REPORT ON THE PRODUCTION OF BOOTS AND SHOES IN CANADA, SEPTEMBER, 1929.

Number of Factories .- Statistics of boot and shoe production for the month of September, 1929, are based on the returns of 179 factories out of a total of 184 factories in operation during the month. The factories in operation are located by provinces as follows: Nova Scotia, 1; New Brunswick, 3; Quebec, 108; Ontario, 64; Manitoba, 2; and British Columbia, 6. Four factories in Quebec and 1 factory in Ontario neglected to furnish returns.

Production .- The total quantity of footwear made in September, 1929, was 1,737,939 pairs, compared with 1,854,773 pairs in the preceding month and 1,643,759 pairs in September, 1928. Footwear made in sizes for men totalled 510,702 pairs, a decrease from the preceding month of 73,267 pairs, or 13 per cent, and footwear in sizes for women, 812,457 pairs, a decrease of 39,504 pairs, or 5 per cent. Footwear made in sizes for misses and children shows an increase over the preceding month, while decreases are recorded in footwear for boys and youths and for babies and infants.

Cumulative Production .- The total output of the factories for the nine months ended September 30, 1929, was 14,819,961 pairs, or an average of 1,646,662 pairs per month, compared with a total of 15,350,696 pairs and an average per month of 1,705,633 pairs for the corresponding period of 1928.

Imports and Exports. - The quantity of footwear (not including rubber) imported into Canada during the month of September, 1929, totalled 166,985 pairs, compared with 157,157 pairs in the preceding month and 191,083 pairs in September, 1928, Imports from the United Kingdom represented about 49 per cent and imports from the United States about 46 per cent of the total quantity of footwear imported during the month of September, 1929. The quantity of Canadian made leather footwear exported in September, 1929, amounted to only 3,497 pairs, as compared with 5,989 pairs in the preceding month and 10,815 pairs in September, 1928. Of the total for September, 1929, the United States took 1,657 pairs and New Zealand 1,300 pairs.

Statistical Tables -- The following tables give statistics of production in detail. A table (5) is included in the present report which shows the total production of footwear by months for the years 1926 to 1929.




