MONTHLY REPORT OF THE BOOT AND SHOE PRODUCTION OF CANADA. NOVEMBER, 1926.

The report of the boot and shoe production of Canada for the month of November is based on the returns of 167 factories out of a total of 171 factories in operation in that month. Three factories in Quebec and l in Ontario failed to make returns. A total of 1,661,016 pairs of leather and felt footwear is shown as the production for the month of November, a decrease from the preceding month of 83.752 pairs, or 5 p.c. The leather footwear made totalled 1,525,739 pairs, comprising footwear for men, 443,248 pairs; for boys and youths, 149,556 pairs; for women, 630,309 pairs; for misses and children, 200,681 pairs, and for babies and infants 101,945 pairs. The two last classifications show increases in production, while the other classifications show decreases. In the classification of leather footwear according to process of manufacture, "welts", "McKays and all imitation welts", "turns", and "pegged, screw or wire fastened", show decreases in quantity of output, while the classification of "stitchdowns" shows an increase. The number of pairs of felt footwear made was 135,277, a decrease from the preceding month of 8,515 pairs. The cumulative production of leather and felt footwear (exclusive of larrigans and shoepacks, and Indian slippers and moccasins) for the 11 months January to November. 1926, was 17.082,000 pairs, which exceeds the total production for 1925 (excluding the same items as in 1926) by 530,201 pairs. The average monthly production for the 11 months January to November was 1,552,909 pairs, compared with an average monthly production for the year 1925 of 1,379,316 pairs.
