## FEBRUARY, 1230.

Number of Factories.- Statistics of the production of leather footwear in Canada in February, 1930, are based on the statements furnished the Bureau by 172 factories out of a total of 177 factories ir operation during the month. The distribution of the operating factories, by provinces, is is follows: Nova Scotia, 1; New Brunswick, 4; Quebec, 104; Ontario, 60; Manitoba, 1; and British Columbia, 7. Three factories in Quebec and one factory each in Ontario and British Columbia failed to make return.

Production.- The output of tine factories in February, 1928, amounted to $1,446,610$ pairs, an increase over the preceding month of 213,289 pairs, or 17 per cent, but a decrease from February, 1929 , of 138,758 pairs, or $8 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. The output of footwear for women in February, 1930, arnounted to 611,315 pairs, this total being larger than that of the preceding montin by 148,456 pairs, or 32 per cent. The output of footwear for men amounted to 434,866 pairs, an increase of 23,057 pairs, or $5 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. The production of McKay and Imitation welts accounted for 49 per cent of the total output of boots and shoes with leather or fabric uppers, and the production of welts for $23 \frac{3}{2}$ per cent. Large increases over the preceding month are noted in the output of footwear with felt uppers and of slippers.

Cumulative Production. - The total output of leather footwear for the first two months of 1930 amounted to $2,679,031$ pairs, compared with $2,924,855$ pairs in tine corresponding period of 1729 .

Imports and Exports: Footwear of all kinds, except rubber, imported into Canada during the month of February, 1930, amounted to 74,401 pairs, an increase over the preceding month of 29,149 pairs. The large item is that of footwear with loather uppers, made in sizes for women, most of which comes from the United States. The exports of Canadian-made leather footwear increased from 2,216 pairs in January to 13,777 pairs in February, the larger part in tine latter month going to the united states.
