

MANUFACTURING STATISTICS OF THE PRAIRIE PROVINCES, 1931.

Section I.

This report is divided into four sections. Section one deals with the three provinces as a group, and the tables included therein review the principal statistics of the group from 1926 to 1931, together with the ten leading industries and leading cities and towns in 1931.


Sections 2, 3 and 4 deal with the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta respectively, and the tables included therein illustrate their manufacturing activities in recent years.

In 1931, the Prairie Provinces continued to suffer from the effects of the general depression prevailing throughout the world. The gross value of products declined from \$299,016,538 in 1930 to \$231,173,427, a decrease of \$67,843,111 or 22.7 per cent. The number of employees dropped from 47,835 to 42,052, a decrease of 5,783 while the amount of salaries and wages paid them declined from \$60,262,861 to \$52,466,665, a loss of \$7,796,196. The value of materials used was \$113,780,179 in 1931 and \$163,991,306 in 1930, a decrease in value of \$50,211,127. The number of establishments reporting and the capital investment, however, recorded increases in 1931, the former by seventy-seven establishments to a total of 2,609 and the latter from \$363,829,575 to \$367,910,780, an increase of \$4,081,205.

entirely due to the decline in manufacturing production. The decrease is in part due to the change in method of computing the average annual employment of wage-carners. Between 1925 and 1930 the average was obtained by summing the averages of individual plants, based on the number of months in actual operation and not by dividing by twelve the sum of the monthly employment figures. For example, if a plant operated only during three months of the year with an employment of 100 persons the first month, 125 the second month and seventy-five the third month, its average annual employment was taken as 100 (300.3); the same as that of another plant which operated the whole year with an average employment of 100 persons per month. In 1931, however, a change was made to the old method, whereby the aggregate of the monthly figures is divided by twelve. This method gives the man year that each plant operates. The change in method, therefore, affects the average annual employment as well as the average wages paid in seasonal industries, such as fruit and vegetable canning, fish canning, sawmills, etc.

Provinces where seasonal industries predominate, therefore, show a proportionately greater decrease in the number of employees in 1931 as compared with the decrease in the salaries and wages paid, while industries that operate throughout the entire year are not affected by this change.

From the standpoint of gross value of production, the slaughtering and meat packing industry with an output valued at \$29,134,827 was first in importance in 1931. This was closely followed by flour and feed mills, the output of which was valued at \$27,836,393; together these two industries accounted for almost 24 per cent of the total

production. The principal statistics of the ten leading industries are reviewed in table

Table 3 shows the principal statistics of the leading cities and towns in the three provinces. In gross value of production the city of Winnipeg led with an output valued at \$73,723,211. This was more than twice the output of Calgary which had the next largest production amounting to \$28,000,169.





MANUFACTURING STATISTICS OF THE PROVINCE OF MANITOBA, 1931.

Of the three Prairie Provinces, the province of Manitoba is the most industrialized. In 1931, establishments reporting to the Census of Manufactures numbered 955. These plants represented a capital investment of \$191,935,311; they furnished employment to 24,193 persons who were paid \$30,706,209 in salaries and wages. They also spent \$55,149,392 for materials and produced goods with a selling value at the factory of \$118,540,865.

The dominant industry in Manitoba is that of slaughtering and meat packing with a value of production in 1931 of \$15,864,297. This was followed by railway rolling stock with a value of production of \$13,729,251. Other industries of importance from the standpoint of value of production were: flour and feed mills, butter and cheese, central electric stations, etc.

Statistics by industrial groups for 1930 and 1931 are shown in table 4. Animal products with an output valued at \$25,721,566 led all the other groups in 1931. This was followed by vegetable products with a value of production of \$21,852,033, iron and its products \$20,930,796, wood and paper products \$17,310,420, textiles and textile products \$9,612,218, etc.

Table 5 contains the principal statistics of the industries composing the various groups reviewed in table 4.

Table 6 shows the principal statistics of the leading cities and towns in Manitoba. Winnipeg led with an output of \$73,723,211 which was over 62 per cent of the total production of the province.


Table 7 gives the principal statistics of the industries located in Winnipeg.

The capital investment by groups of industries is shown in table 8. Fixed capital comprising land, buildings, machinery and tools totalled \$149,376,542, an increase of \$7,184,208, while working capital comprising inventories of raw materials and finished products, cash and bills and accounts receivable totalled \$42,558,769, a decrease of \$3,662,061.

Power equipment and statistics of fuel consumed are shown in tables 9 and 10 respectively.



X The increase in the number of salaried employees and salaries paid is due to the following changes made in the instructions accompanying the schedules.

^{1. -} Prior to 1931, owners who were working as ordinary wage-earners, such as small bakers, reported themselves as wage-earners. In 1931, however, all such owners were required to report themselves as salaried employees.

^{2. -} In 1931, travelling salesmen who were attached to the plant and devoted all or the greater part of their time in selling the products of that plant were included with salaried employees. Prior to this they were not reported at all.



