## REPORT ON TIE PRCJUCTIOX OF 300 IS STD SHOES IN CANADA, <br> JANUARY, 1930.

Number of Factories.- Statistics of production of the leather footwear industry of Canada in January, 1930, are based on the returns of 169 factories out of a total of 174 factories in operation during the month. The location of the operating factories by provinces is as follows: Nova Scotia, 1; New Brunswick, 4; Quebec, 104; Ontario, 57; Manitoba, 1 ; and British Columbia, 7. Four factories in quebec and 1 factory in Ontario neglected to furnish returns.

Production.- The output of the factories in January, 1930, amounted to 1,233,321 pairs, a decrease from the preceding month of 84,435 pairs, or 6 per cent, and a decrease from the month of January, 1929, of 144,898 pairs, or $10 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. The smaller output is due to decreased production in the items of (b) shoepacks, larrigans and moccasins, oil tan; (bb) moccasins for outdoor wear, other than oil tan; (c) footwear of all kinds with felt uppers; and (d) cloth, carpet, boudoir and Indian slippers. The production of footwear classified as (a) boots and shoes with leather or fabric uppers shows an increase over the preceding month of 52,388 pairs. Footwear for men under this classification, shows an increase over the preceding month of 13.792 pairs, and footwear for women, an increase of 46,045 pairs.

Imports and Exports.- Imports of footwear (not including rubber goods) were less In January, 1930, than in either the preceding month or the month of January, 1929. Figure e for the three periods were as follows: January, 1930: 45,252 pairs; December, 1929: 66,664 pairs; and January, 1929: 51,827 pairs. The exports of Canadian-made leather footwear in January, 1930, amounted to 2,216 pairs, compared with 3,450 pairs in December, and 2,611 pairs in January, 1929.
