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MANUFACTURING STATISTICS OF THE PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA AND  
THE YUKON TERRITORY, 1930.

The general decline in industrial activity experienced by the manufacturing industries of Canada in 1930 was severely felt in British Columbia and the Yukon. In this Province and Territory, employment declined by 16.7 per cent and production by 11.9 per cent in comparison with the previous year. A large portion of this decrease in employment is due to a change in the method of compiling the number of wage-earners in the Fish Curing and Packing Industry. The decline was pretty generally distributed over nearly all groups of industries in proportion to the value of their output. Two exceptions were the iron and steel products and non-metallic mineral products group, both of which showed a small increase in value of production in 1930 over 1929.

In 1930 reports were received from 1,697 establishments operating in British Columbia and the Yukon Territory. The combined output of these establishments was valued at \$241,121,932. Their capital investment was \$403,328,298. Employment was furnished to 42,779 persons who were paid \$54,898,541 in salaries and wages. The cost of raw materials was \$123,131,269, while the value added by manufacture amounted to \$117,990,663. Of these numbers and values, the Yukon Territory contributed 6 establishments; \$159,783 in capital investment; 49 employees; \$73,357 in salaries and wages; \$68,931 to the cost of raw materials; \$183,778 to the value of production and \$114,847 to the value added by manufacture.

In comparison with 1929, the industries of British Columbia and the Yukon Territory showed the following variations in all phases of their manufacturing activity in 1930. Number of establishments, a decrease of 2, capital investment showed an increase of \$8,461,365. The number of employees decreased by 8,600 persons and the salary and wage bill was \$7,081,566 less. The cost of materials declined by \$18,264,108, value of production by \$32,559,653 and the value added by manufacture by \$14,295,545.

The totals and variations referred to will be noted in tables 1 and 2.

Table 3 compares the principal statistics by groups of industries for the years 1929 and 1930. From a standpoint of production, the wood and paper products group led all other groups by a wide margin in both years, their production in 1930 being almost thirty-five per cent of the total output of the Province and Territory.

Table 4 shows the principal statistics of various industries comprising the groups shown in table 3.

Table 5 shows principal statistics of the twenty-five leading industries in 1930. The five most important in the order of value of their production are: sawmills, \$44,975,389; fish curing and packing, \$21,131,067; pulp and paper, \$17,785,550; slaughtering and meatpacking, \$11,004,558 and central electric stations, \$10,817,779.

Table 6 covers the principal statistics of all cities and towns in British Columbia and the Yukon Territory which had three or more establishments and a production

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of \$100,000 and over in the year 1930. The city of Vancouver with a production of \$90,975,000 leads by a very wide margin, accounting for over thirty-seven per cent of the total production. Other principal cities and their production are: New Westminster with \$13,811,847 and Victoria with \$12,252,589.

Table 7 shows the capital investment by groups of industries and division of capital for 1930. In this year the total capital investment amounted to \$403,328,298, and of this amount \$287,655,141 represented the value of land, buildings, machinery and tools. Materials, stocks on hand, fuel and other miscellaneous supplies accounted for \$62,956,105, while the balance of \$52,717,052 was made up of cash, trading and operating accounts, bills receivable, etc.

The quantity and the value of the fuel consumption and the power equipment in the manufacturing establishments of British Columbia and the Yukon Territory in 1930 are shown in tables 8 and 9 respectively.
