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> REPORT ON THE PRODUCTION OF BOOTS AID SHC SS IN CANADA, SEPTEMBER, 1930

Number of Factories. - Statistics of the production of leather footwear in Canada in the month of Septemiver, 1930, are based on the returns of 173 factories out of a total of 177 factories in operation during the month. The factories in operation are located by provinces as follows: Nova Scotia, 2; New Brunswick, 4; Quebec, 105; Ontario, 58; Manitoba 2; and British Columbia, 6. Three factories in Quebec and one factory in Ontrrio failed to leke return.

Production. - The output of leather footwear in September amounted to $1,615,859$ pairs, an increase over the month of August of 73,173 pairs, or $4 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent, but a decrease from the month of September, 1929 , of 122,080 pairs, or 7 per cent. Since June of the present year there has been a steady increase in the output of the factories, the September product being greater than that of June by 217,415 pairs or $15 \frac{7}{2}$ per cent. Production for the month of September, 1930, is also the largest shown for any one of the first nine months of the year. In the September output, footwear for women represents 47 per cent of the total; and footwear for men, 30 per cent. The remaining 23 per cent is composed of footwear in sizes for "boys and youths", misses and children", and"babies and infeants".

Cumulative Production. - The combined production of leather footwear for the nine months ended September 30,1930 , was $13,346,000$ pairs, or an average per month of $1,482,900$ pairs, compared with a total of $14,819,961$ pairs, and a monthly average of 1,646,662 pairs for the corresponding period of 1929.

Imports and Exports.- The quantity of footwear (except rubber) imported into Canada in September was 288,998 pairs, compared with 161,582 pairs in August and 166,985 pairs in September, 1929. The total value of the imports in September, 1930, was $\$ 459,338$, of which the imports from the United Kingiom accounted for 44 per cent and from the United States 52 per cent. The quantity of Canadian-made leather footwear exported in September amounted to 4,324 pairs, compared with 8.227 pairs in Aupust and 3,497 pairs in September, 102.
