PETROLEUM and NATURAL GAS PRODUCTION IN CANADA - JULY, 1939

and

GASOLINE SALES IN CANADA - JUNE, 1939.

<u>CRUDE PETROLEUM</u> - Crude petroleum and natural gasoline production in Canada set up a new high monthly record in July when 899,169 barrels were produced, according to a report just issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa. In June the output amounted to 821,308 barrels while in July, 1938, the production was 701,813 barrels. During the first seven months of the current year Canada produced 4,270,407 barrels compared with 3,623,291 barrels a year ago.

Production from Alberta sources totalled 877,005 barrels made up of 874,064 barrels from the Turner Valley field, 1,120 barrels from the Red Coulee field, 1,723 barrels from the Wainwright field, and 98 barrels from the Moose-Dome field. The following wells were completed in Alberta during July, according to the provincial government records:-


Petroleum products to a value of \$112,919 were exported from Canada in July; in June the value of these exports was \$60,518.

Petroleum, asphalt and their products imported into Canada in July were appraised at \$5,598,351 compared with the June total of \$6,405,668. Receipts of crude petroleum totalled 140,097,993 imperial gallons or 10.1 per cent below the quantity imported in the preceding month. The July importations were obtained from the following countries - the United States, 110,237,993 imperial gallons; Colombia, 16,023,000 imperial gallons; Venezuela, 11,382,000 imperial gallons, and Trinidad and Tobago, 2,455,000 imperial gallons.


NATURAL GAS - The Canadian production of natural gas in July amounted to 1,755,544 thousand cubic feet compared with 2,106,482 thousand cubic feet in the preceding month and 1,595,755 thousand cubic feet in July, 1938. Production during the geven months ending July totalled 21,085,471 thousand cubic feet or 6.8 per cent above the output a year ago.

Customs' records show that Canada imported 11,238 thousand cubic feet of mixed gas worth \$7,122 in July; during the previous month, 8,244 thousand cubic feet at \$5,460 were imported. Receipts to the end of July aggregated 72,693 thousand cubic feet valued at \$46,254.