Section 3.

MANUFACTURING STATISTICS OF THE PROVINCE OF SASKATCHEWAN, 1931.

Manufacturing production in the province of Saskatchewan continued in a downward direction in 1931. In that year 768 establishments reported to the Census of Industry. Their total production amounted to \$44,265,151, a decrease of \$18,011,615 or 29 per cent as compared with 1930. The number of persons employed and the salaries and wages paid them also declined in 1931, the employees by 1,187 to a total of 6,061 persons and the salaries and wages account dropped from \$9,229,593 in 1930 to \$7,546,703 in 1931, a decrease of \$1,682,890. The cost of materials used declined by \$13,067,539 to a total of \$22,540,618 in 1931, while the value added by manufacture was also \$4,944,076 lower in 1931. In spite of these decreases the capital invested, amounting to \$68,547,866, was \$3,061,726 higher than the previous year. Statistics showing these variations in detail are contained in tables 1 and 2.

The principal statistics of the leading industries in 1931 are shown in table 3. From the standpoint of gross value of production, flour and feed mills headed the list with an output of \$10,080,986 or 22.8 per cent of the total output of the province. Butter and cheese, central electric stations, slaughtering and meat packing, printing and publishing, etc., follow in the order named.

The amount of capital investment of the various groups in 1931 is shown in table 4. Of the total of \$68,547,866, \$51,030,577 was in land, buildings, machinery and equipment. Inventories of raw materials amounted to \$5,465,587, inventories of finished products amounted to \$3,383,466, while working capital consisting of cash, accounts and bills receivable, etc., amounted to \$8,668,236. Compared with the previous year there was an increase of \$2,787,353 in the value of land, buildings, machinery and equipment.


Table 5 gives the principal statistics of the manufacturing industries of the province grouped on a component material classification basis. In 1931 vegetable products with an output valued at \$14,916,701 led all the groups in gross value of production. The animal products group with an output of \$9,494,225 was next in importance. This was followed by non-metallic mineral products (\$7,866,826), wood and paper products (\$4,571,027), central electric stations (\$4,454,617), etc.

Table 6 shows the principal statistics of the various industries making up the groups referred to in table 5.

Table 7 shows the principal statistics of the leading cities and towns. From the point of view of production, the city of Regina leads with an output of \$18,060,908 or almost 40 per cent of the total production for the province. Other important industrial cities with the value of their production are Saskatoon, \$10,003,123; Moose Jaw, \$7,608,042; Prince Albert, \$2,219,682 and Swift Current, \$386,009.

Table 8 gives the principal statistics of the industries located in Regina.

MANUFACTURING STATISTICS OF THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA, 1931.

The Census of Industry received reports from 886 establishments operating in Alberta in 1931. These establishments reported a total value of production of \$68,367,411 which was \$25,947,371 or 27.5 per cent lower than the total production for 1930 valued at \$94,314,782. The cost of materials also declined heavily in 1931, their value being \$36,090,169 or \$17,531,715 lower than the cost in 1930 which amounted to \$53,621,884. The number of establishments reporting showed an increase of forty-one. The capital investment, however, was \$2,502,668 lower, having dropped from \$109,930,271 in 1930 to \$107,427,603 in 1931. Employment was also furnished to 11,798 persons who received in salaries and wages \$14,213,753. Compared with 1930 there were decreases of 2,301 in the number of persons employed and \$2,878,280 in the salaries and wages paid. Tables 1 and 2 show these variations in detail.

Table 3 shows the principal statistics of the leading industries of Alberta. The principal ones from the point of view of value of production are slaughtering and meat packing with an output valued at \$10,411,417, followed by flour and feed mills with a value of production of \$9,348,399, petroleum products \$8,389,577, butter and cheese \$5,851,255, central electric stations \$4,674,857, etc.

Table 4 shows by industrial groups the capital invested in 1931. Of the total investment of \$107,427,603, \$81,277,959 was invested in land, buildings, machinery and other equipment. Inventories of raw materials and stocks in process accounted for \$7,635,168, inventories of finished products totalled \$7,295,076, while the balance of \$11,219,400 was made up of cash, accounts and bills receivable, etc.


Table 5 shows the principal statistics of the manufacturing industries of the province by groups of industries. The vegetable products group with a value of production of \$18,975,269 came first in 1931. This was followed by animal products with an output valued at \$16,405,767, non-metallic mineral products \$11,642,445, wood and paper products \$7,936,484, etc.

Table 6 shows the principal statistics of the various industries which make up the groups shown in table 5.

Table 7 shows the principal statistics of the cities and towns in Alberta. From the standpoint of value of production, the city of Calgary with an output of \$28,000,169 ranked first. The next city of importance was Edmonton with an output valued at \$20,128,405. The combined output of these two cities is equal to over seventy per cent of the total output of the province.
