Number of Factories.- Statistics of the production of leather footwear in Canada in January, 1931, are based on the returns of 159 factories out of a total of 164 factories in operation during the month. The factories in operation were located by provinces as follows: Nova Scotia, 2; Now Brunswick, 4; Quebec, 96; Ontario, 55; Manitoba, 1 ; and British Columbia, 6. Four factories in Quebec and 1 factory in Ontario neglected to make rectum. There were also 8 factories ( 5 in Quebec, 2 in Ontario and I in Manitoba) which stated in answer to the Bureau's questionnaire that no manufacturing was carried on during the month. An error was made in the December, 1930, Monthly Report in connection with the number of factories. The number of plants in operation in that month was stated to have been 157, whereas the correct figure was 167, while the number of returns received was given as 150 , whereas the figure should have read 160.

Production. - The output of leather footwear in Canada in January, 1931, amounted to 984,924 pairs, compared with $1,064,192$ pairs in the preceding month. The decrease In total output is due to the usual seasonal decline in the production of "shoepacks, larrigans and moccasins", "footwear with felt uppers", and "cloth, carpet, boudoir and Indian slippers". Footwear included under the classification of "boots and shoes with leather or fabric uppers" shows a production of 921,878 pairs, an increase over the premcoding month of 44,837 pairs. An increase of 38,158 pairs is recorded in the production of "Welts" and of 19,228 pairs in the production of "McKay and all imitation melts", while decreases are show for the other items in the classification of process. The production of leather footwear in January, 1930, totalled 1,317, 756 pairs.

Imports and Exports.- The imports into Canada of footwear (not including rubber) in January, 1931, amounted to 28,849 pairs, compared with 59,444 pairs in December and 45,252 pairs in January, 1930. The chief items are "boots, shoes ard slippers th leather uppers" in sizes for men and in sizes for women; in january, 1931 , the United States supplied about 55 per cent of the total quantity of the former classification of size and about 86 per cent of the total quantity of the latter imported into Canada in that month. The exports of Canadian made leather footwear dropped from 2,472 pairs in December, 1930, to 670 pairs in January, 1931. The exports in January, 1930, amounted to 2,216 pairs.
