MONTHLY REPORT

FELDSPAR and SALT PRODUCTION IN CANADA - NOVEMBER, 1938.

FELDSPAR - Feldspar shipments by Canadian producers in November were recorded at 1,146 tons compared with 1,217 tons in October and 1,505 tons in November, 1937, according to a report just issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa. Shipments during the first eleven months of 1938 totalled 11,813 tons or 38.3 per cent below the total for the corresponding period of 1937.

Imports of ground feldspar during November rose to 58 tons valued at \$1,005 from the preceding month's receipts of 46 tons worth \$754. During the calendar year to date, 613 tons of ground feldspar worth \$10,085 were imported into Canada compared with 1,218 tons at \$20,905, a year ago.

SALT - Sales of commercial salt by Canadian producers amounted to 34,319 tons in November compared with 33,162 tons in the preceding month and 52,106 tons in November, 1937. During the eleven months ending November, 255,553 tons were shipped; this represented an increase of 6.4 per cent over the shipments a year ago.

Exports of salt in November advanced to 1,121 tons from the October total of 1,028 tons. During the calendar year to date, 10,963 tons were exported as against 8,613 tons a year ago.

An increase of 61.1 per cent was recorded in the imports of salt into Canada in November compared with the previous month; the totals were 16,923 tons and 10,503 tons, respectively. Importations during November included 4 tons of table salt valued at \$146; 6,122 tons of salt for sea or gulf fisheries worth \$16,930; 5,423 tons of salt in bulk, n.o.p., at \$19,965, and 5,374 tons of salt in bags, barrels or other coverings at \$36,085. The following countries were the sources of the November imports: the United States, 38.4 per cent; Great Britain, 32.9 per cent, and the British West Indies, 28.7 per cent.
