REFORT ON THE PROIUCTION OF BOOTS AND SHOES
Il: CAITADA, JULVE, 1929.

Mimber of Factories. - The statistics of production in the present report are based on the returns of 177 factories out of a total of 183 factories in operation during the month. Four factories in Quebec, one factory in Ontario and one in Nova Scotia failed to make returns.

Production:- The production of footwear for the month of June, 1929, anounted to $1,569,576$ pairs, a decrease from the preceding month of 118,774 pairs, or 7 ?.c., and a decrease from the month of June, 1928 , of 170,121 pairs or $9 \frac{1}{2}$ p.c. The quantity of footwear made in sizes for women during the month of June, 1929, amounted to 690,267 paire, a decrease from the preceding month of 57,047 pairs, or $7 \frac{1}{2}$ p.c., while the quantity of footwear made in sizes for men was 437,726 pairs, a decrease of 31,155 pairs, 01, 61 ?.c. Pootwear in sizes for boys and youths, misses and children and babies and infats amounted io 441,583 pairs, a decrease from the preceding month of 30,572 pairs or 6 puc. A comparison of the statistics of production, month by month, for the first six months of lg29 shows production at its lowest in Jamary, with a total of $1,378,219$ pairs; the production for February showed an increase of $18 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. ; that of March an increase over February of 8 p.c. $:$ the April production shoved a decrease of 4 p.c. from March; the May production an increase over April of $2 \frac{1}{3}$ p.c.; and the June production a decrease from May of 7 p.c.

Curalative Production.- The total production of footwear for the six months ended June 30 , 1929, was $9,539,214$ pairs, or an average per month of $1,589,869$ pairs, compared WIth a total of $10,244,097$ pairs and an average per month of $1,707,349$ xairs for the corresponding period of 1925.

Imports and Exports.- The imports of footwear with leather, canvas and felt uppers durins the month of June, 1929, amounted to 120,371 pairs, compared with 55,108 pairs in the precedime month and 114,575 pairs in Jure, 1928 . The exports of Canadian made leather footwear in June, 1929 , totalled 12,103 pairs, compared with 28,655 Dairs in May and 13.796 pairs in June, 1928 .
