FELDSPAR AND SALT PRODUCTION IN CANADA, APRIL, 1933.

FELDSPAR - The Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa reports that the production of feldspar in Canada during April amounted to 359 tons as compared with 159 tons in the preceding month and 415 tons in April, a year ago. Shipments during the first four months of 1933 totalled 1,130 tons, a decline of 66.0 per cent from the tonnage shipped in the corresponding period of 1932.

Two tons of ground feldspar worth \$63 were imported in April; in the preceding month 3 tons at \$83 were brought into Canada.

SALT - Canadian producers reported a production of 13,654 tons of commercial salt during April; in March, 12,670 tons were produced and in April, a year ago, the output was 15,326 tons. During the first four months of 1933, the total Canadian production of commercial salt declined 6.3 per cent to 45,431 tons from the output in the corresponding months of 1932.

Exports of salt from Canada in April amounted to 13 tons as compared with 406 tons exported in the preceding month. Importations of salt into Canada advanced 96.0 per cent in April to 6,892 tons; these imports were obtained from the following sources, the United States, 31.4 tons, Great Britain, 28.0 tons, British West Indies, 27.8 tons, Germany, 6.5 tons and Spain, 6.3 tons.
