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STOCKS OF RAW HIDES AND SKINS IN CANADA

July, 1943

Stocks of raw cattle hides held by tanners, packers and dealers in Canada amounted to 473,199 at the end of July, 1943, compared with 455,737 at the end of June, 1943 and 444,032 at the end of July, 1942. Total stocks on hand at the end of July, 1943, were made up of 376,539 hides of domestic origin and 96,660 hides of foreign origin. The domestic stock included 261,962 packer or small packer and 114,577 country hides.

Calf and kip skins on hand increased from 641,019 at the end of June, 1943, to 644,330 at the end of July, 1943. Stocks of other types at the end of July, 1943 included 76,773 dozen sheep and lamb skins, 8,831 goat and kid skins and 28,191 horse hides.

The total value of statistical services provided by the Statistical Service of the Government of Canada in 1957-58 was approximately \$10,000,000. This represents an increase of about 10% over the total value of services provided in 1956-57. The increase is due to a number of factors, including the expansion of the Service's activities in the areas of business and economic statistics, and the introduction of new statistical programs in the areas of energy and environmental statistics.
