MANUFACTURING INDUSTRIES OF THE PROVINCE OF ONTARIO, 1946

With the end of the war in 1945, manufacturing production in Ontario, as well as throughout the rest of Canada, dropped sharply. The production of war equipment was immediately curtailed and in many instances entirely discontinued. Many factories began to convert from war to peace-time production, while the production of many lines of consumers goods surged upward. As a result of these changes, production in Ontario during 1945 which was valued at \$3,965,069,021 represented a drop of \$374,728,763 or 8.6 per cent as compared with the previous year. There was also a drop of 46,336 or 8.2 per cent in the number of persons employed and \$92,554,673 or 9.5 per cent in the amount of salaries and wages paid. The decline continued throughout 1946 with the result that the number of employees declined by another 19,936 and salaries and wages paid by \$37,266,840. Between 1944 and 1946 the volume of production, as measured by the number of persons employed, declined by 11.7 per cent. As was to be expected, the iron and its products group with a drop of 69,545 employees reported the greatest decline in the volume of production, followed by chemicals and allied products with a drop of 9,246, non-ferrous metal products 8,878, and miscellaneous industries 4,730. On the other hand, the volume of production of many lines of consumers goods advanced. The wood and paper products group reported an increase in employment of 13,682, textiles 4,377, vegetable products 3,334, animal products 2,970, and non-metallic mineral products 1,764.

In 1946 reports were received from 11,424 establishments operating in Ontario. Their combined output was valued at \$3,754,523,701. Employment was furnished to 498,120 persons who were paid \$845,216,547 in salaries and wages. The cost of materials used was valued at \$2,001,900,592, while the value added by manufacture amounted to \$1,659,284,622.

Ontario is the most important manufacturing province in the Dominion. This favourable position is not of recent growth, but has been maintained over a long period of years. In spite of the rapid industrial development in recent years in other provinces, such as Quebec, British Columbia and Manitoba, Ontario is maintaining a manufacturing production equal to that of the remainder of the Dominion. In 1939 this percentage equalled 50.2. Due to the relatively greater expansion in war production in other provinces during the war years the percentage declined to 47.8 in 1944 and to 46.7 in 1946.

Ontario also has the greatest diversification of manufacturing production of any province. Outstanding among the industries in which this province is pre-eminent are those of automobiles, agricultural implements, starch, bicycles and carpet manufacture which are carried on practically in this province alone. Other important industries in which Ontario leads, with the percentage which the production of each bears to that of the Dominion total, in 1946, are as follows; abrasives 87.1, miscellaneous non-ferrous metal products 86.5, leather tanneries 86.3, soap and washing compounds 85.2, rubber goods 82.1, cordage, rope and twine 81.3, clay products from imported clay 77.8, primary iron and steel 74.7, woollen yarn 73.1, electrical apparatus and supplies 72.7, aluminium products 72.7, salt 67.6, toilet preparations 61.3, coke and gas products 58.5, acids, alkalies and salts 55.7, flour and feed 54.4, hosiery and knitted goods 52.6, furniture 50.4, glass and glass products 50.3.

and medicinal and pharmaceutical preparations 50.1.

From the standpoint of gross value of production, the iron and its products group again headed the list with an output valued at \$879,156,689, as compared with a gross value of \$1,185,566,783 in 1945. Other groups in the order of their importance were; vegetable products \$734,685,876, wood and paper products \$527,825,173, non-ferrous metal products \$415,291,772, animal products \$397,619,498, textiles and textile products \$330,901,182, non-metallic mineral products \$204,854,445, chemicals and allied products \$199,676,206, and miscellaneous industries \$64,512,860. The iron, non-ferrous metals, chemicals and miscellaneous industries groups reported decreases in the gross value of production in 1946.

The automobile industry with an output valued at \$192,039,831 again headed the list, followed by electrical apparatus and supplies with \$170,544,377, pulp and paper \$162,452,083, slaughtering and meat packing \$154,469,735, flour and feed mills \$141,778,944, rubber goods \$130,924,552, non-ferrous metal smelting and refining \$119,239,873, primary iron and steel \$114,303,838, etc. In salaries and wages paid the ranking of the industries is different. In this respect the electrical apparatus and supplies industry heads the list, followed by automobiles, primary iron and steel, pulp and paper, machinery, etc.

The city of Toronto with a production of \$1,036,939,790 accounted for 27.6 per cent of the entire output of the province. Hamilton came second with a production of \$308,033,098, and Windsor third with \$244,925,148. These three cities accounted for 42.3 per cent of the provincial production in 1946. During the war years Windsor ranked second.
