109,676 thousand cubic feet with a value of \$71,772.
