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REPORT ON THE PRODUCIION OF BOOTS AND SHOES L.IERARARY IN CANADA, TMT, BER, 1928
Number of Eactories. - The present report is based on the returns of 175 factoriea out of a total of 182 factories in operation during the month. The factories in operation are located by provinces as follows: Nova Scotia, 2; New Brunswick, 3; Quebec, 109; Ontario, 61; Manitoba, 2; and British Coluabia, 5: Six factories in Quebec and 1 factory in Ontario failed to make return.
production:- The output of leather footwear in Canada during the month of November, 1928, amounted to $1,555,467$ pairs, a decrease from the preceding month of 283,157 pairs, or 15 p.ce, and a decrease from the :nonth of November, 1927, of 60,200 pairs, or $3 \frac{1}{2}$ p.c. The month of November usually registers a decline in the production of leather footwear, the Vovember, 1927, statement showing a decrease of $5 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{p}, \mathrm{c}$, from the preceding month, and the November, 1926 , statement a decrease of $5 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. The production of footwear for women in November, 1928, totalled 653,253 pairs, a decrease of $22 \mathrm{p}, \mathrm{c}$. from the preceding month; footwear for men, 459,988 pairs, a decrease of $18 \mathrm{p}_{2} \mathrm{c}_{\mathrm{g}}$; footwear for misses and children, 203.598 pairs, a decrease of $1 \frac{1}{2}$ p, ce: footwear for boys and youths, 125,767 pairs, an increase of less than 1 p.ce; and footwear for babies and infants, 112,861 pairs, an increase of $13 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$.

Cumulative Production - The cumulative production of $\ddagger 00$ twear for the 11 months ended November 30, 1928, amounted to $18,744,787$ pairs, or an average per month of 1,704,072 pairs, compared with a total of $17,894,686$ pairs and a monthly average of 1, 626,790 pairs for the corresponding period of 1927.

Average Production Der Factory. - The average production of footwear per factory in November, 1928 , was 8,888 pairs, compared with 10,446 pairs in the preceding month and 9,448 pairs in the month of November, 1927.

Imports and Exports. - The imports of footwear with leather uppers during the month of November, 1928 , amounted to 69,291 pairs, a decrease of 12,283 pairs from the preceding month, and a decrease of 8,821 pairs from the month of November, 1927. The erports of Canadian made leather footwear in November, 1928, totalled 15.774 pairs, an increase of 5,598 pairs over the preceding month, and an increase of 2,782 pelrs over the month of November, 1927.
