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MANUFACTURING STATISTICS OF THE PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA AND THE YUKON TERRITORY,  
1931.

The general decline in industrial activity experienced by the manufacturing industries of British Columbia in 1930 continued with increasing force in 1931. Compared with the previous year, employment declined by 19.7 per cent, salaries and wages paid by 22.3 per cent and value of production by 27.1 per cent. This compares with a decline of 16.7 per cent in employment, 11.4 per cent in salaries and wages paid and 11.9 per cent in the value of production in 1930 as compared with 1929.

In 1931 reports were received from 1,636 establishments operating in British Columbia and the Yukon Territory. The combined output of these establishments was valued at \$175,707,357. Employment was furnished to 34,375 persons who were paid \$42,642,340 in salaries and wages. The cost of materials used was \$81,906,435, while the value added by manufacture amounted to \$93,800,922. To these figures, the Yukon Territory contributed eight establishments, \$475,180 in capital investment, thirty-eight employees, \$68,353 in salaries and wages, \$20,881 to the cost of materials used, \$122,424 to the value of production and \$101,543 to the value added by manufacture.

In comparison with 1930, the industries of British Columbia and the Yukon Territory showed the following variations in their manufacturing activities. The number of establishments reporting decreased by sixty-one with a drop in the capital investment of \$20,802,684. The number of persons employed also declined by 8,404 with a loss in the payroll of \$12,256,201. The amount spent on materials was \$41,224,834 less, while the drop in the value of production was even greater, viz., \$65,414,575. The decrease in the value added by manufacture was therefore \$24,189,741.

The large decrease in the number of employees in 1931 is not, however, entirely due to the decline in manufacturing production. The decrease is in part due to the change in method of computing the average annual employment of wage-earners. Between 1925 and 1930 the average was obtained by summing the averages of individual plants, based on the number of months in actual operation and not by dividing by 12 the sum of the monthly employment figures. For example, if a plant operated only during three months of the year with an employment of 100 persons the first month, 125 the second month and seventy-five the third month, its average annual employment was taken as 100 ( $300 \div 3$ ); the same as that of another plant which operated the whole year with an average employment of 100 persons per month. In 1931, however, a change was made to the old method, whereby the aggregate of the monthly figures is divided by 12. This method gives the man year that each plant operates. The change in method, therefore, affects the average annual employment as well as the average wages paid in seasonal industries, such as fruit and vegetable canning, fish canning, sawmills, etc.

Provinces where seasonal industries predominate, therefore, show a proportionately greater decrease in the number of employees in 1931 as compared with the decrease in the salaries and wages paid, while industries that operate throughout the entire year are not affected by this change.

The totals and variations referred to will be noted in tables 1 and 2.

Table 3 compares the principal statistics of the industrial groups for the years 1930 and 1931. From the standpoint of value of production, the wood and paper products group with an output valued at \$58,008,607 led all the others by a wide margin in both years. The next group of importance is vegetable products, followed by animal products, non-ferrous metal products, etc.

Table 4 reviews the principal statistics of the twenty-five leading industries of British Columbia in 1931. In value of production, the sawmills headed the list with an output valued at \$26,831,490. Other leading industries are - pulp and paper, \$14,892,646; central electric stations, \$10,693,004; fish curing and packing, \$9,229,359; slaughtering and meat packing, \$8,183,387; petroleum refining, \$7,720,202, etc.

Table 5 reviews the principal statistics of the individual industries which make up the groups shown in table 3.

Table 6 covers the principal statistics of all cities and towns in British Columbia and the Yukon Territory which have three or more establishments and a production of \$100,000 and over in the year 1931. The city of Vancouver with a production of \$72,999,316 leads by a very wide margin, accounting for 41.5 per cent of the total for the province. Other principal cities and the amount of their production were Victoria with \$9,166,961 and New Westminster with \$9,003,952.

Table 7 gives the principal statistics of all the industries located in Vancouver.

Details of capital investment for 1931 are shown by industrial groups in table 8. The total capital investment in 1931 amounted to \$382,525,614 and of this amount \$285,587,353 represented the value of land, buildings, machinery, tools and other equipment. Inventories of raw materials, goods in process, fuel and other supplies on hand accounted for \$30,917,109, finished products \$22,361,396, while the balance of \$43,659,756 was made up of cash, bills and accounts receivable, prepaid expenses, etc.

Statistics of power equipment and fuel consumption in the manufacturing industries of British Columbia and the Yukon Territory are shown in tables 9 and 10.

1. - Prior to 1931, owners who were working as ordinary wage-earners, such as small bakers, reported themselves as wage-earners. In 1931, however, all such owners were required to report themselves as salaried employees.
2. - In 1931, travelling salesmen who were attached to the plant and devoted all or the greater part of their time in selling the products of that plant were included with salaried employees. Prior to this they were not reported at all.
