November: 1929: are basoc on the retum on fue fectories ous of a total of 185 factories in operation during the month. Wie factories in operation are located by provinces as follows: Nova Scotia: 1; New Biunswicl, 4: Queosc, 109; Ontario, 63; Manitoba, 2; and British Columbia, 6. Three factories in que ec, and I factory each in Ontario and British Columoia failed to mate return.

Production, - Tie output of the ractories for the month of November shows a decided fallingmoff frow the preceding month and is the second lowest recorded so far for any
 crease from the preceding montin of $462,6,1$ pairs, and a decrease from the month of November, 1928, of 31.726 pairs. Footrear nade in sizes for momen lad an output of 597. 512 pairs, a decrease from the nreceaing mounh oi $27 \%, 000$ pairs, or 32 per cent, and footwear in sizes for men, 430.225 neirs, a dscuean of 150,008 pais, or 26 per cent. Felt footwear is the onir iten of prodiction and an an ancresse over the month of October, and it shows an incroase also orer the producticy of No:ember, IS,28.

Cumulative Production, The sovai production of footwear for the 11 months ended November 30, 1929, was 18, $230,07{ }^{7}$ pairs, $0:$ ave avere per month of $1,657,279$ pairs, compaired with a total of $18,744,757$ purs ans an averaee por month of $1,704,072$ pairs for the corresponding period of 1928 .

Imports and Exports.- The imports of footroas of all kinds (excopt mbber) in November, 1929: also :how considerabie decrease from the precoding month and from the month of November, 1928. The total quant: importea ras 152,334 pal-s; compared with 217,143 pairs in October and 173,825 pair in November: 1928 . According to quantity the United Kingdom is the principal couniry of orifin for caizads's imoorts of footwear (except rubber), but according to value, the urined Staves ir the cheef source.
