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REPORT ON THE PRODUCTION OF BOOTS AND SHOES IN CANADA, MAY, 1922.
Number of Factories. - The present report is based on the returns of 180 boot and shoe factories out of a total of 186 factories in operation during the monti. The factories maling returns are located by provinces as follows: Nova Scotia, 2; New Brunswick, 3; Quebec, 104; Ontario, 64; Manitoba, 1 and Britiah Columbia, 6. Five factories in $\mathcal{F}$

Production. - Production during the month of May, 1929, amounted to $1,688,350$ pairs, comprising $1,521,416$ pairs of boots and shoes with leather or fabric uppers; 14,604 pairs of shoepacks, larrigans and moccasins; 101,732 pairm of footwear with felt uppers; and 50,598 pairs of slippers. The production for May was greater than that of the preceding month by 44,769 pairs or $2 \frac{1}{2} p, c$, and was less than that of the month of May, 1928, by only 8,909 pairs, or 意 of 1 p.c. The production for May, 1929, is divided according to classifications of size as follows: footwear for momen, 44 p.c. of total output: footwear for men, 28 p.c.; for misses and children, 14 p.c.; for babies and infants, 8 p.c. : and for boys and youths, 6 p.c.

Cumulative Production - The total production for the five month ended May 31. 1929, was $7.959,638$ pairs, or an average output per month of $1,593.927$ pairs, compared with a total of $8,504,400$ pairs and an average per month of $1,700,880$ peirs for the corresponding period of 1928 .

Imports and Exports. - The imports of footwear (including boots and shoes With leather, cenvas and felt uppers, and boots and shoes, pegged or wre fastened, With unstitched soles) during the month of May, 1929, smounted to 85.108 paire, compared with 99,285 pairs in the preceding month and 80,093 pairs in May, 1928. The United States supplied 72 per cent of the footrear imported into Canada in May, 1929, and the United Kingdom, 18 per cent. The quantity of Cenadian made leather footwear exported during the month of May, 1929, was 28,655 pairs, compared with 9.218 pairs In the preceding month, and 15,182 pairs in May, 1928. of the total quantity exported. In May, 1929, the United States took 95 p.c.
